<b>banal</b>	So lacking in originality as to be obvious and boring. <i>Songs with <b>banal</b> repeated words.</i>
<b>bromidic</b>	Dull and tiresome but with pretensions of significance or originality. <i><b>Bromidic</b> sermons.</i>
<b>clichéd</b>	Repeated regularly without thought or originality.
<b>commonplace</b>	Not unusual; ordinary. <i>Unemployment was <b>commonplace</b> in his trade.</i>
<b>fatuous</b>	Silly and pointless. <i>A <b>fatuous</b> comment.</i>
<b>feeble</b>	Lacking physical strength, especially as a result of age or illness. <i>A <b>feeble</b> voice.</i>
<b>hackneyed</b>	(of a phrase or idea) having been overused; unoriginal and trite. <i><b>Hackneyed</b> phrases.</i>
<b>inane</b>	Lacking sense or meaning; silly. <i>Don't badger people with <b>inane</b> questions.</i>
<b>jejune</b>	Displaying or suggesting a lack of maturity. <i>Their entirely predictable and usually <b>jejune</b> opinions.</i>

<b><u>overworked</u></b>	(of a word, phrase, or idea) used so often that it has lost its effect. <i>Tired <b>overworked</b> demoralized staff.</i>
<b>platitudinal</b>	Platitudinous.
<b>platitudinous</b>	(of a remark or statement) used too often to be interesting or thoughtful; hackneyed. <i>This may sound <b>platitudinous</b>.</i>
<b><u>predictable</u></b>	Able to be predicted. <i>The characters are stereotyped and extremely <b>predictable</b>.</i>
<b><u>stale</u></b>	Lacking originality or spontaneity; no longer new. <i><b>Stale</b> news.</i>
<b>stereotyped</b>	Viewed or represented as a stereotype. <i>The film is weakened by its <b>stereotyped</b> characters.</i>
<b>tired</b>	Depleted of strength or energy. <i>A few boxes of <b>tired</b> vegetables.</i>
<b><u>trite</u></b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>His remarks were <b>trite</b> and commonplace.</i>
<b><u>vapid</u></b>	Offering nothing that is stimulating or challenging; bland. <i>A <b>vapid</b> conversation.</i>
<b><u>weak</u></b>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>She managed a <b>weak</b> nervous smile.</i>
<b>well worn</b>	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

<b>barley</b>	The grain of barley.
<b>bean</b>	A leguminous plant that bears beans in pods. <i>He didn't have a <b>bean</b>.</i>
<b>carrot</b>	Deep orange edible root of the cultivated carrot plant. <i>Grated <b>carrot</b>.</i>
<b>cereal</b>	Foodstuff prepared from the starchy grains of cereal grasses. <b>Cereal</b> crops.
<b>chaff</b>	Chopped hay and straw used as fodder. <i>He hopes to separate scientifically supported claims from pseudoscientific <b>chaff</b>.</i>

- cornbread** A type of bread made from maize meal.
- cornfield** A field in which corn is being grown.
- crib** The cards discarded by players at cribbage.  
*I was carrying my **crib** in a paper bag.*
- crop** Prepare for crops.  
*The current **crop** of politicians.*
- flour** Convert grain into flour.  
*Manioc **flour**.*
- graham** Denoting or made from wholewheat flour that has not been sifted.  
*A box of **graham** crackers.*
- grain** 1 60 dram equals an avoirdupois grain or 64 799 milligrams.  
*A stone of coarse **grain**.*
- harvest** Gather a crop as a harvest.  
*A limited **harvest** of wild mink.*
- hay** Convert plant material into hay.  
*The grass had all **hayed** off and gone to seed.*
- legume** A leguminous plant (member of the pea family), especially one grown as a crop.  
*He sows a mixture of grasses and **legumes**.*
- maize** A Central American cereal plant that yields large grains (corn or sweetcorn) set in rows on a cob. The many varieties include some used for stockfeed and corn oil.
- millet** A cereal grown in warm countries and regions with poor soils, bearing a large crop of small seeds which are chiefly used to make flour.
- pea** Used in names of plants or seeds that are similar or related to the pea e g chickpea sweet pea.

- peanut** Underground pod of the peanut vine.  
***Peanut** politicians.*
- potato** The plant of the nightshade family which produces potatoes on underground runners.  
*Roast **potatoes**.*
- rice** The grains of rice used as food.  
***Riced** boiled potatoes.*
- rick** A painful muscle spasm especially in the neck or back rick and wrick are British.

- seed** Remove the seeds from.  
*Stem and **seed** the chillies.*
- soybean** The most highly proteinaceous vegetable known the fruit of the soybean plant is used in a variety of foods and as fodder especially as a replacement for animal protein.
- sprout** Put forth and grow sprouts or shoots.  
*The plant **sprouted** early this year.*
- starch** Stiffen with starch.

- succotash** Fresh corn and lima beans with butter or cream.
