- *An important quality or feature on which a particular thing depends or is based.*

<u>anchor</u>	An anchorman or anchorwoman. <i>Faith is his anchor.</i>
backbone	The spine of a book. <i>Prickles of sweat broke out along her backbone.</i>
<u>base</u>	A known line used as a geometrical base for trigonometry. <i>She makes the studio her base.</i>
<u>basis</u>	The underlying support or foundation for an idea, argument, or process. <i>He worked on an interim basis.</i>
bedrock	The fundamental principles on which something is based. <i>Honesty is the bedrock of a good relationship.</i>
central component	A workplace that serves as a telecommunications facility where lines from telephones can be connected together to permit communication.

centre	A place where some particular activity is concentrated. <i>A new centre party.</i>

core	The inner strand of an electric cable or rope. <i>The ball has a titanium core.</i>
crux	A small conspicuous constellation in the southern hemisphere in the Milky Way near Centaurus. <i>The crux of the matter is that attitudes have changed.</i>
focus	Special emphasis attached to something. <i>The focus of infection.</i>
foundation	The lowest load-bearing part of a building, typically below ground level. <i>This idea is the foundation of all modern economics.</i>
fundament	The fundamental assumptions from which something is begun or developed or calculated or explained.
fundamental principle	Any factor that could be considered important to the understanding of a particular business.
groundwork	Lowest support of a structure. <i>We are prepared today because of groundwork that was done ten years ago.</i>
heart	A card game similar to whist in which players attempt to avoid taking tricks containing a card of the suit of hearts. <i>You haven't got the heart for baseball.</i>
key	A lever as in a keyboard that actuates a mechanism when depressed. <i>A room key.</i>
keystone	A central stone at the summit of an arch, locking the whole together. <i>Cooperation remains the keystone of the government's security policy.</i>
<u>linchpin</u>	Pin inserted through an axle-tree to hold a wheel on. <i>He is the linchpin of this firm.</i>
main ingredient	A principal pipe in a system that distributes water or gas or electricity or that collects sewage.
mainspring	The principal spring in a watch, clock, or other mechanism. <i>Innovation is the mainspring of the new economy.</i>
<u>mainstay</u>	A person or thing on which something else is based or depends. <i>Farming is the mainstay of the rural economy.</i>

prop

A propeller that rotates to push against air.

essentialness	Basic importance.

foundation	An institution established with an endowment, for example a research body or charity. <i>The foundation of a civil service college.</i>
fundamental	A fundamental note tone or frequency. <i>Two courses cover the fundamentals of microbiology.</i>
<u>gist</u>	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>Damage is the gist of the action and without it the plaintiff must fail.</i>
ground	Place something on the ground or touch the ground with something. <i>Shore dumping can pollute fishing grounds.</i>
groundwork	The fundamental assumptions from which something is begun or developed or calculated or explained. <i>We are prepared today because of groundwork that was done ten years ago.</i>
hypostasis	The suppression of a gene by the effect of an unrelated gene.
<u>main</u>	(of a clause) capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence. <i>The camcorder can be run directly off the mains.</i>
nether	Dwelling beneath the surface of the earth. <i>Nether garments.</i>
pedestal	Set or support on a pedestal. <i>They put him on a pedestal.</i>
<u>primary</u>	A primary coil or winding in an electrical transformer. <i>A primary alcohol.</i>
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>He looked around for a prop to pin the door open.</i>
radically	In a radical manner. <i>You must radically change the way you do business.</i>
<u>rooted</u>	Broken or badly damaged. <i>I m usually completely rooted by the end of a trip and need heaps of physio to recover.</i>
rudiment	The elementary stages of any subject (usually plural). <i>She taught the girls the rudiments of reading and writing.</i>
<u>rudimentary</u>	Being in the earliest stages of development. <i>Rudimentary plans.</i>
<u>staple</u>	Secure or fasten with a staple or staples. <i>Staple fibers vary widely in length.</i>
