Immoderate laughter.

inordinate Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive.

A book of **inordinate** length.

lavish (of a person) very generous or extravagant. The critics were lavish in their praise.

(in a political context) favouring policies that are socially progressive and

promote social welfare.

She is under attack from the right wing for making her own **liberal**

political views known.

overflowing Covered with water.

An **overflowing** river swamped dozens of villages.

plenteous Affording an abundant supply.

A **plenteous** grape harvest.



plentiful Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant.

A **plentiful** year.

Produced or growing in extreme abundance.

They are **profuse** in hospitality.

prolificBearing in abundance especially offspring.
In captivity tigers are **prolific** breeders.

. . Marked by richness and fullness of flavor.

Rich countries can afford to spend money on the environment.

substantial Of good quality and condition; solidly built.

The first meal of the day should be **substantial**.

superabundant Most excessively abundant.

Full of people or things; crowded.
