### Definitions of "Correspondence" as a noun

### [accord](#)

Concurrence of opinion.  
*We are in **accord** with your proposal.*

### [accordance](#)

Concurrence of opinion.  
*The **accordance** to Canada of rights of access.*

### [affinity](#)

(biology) state of relationship between organisms or groups of organisms resulting in resemblance in structure or structural parts.  
*The bacterial proteins bind to these molecules with high **affinity**.*

### [agreement](#)

Harmony or accordance in opinion or feeling.  
***Agreement** between experimental observations and theory.*

### [balance](#)

A weight that balances another weight.  
*Try to keep a **balance** between work and relaxation.*

<b><u>coincidence</u></b>	The presence of ionizing particles or other objects in two or more detectors simultaneously, or of two or more signals simultaneously in a circuit. <i>It was a <b>coincidence</b> that she was wearing a jersey like Laura s.</i>
<b>commensurateness</b>	A statement that expresses a personal opinion or belief or adds information.
<b>communication</b>	Something that is communicated by or to or between people or groups. <i>She gave him some hope of her return or at least of their future <b>communication</b>.</i>
<b>comparability</b>	The fact or quality of being similar and able to be compared. <i>There are differences in hospital recording practices that will affect the <b>comparability</b> of results.</i>
<b>compatibility</b>	A state in which two things are able to exist or occur together without problems or conflict. <i>Software <b>compatibility</b> is another important factor to consider.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	A point at which three or more lines meet. <i>The number of possible <b>concurrences</b> in the diagram.</i>
<b><u>conformity</u></b>	Orthodoxy in thoughts and belief. <i><b>Conformity</b> to regulations.</i>
<b>congruity</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
<b><u>consistency</u></b>	The way in which a substance holds together; thickness or viscosity. <i>The sauce has the <b>consistency</b> of creamed butter.</i>
<b>correlation</b>	A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation. <i>What is the <b>correlation</b> between those two variables.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	Compatibility in opinion and action. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>letter writing</b>	The conventional characters of the alphabet used to represent speech.
<b>mail</b>	Email. <i>In England they call <b>mail</b> the post.</i>
<b>parallelism</b>	The use of parallel processing. <i><b>Parallelism</b> suggests a connection of meaning through an echo of form.</i>
<b>proportionateness</b>	The quality or fact of being proportionate.

<b><u>resemblance</u></b>	Similarity in appearance or external or superficial details. <i>They bear some <b>resemblance</b> to Italian figurines.</i>
<b>similarity</b>	A similar feature or aspect. <i>The <b>similarity</b> of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.</i>
<b>symmetricalness</b>	(mathematics) an attribute of a shape or relation; exact reflection of form on opposite sides of a dividing line or plane.
<b><u>symmetry</u></b>	The quality of being made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an axis. <i>The political <b>symmetry</b> between the two debates.</i>
<b><u>uniformity</u></b>	The quality or state of being uniform. <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural <b>uniformity</b>.</i>
<b>writing</b>	Handwriting. <i>Parents want schools to concentrate on reading <b>writing</b> and arithmetic.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Correspondence" as a noun

- *There is a simple correspondence between the distance of a focused object from the eye and the size of its image on the retina.*
- *Sophie wrote a letter to Rosamund, with whom she kept up a regular correspondence.*
- *His wife dealt with his private correspondence.*
- *The organization engaged in detailed correspondence with local MPs.*
- *The results of two tests were in correspondence.*



## Associations of "Correspondence" (30 Words)

<b>addressee</b>	The person to whom something is addressed. <i>The contents of the letters were calculated to cause distress to the individual <b>addressee</b>.</i>
<b>airmail</b>	Send or transport by airmail. <i>Letters to Europe from the U S are best <b>airmailed</b>.</i>
<b>bulletin</b>	Make public by bulletin.
<b>communication</b>	A letter or message containing information or news. <i>Satellite <b>communications</b>.</i>
<b>consignee</b>	The person to whom merchandise is delivered over.

<b><u>convey</u></b>	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere. <i>Pipes were laid to <b>convey</b> water to the house.</i>
<b><u>deliverable</u></b>	Able to be delivered. <i>The company's primary method of measuring customer feedback on <b>deliverables</b>.</i>
<b>email</b>	Send a message by email. <i>I got three <b>emails</b> from my mother today.</i>
<b><u>envelope</u></b>	The bag containing the gas in a balloon. <i>The external <b>envelope</b> of the swimming pool.</i>
<b><u>interact</u></b>	Act together or towards others or with others. <i>He should <b>interact</b> more with his colleagues.</i>
<b>letter</b>	Inscribe letters or writing on. <i>The officer in the incident got in trouble for following the <b>letter</b> of the law.</i>
<b>mail</b>	A vehicle such as a train carrying mail. <i>He works for the United States <b>mail</b> service.</i>
<b>mailbox</b>	A computer file in which email messages received by a particular user are stored.
<b>message</b>	Send a message. <i>He sent a three word <b>message</b>.</i>
<b><u>messenger</u></b>	Send a document or package by messenger. <i>Could you have it <b>messengered</b> over to me.</i>
<b>philately</b>	The collection and study of postage stamps.
<b>post</b>	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>I'll <b>post</b> an article next week revealing the results of the poll.</i>
<b>postage</b>	The amount required to send a letter or parcel by post. <i>Proof of <b>postage</b> is required.</i>
<b>postal</b>	Done by post. <i><b>Postal</b> services.</i>
<b>postcard</b>	A card for sending a message by post without an envelope, typically having a photograph or other illustration on one side. <i>He promised to send me a picture <b>postcard</b>.</i>
<b>postmaster</b>	A man in charge of a post office.
<b>postscript</b>	A note appended to a letter after the signature. <i>As a <b>postscript</b> to this Paul did finally marry.</i>
<b><u>respond</u></b>	Respond favorably or as hoped. <i>His back injury has failed to <b>respond</b> to treatment.</i>

<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> me your latest results.</i>
<b>sender</b>	A person who sends or transmits a message, letter, email, etc. <i><b>Senders</b> of unwanted emails.</i>
<b>spam</b>	A tinned meat product made mainly from ham. <i>An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.</i>
<a href="#"><u>symmetry</u></a>	The quality of being made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an axis. <i>This series has a line of <b>symmetry</b> through its centre.</i>
<b>telegraphic</b>	Of or by a telegraph or telegram. <i>The strange <b>telegraphic</b> speech of some aphasics.</i>
<a href="#"><u>transmit</u></a>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i><b>Transmit</b> a message.</i>
<b>transport</b>	A convict who was transported to a penal colony. <i>The invasion force sailed from Cadiz in twenty five <b>transports</b>.</i>
