astronomy	The branch of science which deals with celestial objects, space, and the physical universe as a whole.
cosmic	Inconceivably extended in space or time. Cosmic matter.
cosmogony	The branch of science that deals with the origin of the universe, especially the solar system. <i>Today the central questions of cosmology and cosmogony are being explored within the framework of the Big Bang theory.</i>
cosmography	The branch of science which deals with the general features of the universe, including the earth. <i>He published a series of elementary textbooks on cosmography trigonometry and astronomy 1651.</i>
cosmology	The science of the origin and development of the universe Modern cosmology is dominated by the Big Bang theory which brings together observational astronomy and particle physics.
equinox	Either of the two celestial points at which the celestial equator intersects the ecliptic.
global	Having the shape of a sphere or ball. Global monetary policy.
horoscope	A forecast of a person's future, typically including a delineation of character and circumstances, based on the relative positions of the stars and planets at the time of that person's birth. <i>He gave lectures on astrology and cast horoscopes in his spare time.</i>
internationally	In, between, or among many different nations. <i>The trial attracted attention both locally and internationally.</i>
macrocosm	The whole of a complex structure, especially the world or the universe, contrasted with a small or representative part of it.
observatory	A building designed and equipped to observe astronomical phenomena.
planetarium	A building housing an instrument for projecting the positions of the planets onto a domed ceiling.
planetary	Relating to the earth as a planet. <i>The planetary tilt.</i>
sidereal	Determined by daily motion of the stars.
spacecraft	A vehicle used for travelling in space.
spaceman	An astronaut.
spaceship	A spacecraft designed to carry a crew into interstellar space (especially in science fiction).
