- ally** Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage.
*He s a good **ally** in fight.*
- associate** Meet or have dealings with someone regarded with disapproval.
*First was the lightning and then its thunderous **associate**.*
- association** The action of making a mental connection.
*His **association** of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.*
- combine** Combine so as to form a whole mix.
*These forces **combined** with others.*
- connection** A narcotics sale or purchase.
*Ensure that all **connections** between the wires are properly made.*
- contain** Include or contain have as a component.
*The government has already taken steps to **contain** the disease.*
- correlated** Mutually related.
- correlation** A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation.
*The increasingly similar basis underlying national soil maps allows **correlation** to take place more easily.*
- embedded** (of a phrase or clause) placed within another clause or sentence.
*Medical equipment using **embedded** controllers.*
- enclosed** Closed in or surrounded or included within.
*A dark **enclosed** space.*
- entail** The act of entailing property the creation of a fee tail from a fee simple.
*The spinning mills were not part of the **entail**.*

entangle	Involve (someone) in difficulties or complicated circumstances from which it is difficult to escape. <i>They were suspicious of becoming entangled in a civil war.</i>
<u>implicate</u>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. <i>Viruses are known to be implicated in the development of certain cancers.</i>
include	Specifically exclude someone from a group or activity. <i>We have included some hints for beginners in this section.</i>
included	Contained as part of a whole being considered. <i>Service tax included.</i>
inclusion	The practice or policy of providing equal access to opportunities and resources for people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalized, such as those who have physical or mental disabilities and members of other minority groups. <i>An inclusion in the cytoplasm of the cell.</i>
incorporate	Having a bodily form; embodied. <i>Through an incorporate resilience slighted confidence restores itself.</i>
<u>involve</u>	Require as useful, just, or proper. <i>Her husband had been very involved in his work.</i>
<u>involved</u>	Emotionally involved. <i>The problems involved.</i>
join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>The tap was joined to a pipe.</i>
<u>pertain</u>	Be appropriate, related, or applicable to. <i>My remark pertained to your earlier comments.</i>
positively	So as to be positive; in a positive manner. <i>The negotiations started positively with agreement on several issues.</i>
referent	Something referred to; the object of a reference. <i>The Morning Star and the Evening Star have the same referent the planet Venus.</i>
<u>relate</u>	Give an account of. <i>People who are distantly related.</i>
related	Belonging to the same family, group, or type; connected. <i>Related to micelle formation is the ability of detergent actives to congregate at oil water interfaces.</i>
relation	A person related by blood or marriage. <i>He has distant relations back in New Jersey.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a united front.</i>
