<b>abundant</b>	Present in great quantity. <i>The riverbanks were <b>abundant</b> in beautiful wild plants.</i>
<b>ample</b>	Large and accommodating. <i>She stood with her hands on her <b>ample</b> hips.</i>

<b>bountiful</b>	Producing in abundance. <i><b>Bountiful</b> compliments.</i>

<b>considerable</b>	Large or relatively large in number or amount or extent or degree. <i>Snow was a limited but still <b>considerable</b> novelist.</i>
<b>effusive</b>	Showing or expressing gratitude, pleasure, or approval in an unrestrained or heartfelt manner. <i><b>Effusive</b> volcanism.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>extensive</b>	Broad in scope or content- T.G.Winner. <i>An <b>extensive</b> garden.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Recklessly wasteful. <i><b>Extravagant</b> praise.</i>
<b>full</b>	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>She was <b>full</b> of confidence.</i>
<b>fulsome</b>	Unpleasantly and excessively suave or ingratiating in manner or speech. <i>The press are embarrassingly <b>fulsome</b> in their appreciation.</i>
<b>generous</b>	(of a thing) larger or more plentiful than is usual or necessary. <i>A <b>generous</b> portion.</i>
<b>gushing</b>	Flowing profusely. <i><b>Gushing</b> praise.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> laughter.</i>
<b>inordinate</b>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>lavish</b>	(of a person) very generous or extravagant. <i>The critics were <b>lavish</b> in their praise.</i>
<b>liberal</b>	(in a political context) favouring policies that are socially progressive and promote social welfare. <i>She is under attack from the right wing for making her own <b>liberal</b> political views known.</i>
<b>overflowing</b>	Covered with water. <i>An <b>overflowing</b> river swamped dozens of villages.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A <b>plenteous</b> grape harvest.</i>

<b>plentiful</b>	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. <i>A <b>plentiful</b> year.</i>
<b>profuse</b>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>They are <b>profuse</b> in hospitality.</i>
<b>prolific</b>	Bearing in abundance especially offspring. <i>In captivity tigers are <b>prolific</b> breeders.</i>
<b>rich</b>	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i><b>Rich</b> countries can afford to spend money on the environment.</i>
<b>substantial</b>	Of good quality and condition; solidly built. <i>The first meal of the day should be <b>substantial</b>.</i>
<b>superabundant</b>	Most excessively abundant.
<b>teeming</b>	Full of people or things; crowded. <i>She walked through the <b>teeming</b> streets.</i>
<b>unrestrained</b>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i><b>Unrestrained</b> laughter.</i>
<b>unstinting</b>	Very generous. <i>He was <b>unstinting</b> in his praise.</i>
<b>voluminous</b>	(of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric. <i>A <b>voluminous</b> purple cloak.</i>

<b>copiously</b>	In an expansive or wide-ranging way. <i>I was drinking <b>copiously</b>.</i>
<b>enough</b>	An adequate quantity a quantity that is large enough to achieve a purpose. <i>Food <b>enough</b>.</i>
<b>exceeding</b>	Extremely exceedingly. <i>A night of <b>exceeding</b> darkness.</i>
<b>galore</b>	Existing in abundance. <i>Whiskey <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>large</b>	A garment size for a large person. <i>The concert attracted <b>large</b> crowds.</i>
<b>lavishly</b>	In a wasteful manner. <i>Members of the band spent <b>lavishly</b> on their families.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>He played tennis a <b>lot</b> last year.</i>
<b>luxurious</b>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>A <b>luxurious</b> wallow in a scented bath.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	An abundance. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope s powers.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Plentiful. <i>The meal was astonishingly <b>plenteous</b>.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Food is <b>plentiful</b>.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.
<b>plenty</b>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>She has <b>plenty</b> more ideas.</i>
<b>profuse</b>	(especially of something offered or discharged) very plentiful; abundant. <i>I offered my <b>profuse</b> apologies.</i>

<b>prosperity</b>	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>replete</b>	Deeply filled or permeated. <i>Sensational popular fiction <b>replete</b> with adultery and sudden death.</i>
<b>stacked</b>	(of a woman) having large breasts. <i>You were playing against a <b>stacked</b> deck.</i>
<b>sufficient</b>	Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant. <i><b>Sufficient</b> food.</i>
<b>sybarite</b>	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses.
<b>voluminous</b>	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>He sank into a <b>voluminous</b> armchair.</i>
<b>voluptuary</b>	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses. <i>A <b>voluptuary</b> decade when high living was in style.</i>
<b>voluptuous</b>	Relating to or characterized by luxury or sensual pleasure. <i>A <b>voluptuous</b> woman.</i>
