## Synonyms of "Coquettish" as an adjective (14 Words)

- amorous** Expressive of or exciting sexual love or romance.  
*Amorous glances.*
- arch** (used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension.
- coy** Making a pretence of shyness or modesty that is intended to be alluring (typically used of a woman).  
*Like a wild young colt very inquisitive but very **coy** and not to be easily cajoled.*
- flighty** Unpredictably excitable (especially of horses).  
*Flighty young girls.*
- flirtatious** Expressing a playful sexual attraction.  
*A **flirtatious** smile.*
- flirty** Suggesting or expressing a playful sexual attraction.  
*Dates full of **flirty** banter.*

<b>frisky</b>	Playful and full of energy. <i>He bounds about like a <b>frisky</b> pup.</i>
<b>inviting</b>	Attractive and tempting. <i>An <b>inviting</b> offer.</i>
<b>kittenish</b>	Playful, lively, or flirtatious. <i>Her voice had that <b>kittenish</b> quality.</i>
<b>playful</b>	Fond of games and amusement; light-hearted. <i>A <b>playful</b> tomboy who loves to dress up.</i>
<b>provocative</b>	Serving or tending to provoke, excite, or stimulate; stimulating discussion or exciting controversy- Anthony Trollope. <i>A <b>provocative</b> sidelong glance.</i>
<b>seductive</b>	Tempting and attractive; enticing. <i>A <b>seductive</b> voice.</i>
<b>skittish</b>	(of a person) playfully frivolous or unpredictable. <i>My <b>skittish</b> and immature mother.</i>
<b>teasing</b>	Intended to provoke or make fun of someone in a playful way. <i><b>Teasing</b> comments.</i>

<b>aesthetically</b>	In a tasteful way. <i>This building is <b>aesthetically</b> very pleasing.</i>
<b>allure</b>	The quality of being powerfully and mysteriously attractive or fascinating. <i>Will sponsors really be <b>allured</b> by such opportunities.</i>
<b>alluring</b>	Powerfully and mysteriously attractive or fascinating; seductive. <i>The town offers <b>alluring</b> shops and restaurants.</i>

<b>catchy</b>	Having concealed difficulty. <i>A <b>catchy</b> title for a movie.</i>
<b>charisma</b>	A personal attractiveness or interestingness that enables you to influence others. <i>He has tremendous <b>charisma</b> and stage presence.</i>
<b>charm</b>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>She <b>charmed</b> him into giving her all his money.</i>
<b>charming</b>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>A <b>charming</b> little cottage.</i>
<b>chic</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable. <i><b>Chic</b> elegance.</i>
<b>delusive</b>	Inappropriate to reality or facts. <i><b>Delusive</b> expectations.</i>
<b>desirable</b>	A desirable person or thing. <i>You re a very <b>desirable</b> woman.</i>
<b>enchant</b>	Hold spellbound. <i>You have been <b>enchanted</b> by some spirits.</i>
<b>engaging</b>	Attracting or delighting. <i>An <b>engaging</b> frankness.</i>
<b>entice</b>	Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage. <i>The treat is offered to <b>entice</b> the dog to eat.</i>
<b>enticing</b>	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. <i>An <b>enticing</b> prospect.</i>
<b>entrance</b>	The right, means, or opportunity to enter somewhere or be a member of an institution, society, or other body. <i>They waited at the <b>entrance</b> to the garden.</i>
<b>fascinate</b>	Cause to be interested or curious. <i>The snake charmer <b>fascinates</b> the cobra.</i>
<b>glamorize</b>	Interpret romantically. <i>This new wallpaper really <b>glamorizes</b> the living room.</i>
<b>glamorous</b>	Having an air of allure, romance and excitement. <i>Being a singer must be such a <b>glamorous</b> lifestyle.</i>
<b>ingratiating</b>	Calculated to please or gain favor. <i>A smooth <b>ingratiating</b> manner.</i>
<b>inviting</b>	Attractive and tempting. <i>An <b>inviting</b> offer.</i>

<b><u>lure</u></b>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The film industry always has been a glamorous <b>lure</b> for young girls.</i>
<b><u>seductive</u></b>	Tempting and attractive; enticing. <i>A <b>seductive</b> voice.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
<b><u>tempt</u></b>	Give rise to a desire by being attractive or inviting. <i>How is it that ye have agreed together to <b>tempt</b> the Spirit of the Lord.</i>
<b><u>tempting</u></b>	Very pleasantly inviting. <i>It is often <b>tempting</b> to bring about change rapidly.</i>
<b>winsome</b>	Charming in a childlike or naive way. <i>A <b>winsome</b> smile.</i>
