Definitions of "Correctness" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “correctness” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The quality or state of being free from error; accuracy.*
- *The quality of conformity to social expectations.*
- *Conformity to accepted social standards.*
- *Conformity to fact or truth.*
- *The quality of being right in an opinion or judgement.*
- *Conformity to a particular political or ideological orthodoxy.*



Synonyms of "Correctness" as a noun (1 Word)

rightness Conformity to fact or truth.
*They argue for the moral **rightness** of overthrowing the leader by force.*

- *There was evidence to support the correctness of the identification.*
- *High-end environmental correctness has a price.*
- *He is trying to challenge the correctness of his criminal conviction.*



Associations of "Correctness" (30 Words)

accurate	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>Reliable accurate rifles.</i>
acknowledgement	A statement printed at the beginning of a book expressing the author's or publisher's gratitude to others. <i>He touched his hat in acknowledgement.</i>
adaption	The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions).
adjustment	The process of adapting or becoming used to a new situation. <i>For many couples there may need to be a period of adjustment.</i>
applicable	Relevant or appropriate. <i>Gave applicable examples to support her argument.</i>
<u>apposite</u>	Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence. <i>The successful copywriter is a master of apposite and evocative verbal images.</i>
appropriate	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc. <i>This isn't the appropriate time or place.</i>

<u>apropos</u>	At an opportune time. <i>The composer s reference to child s play is apropos.</i>
<u>corrective</u>	Designed to correct or counteract something harmful or undesirable. <i>The teacher s action was corrective rather than instructional.</i>
<u>correctly</u>	In an accurate manner. <i>She correctly answered eight questions.</i>
<u>correspond</u>	Take the place of or be parallel or equivalent to. <i>The rank of Feldwebel in the German forces nominally corresponded to the British rank of sergeant.</i>
<u>exactly</u>	In a precise manner. <i>He was doing precisely or exactly what she had told him to do.</i>
factually	As a fact or based on fact. <i>The evidence is legally and factually insufficient.</i>
fit	The particular way in which something especially a garment or component fits. <i>Fit to drop.</i>
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. <i>She s coming tomorrow for a fitting.</i>
germane	Relevant to a subject under consideration. <i>He asks questions that are germane and central to the issue.</i>
<u>just</u>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>The sun just now came out.</i>
justness	The quality of being just or fair. <i>It was performed with justness and beauty.</i>
legitimate	Show or affirm to be just and legitimate. <i>His claims to legitimate authority.</i>
<u>opportune</u>	Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose. <i>He couldn t have arrived at a less opportune moment.</i>
pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
pertinent	Having precise or logical relevance to the matter at hand. <i>A list of articles pertinent to the discussion.</i>
proper	In the natural colours. <i>To judge with my proper eyes.</i>
rectify	Purify or refine (a substance) by repeated or continuous distillation. <i>Rectify the inequities in salaries.</i>

redress	Remedy or set right (an undesirable or unfair situation). <i>The power to redress the grievances of our citizens.</i>
relevant	Closely connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered. <i>Her films are relevant for feminists today.</i>
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>He had cause to revise his opinion a moment after expressing it.</i>
right	Of or belonging to the political or intellectual right. <i>My right elbow.</i>
righteous	Morally right or justifiable. <i>Victory in battle was conferred on the righteous.</i>
rightness	According with conscience or morality. <i>They argue for the moral rightness of overthrowing the leader by force.</i>
