### **Correctness as a Noun**

#### Definitions of "Correctness" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "correctness" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The quality or state of being free from error; accuracy.
- The quality of conformity to social expectations.
- Conformity to accepted social standards.
- Conformity to fact or truth.
- The quality of being right in an opinion or judgement.
- Conformity to a particular political or ideological orthodoxy.





## Synonyms of "Correctness" as a noun (1 Word)

**rightness** Conformity to fact or truth. They argue for the moral **rightness** of overthrowing the leader by force.

# Associations of "Correctness" (30 Words)

accurate	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>Reliable accurate rifles.</i>
acknowledgement	A statement printed at the beginning of a book expressing the author's or publisher's gratitude to others. <i>He touched his hat in acknowledgement.</i>
adaption	The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions.
adjustment	The process of adapting or becoming used to a new situation. For many couples there may need to be a period of <b>adjustment</b> .
applicable	Relevant or appropriate. Gave <b>applicable</b> examples to support her argument.
<u>apposite</u>	Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence. The successful copywriter is a master of <b>apposite</b> and evocative verbal images.
appropriate	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc. <i>This isn t the <b>appropriate</b> time or place</i> .



<u>apropos</u>	At an opportune time. The composer s reference to child s play is <b>apropos</b> .
<u>corrective</u>	Designed to correct or counteract something harmful or undesirable. <i>The teacher s action was corrective rather than instructional.</i>
<u>correctly</u>	In an accurate manner. She <b>correctly</b> answered eight questions.
<u>correspond</u>	Take the place of or be parallel or equivalent to. The rank of Feldwebel in the German forces nominally <b>correspond</b> ed to the British rank of sergeant.
<u>exactly</u>	In a precise manner. <i>He was doing precisely or <b>exactly</b> what she had told him to do.</i>
factually	As a fact or based on fact. The evidence is legally and <b>factually</b> insufficient.
fit	The particular way in which something especially a garment or component fits. <i>Fit to drop.</i>
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. She s coming tomorrow for a <b>fitting</b> .
germane	Relevant to a subject under consideration. <i>He asks questions that are <b>germane</b> and central to the issue.</i>
<u>just</u>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>The sun <b>just</b> now came out.</i>
justness	The quality of being just or fair. It was performed with <b>justness</b> and beauty.
legitimate	Show or affirm to be just and legitimate. <i>His claims to <b>legitimate</b> authority.</i>
<u>opportune</u>	Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose. <i>He couldn t have arrived at a less <b>opportune</b> moment.</i>
pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
pertinent	Having precise or logical relevance to the matter at hand. A list of articles <b>pertinent</b> to the discussion.
proper	In the natural colours. <i>To judge with my <b>proper</b> eyes.</i>
rectify	Purify or refine (a substance) by repeated or continuous distillation. <i>Rectify</i> the inequities in salaries.



redress	Remedy or set right (an undesirable or unfair situation. The power to <b>redress</b> the grievances of our citizens.
<u>relevant</u>	Closely connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered. <i>Her films are <b>relevant</b> for feminists today.</i>
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>He had cause to <b>revise</b> his opinion a moment after expressing it.</i>
right	Of or belonging to the political or intellectual right. My <b>right</b> elbow.
<u>righteous</u>	Morally right or justifiable. Victory in battle was conferred on the <b>righteous</b> .
rightness	According with conscience or morality. They argue for the moral <b>rightness</b> of overthrowing the leader by force.
