- *Give evidence for.*
- *Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts.*

| ratify | Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i> |
| <u>substantiate</u> | Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>The painting substantiates the feelings of the artist.</i> |
| support | Be the physical support of carry the weight of. <i>He supported me with one hand while I balanced on the beam.</i> |
| <u>sustain</u> | Uphold, affirm, or confirm the justice or validity of. <i>He sustained the role of Creon with burly resilience.</i> |
| <u>underpin</u> | Support from beneath. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i> |
| validate | Declare or make legally valid. <i>Without Patti to validate my feelings they seemed not to exist.</i> |
| verify | To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>Verify a claim.</i> |

| claim | Ask for legally or make a legal claim to as of debts for example. <i>The attacks claimed the lives of five people.</i> |
| confirm | Administer the rite of confirmation to. <i>If these fears are confirmed the outlook for the economy will be dire.</i> |
| corrigible | Capable of being corrected, rectified, or reformed. <i>A corrigible prisoner.</i> |
| corroboration | Evidence which confirms or supports a statement, theory, or finding; confirmation. <i>There is no independent corroboration for this.</i> |
| corroborative | Serving to support or corroborate. |
| documentation | The process of classifying and annotating texts, photographs, etc. <i>His documentation of the results was excellent.</i> |
| <u>dogmatic</u> | Of or pertaining to or characteristic of a doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>She was not tempted to be dogmatic about what she believed.</i> |
| favour | An act of gracious kindness. <i>Training is looked upon with favour by many employers.</i> |
| <u>invalidate</u> | Take away the legal force of or render ineffective. <i>A technical flaw in her papers invalidated her nomination.</i> |
| <u>justify</u> | Defend, explain, clear away, or make excuses for by reasoning. <i>Justify the margins.</i> |
| proponent | A person who pleads for a cause or propounds an idea. <i>A strong proponent of the free market and liberal trade policies.</i> |
| prove | Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>She displayed an ingenuousness which sprung from a yearning need to prove herself.</i> |
| <u>rationalize</u> | Think rationally; employ logic or reason. <i>We rationalized the factory's production and raised profits.</i> |
| reassert | Assert again. <i>He moved quickly to reassert his control.</i> |
