- appropriately** In an appropriate manner.

- aptly** In a manner that is appropriate or suitable in the circumstances.  
*America s **aptly** named Sunshine State.*
- aright** Correctly; properly.  
*I wondered if I d heard **aright**.*
- decently** To a fair and appropriate degree; fittingly.  
*Parents can teach their children how to behave **decently**.*

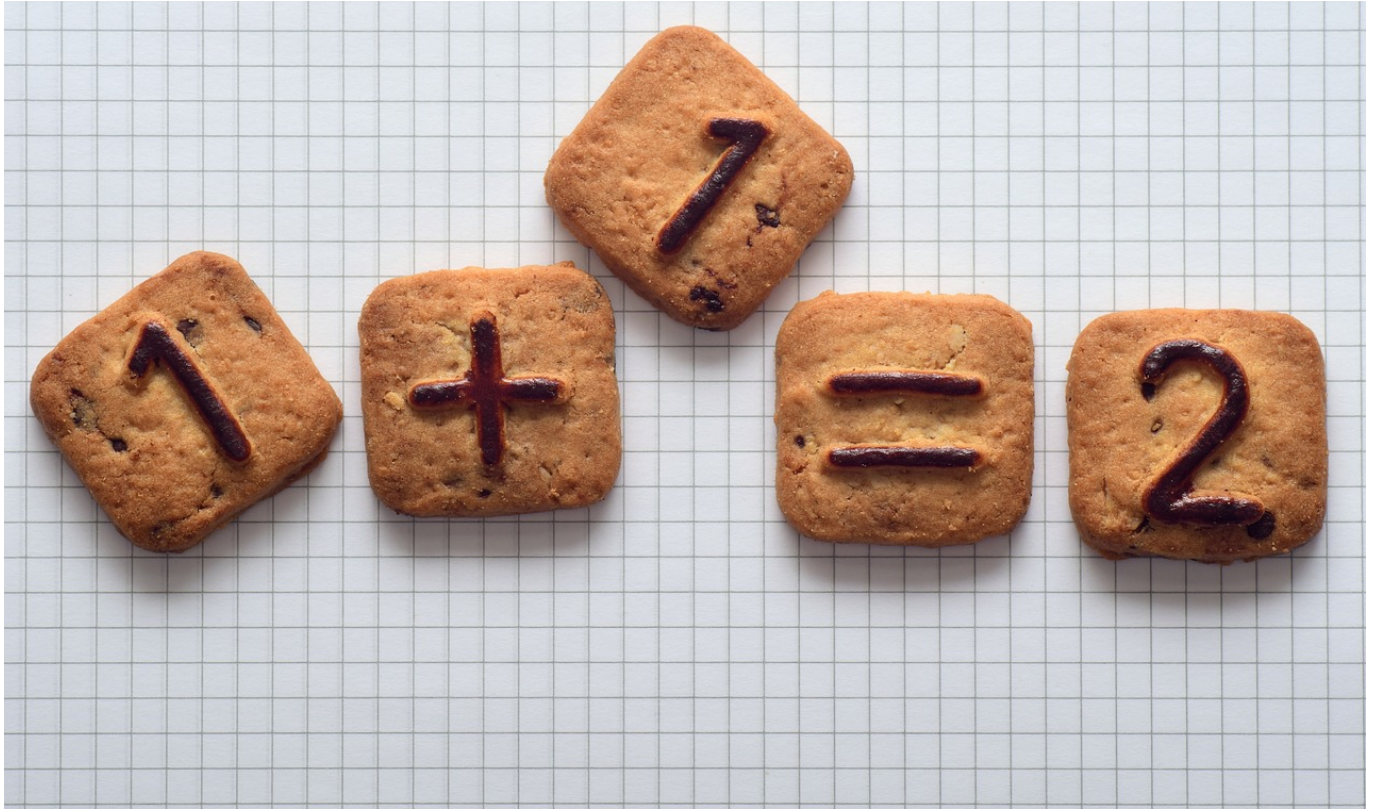
<b>exactly</b>	Indicating exactness or preciseness. <i>He was doing precisely or <b>exactly</b> what she had told him to do.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a faithful manner. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>
<b>faultlessly</b>	Without a fault; in a faultless manner.
<b>fittingly</b>	In a way that is suitable or appropriate under the circumstances. <i>Perhaps <b>fittingly</b> Scotland has its share of outdoor clothing firms.</i>
<b>flawlessly</b>	In a manner free from imperfections or defects; perfectly. <i>The gymnast landed <b>flawlessly</b>.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>The ring fitted <b>perfectly</b>.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	In exact terms; without vagueness. <i>He was doing <b>precisely</b> or exactly what she had told him to do.</i>
<b>properly</b>	Appropriately for the circumstances; suitably or respectably. <i>Ensuring the work is carried out <b>properly</b>.</i>
<b>right</b>	In the right manner. <i>I ll be <b>right</b> back.</i>
<b>rightly</b>	With good reason. <i>If I remember <b>rightly</b> she never gives interviews.</i>
<b>suitably</b>	To a degree that is expected or appropriate in the circumstances. <i>I looked <b>suitably</b> horrified.</i>



### **Usage Examples of "Correctly" as an adverb**

- *The flower had been correctly depicted by his son.*
- *She correctly answered eight questions.*
- *She had acted correctly.*





## Associations of "Correctly" (30 Words)

<b>accurate</b>	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>A player who can deliver long <b>accurate</b> passes to the wingers.</i>
<b>accurately</b>	In a way that is correct in all details; exactly. <i>Every single vote was <b>accurately</b> counted.</i>
<b>conspicuously</b>	In a way that attracts notice or attention. <i>One important voice has been <b>conspicuously</b> absent.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Socially right or correct. <i>The stock market <b>corrected</b>.</i>
<b>defined</b>	Having a definite outline or specification; precisely marked or stated. <i>Hills <b>defined</b> against the evening sky.</i>
<b>distinct</b>	Constituting a separate entity or part. <i>A <b>distinct</b> smell of nicotine.</i>
<b>distinctly</b>	To a distinct degree. <i>He looked <b>distinctly</b> uncomfortable.</i>

<b>exact</b>	Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs. <i>The <b>exact</b> details were still being worked out.</i>
<b>exactitude</b>	The quality of being precise or accurate. <i>It is not possible to say with any scientific <b>exactitude</b> what a dream means.</i>
<b>exactly</b>	Used to emphasize the accuracy of a figure or description. <i>He was doing precisely or <b>exactly</b> what she had told him to do.</i>
<b>just</b>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>Inflation fell to <b>just</b> over 4 per cent.</i>
<b>justly</b>	In a way that is well founded; justifiably. <i>We can <b>justly</b> be proud of our achievements.</i>
<b>justness</b>	Conformity with some esthetic standard of correctness or propriety. <i>It was performed with <b>justness</b> and beauty.</i>
<b>literally</b>	Used for emphasis while not being literally true. <i>I was <b>literally</b> blown away by the response I got.</i>
<b>marked</b>	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A <b>marked</b> man.</i>
<b>obviously</b>	Unmistakably ('plain' is often used informally for 'plainly'). <i>The answer is <b>obviously</b> wrong.</i>
<b>pinpoint</b>	Locate exactly. <i>It is difficult to <b>pinpoint</b> the source of his life s inspiration.</i>
<b>precise</b>	Marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <i>A <b>precise</b> image.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	Indicating exactness or preciseness. <i>Kids will love it <b>precisely</b> because it will irritate their parents.</i>
<b>pronounced</b>	Strongly marked; easily noticeable. <i>A <b>pronounced</b> flavor of cinnamon.</i>
<b>reliably</b>	In a faithful manner. <i>Few of these paintings can be <b>reliably</b> dated.</i>
<b>righteous</b>	(of a person) morally good; virtuous. <i>The prayer of a <b>righteous</b> man availeth much.</i>
<b>rightly</b>	With good reason. <i>The delicious cuisine for which her country was <b>rightly</b> famous.</i>
<b>rightness</b>	The quality or state of being true or correct as a fact. <i>They are convinced of the <b>rightness</b> of their theories.</i>
<b>scrupulous</b>	Very concerned to avoid doing wrong. <i>The research has been carried out with <b>scrupulous</b> attention to detail.</i>

<b><u>specifically</u></b>	In a way that relates to species. <i>The problem was <b>specifically</b> mentioned in the report.</i>
<b><u>sure</u></b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Wood dust is a <b>sure</b> sign of termites.</i>
<b><u>truly</u></b>	To the fullest degree; genuinely or properly. <i>She was now <b>truly</b> American.</i>
<b>veracious</b>	Habitually speaking the truth. <i>A <b>veracious</b> witness.</i>
<b><u>verbatim</u></b>	In exactly the same words as were used originally. <i>Subjects were instructed to recall the passage <b>verbatim</b>.</i>
