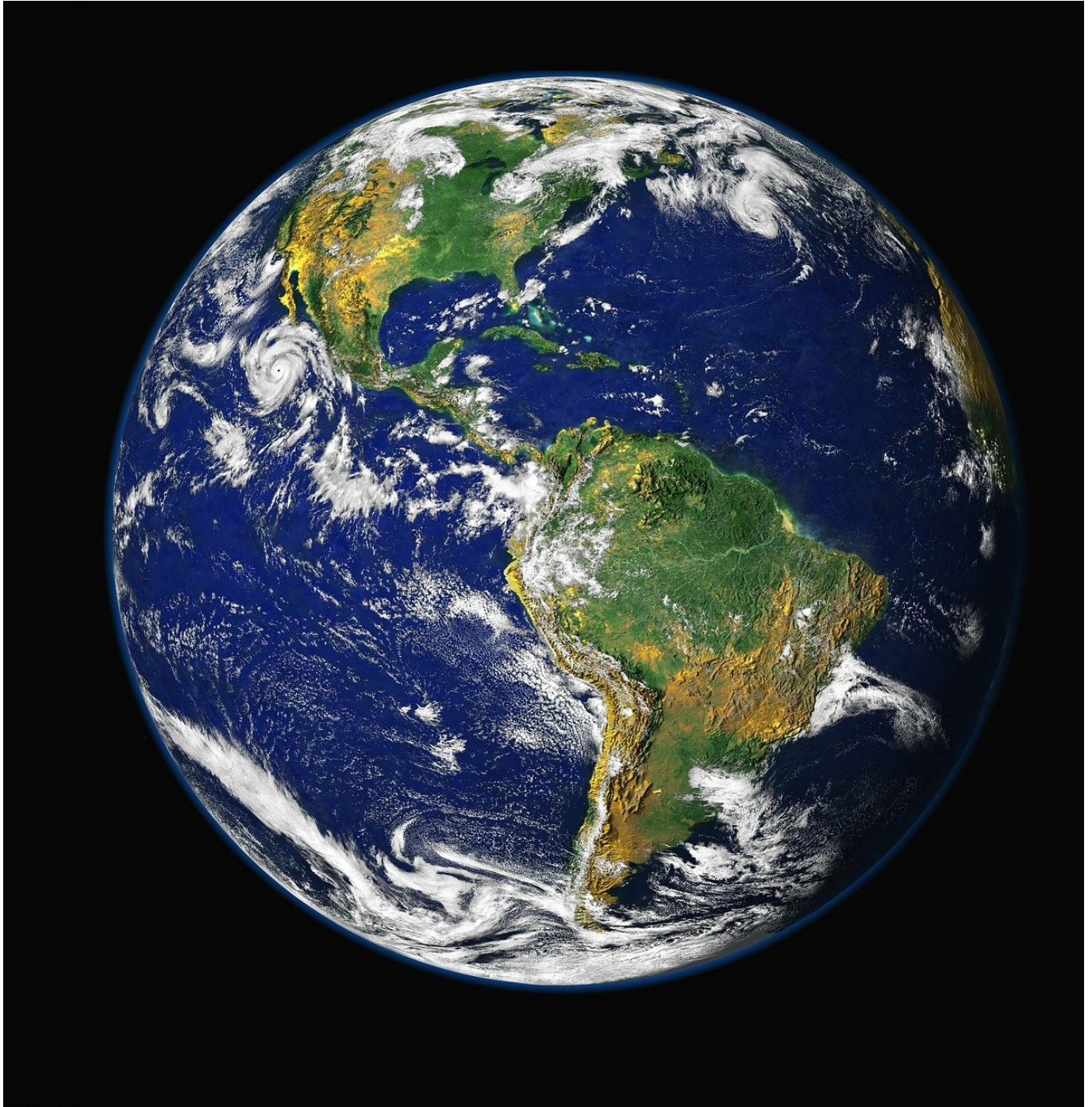

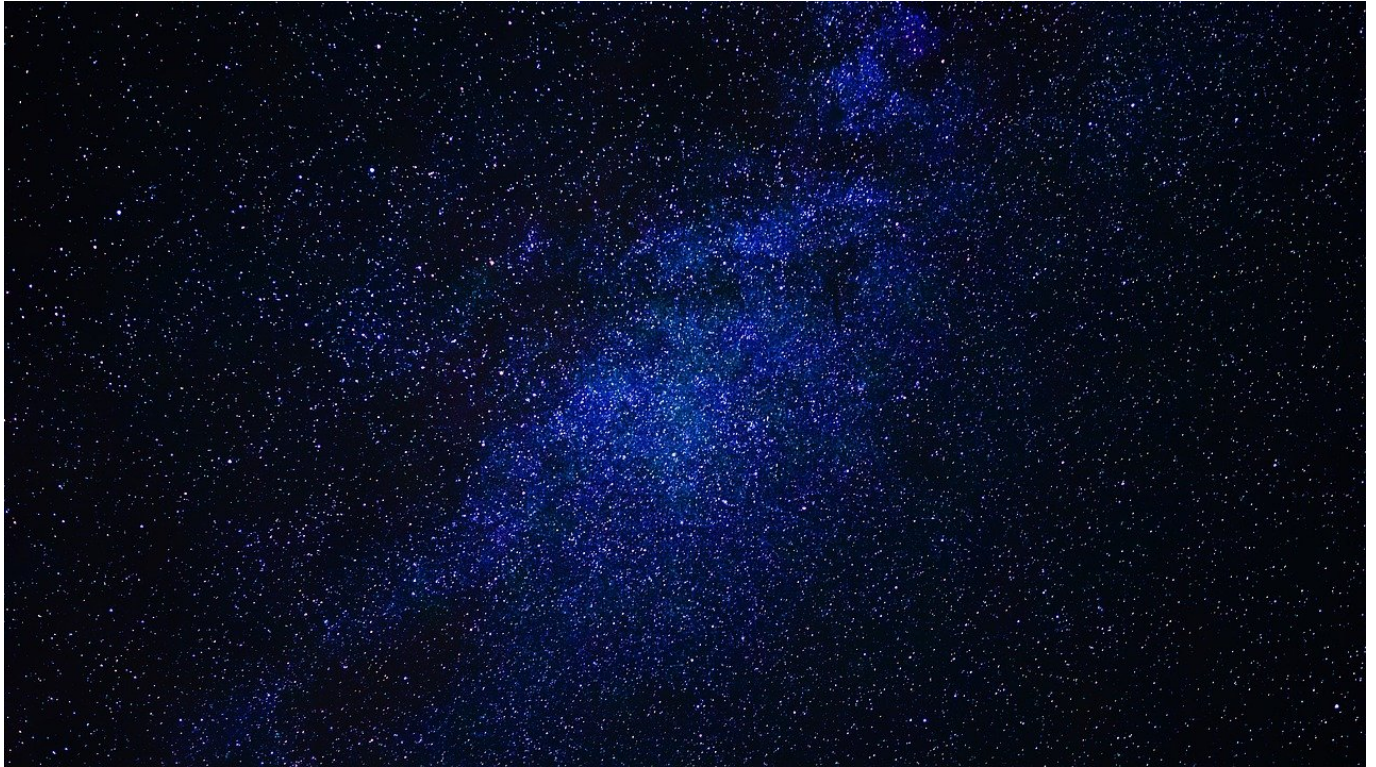
<b>creation</b>	A thing which has been made or invented, especially something showing artistic talent. <i><b>Creation</b> of a coalition government.</i>
<b>existence</b>	Something that exists; a being. <i>Laws in <b>existence</b> for centuries.</i>
<b>macrocosm</b>	Everything that exists anywhere.
<b>space</b>	An area reserved for some particular purpose. <i>The architect left <b>space</b> in front of the building.</i>
<b>the firmament</b>	The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected.
<b>the heavens</b>	Any place of complete bliss and delight and peace.
<u><b>totality</b></u>	The whole amount. <i>The <b>totality</b> of their current policies.</i>
<u><b>universe</b></u>	All existing matter and space considered as a whole the cosmos The universe is believed to be at least 10 billion light years in diameter and contains a vast number of galaxies it has been expanding since its creation in the Big Bang about 13 billion years ago. <i>They study the evolution of the <b>universe</b>.</i>
<b>whole world</b>	All of something including all its component elements or parts.
<b>world</b>	All of the people and societies on the earth. <i>The whole <b>world</b> hates a Monday.</i>

### asterisk

Mark with an asterisk.

### astral

Relating to a supposed non-physical realm of existence to which various psychic and paranormal phenomena are ascribed, and in which the physical human body is said to have a counterpart.

*An **astral** body.*

### **astrologer**

Someone who predicts the future by the positions of the planets and sun and Moon.

*He was advised by **astrologers** to delay his departure.*

### astrology

A pseudoscience claiming divination by the positions of the planets and sun and moon.

### astronaut

A person trained to travel in a spacecraft.

*The Russians called their **astronauts** cosmonauts.*

### **astronomer**

A physicist who studies astronomy.

### astronomical

Inconceivably large.

*He wanted an **astronomical** fee.*



<b>astronomy</b>	The branch of science which deals with celestial objects, space, and the physical universe as a whole.
<b><u>cosmic</u></b>	Inconceivably extended in space or time. <b><i>Cosmic matter.</i></b>
<b>cosmogony</b>	The branch of science that deals with the origin of the universe, especially the solar system. <i>Today the central questions of cosmology and <b>cosmogony</b> are being explored within the framework of the Big Bang theory.</i>
<b>cosmography</b>	The branch of science which deals with the general features of the universe, including the earth. <i>He published a series of elementary textbooks on <b>cosmography</b> trigonometry and astronomy 1651.</i>
<b>cosmology</b>	The science of the origin and development of the universe Modern cosmology is dominated by the Big Bang theory which brings together observational astronomy and particle physics.
<b>equinox</b>	Either of the two celestial points at which the celestial equator intersects the ecliptic.
<b><u>global</u></b>	Having the shape of a sphere or ball. <b><i>Global monetary policy.</i></b>
<b>horoscope</b>	A forecast of a person's future, typically including a delineation of character and circumstances, based on the relative positions of the stars and planets at the time of that person's birth. <i>He gave lectures on astrology and cast <b>horoscopes</b> in his spare time.</i>
<b>internationally</b>	In, between, or among many different nations. <i>The trial attracted attention both locally and <b>internationally</b>.</i>
<b>macrocosm</b>	The whole of a complex structure, especially the world or the universe, contrasted with a small or representative part of it.
<b>observatory</b>	A building designed and equipped to observe astronomical phenomena.
<b>planetarium</b>	A building housing an instrument for projecting the positions of the planets onto a domed ceiling.
<b>planetary</b>	Relating to the earth as a planet. <i>The <b>planetary</b> tilt.</i>
<b>sidereal</b>	Determined by daily motion of the stars.
<b>spacecraft</b>	A vehicle used for travelling in space.
<b>spaceman</b>	An astronaut.
<b>spaceship</b>	A spacecraft designed to carry a crew into interstellar space (especially in science fiction).

star

A star shaped symbol used to indicate a category of excellence.  
*Beckham **starred** in the win over Leeds.*

stellar

Being or relating to or resembling or emanating from stars.  
*A **stellar** cast had been assembled.*

telescope

Make smaller or shorter.  
*My hiking sticks **telescope** and can be put into the backpack.*

universal

A thing having universal effect currency or application.  
*In motor vehicles a **universal** joint allows the driveshaft to move up and down as the vehicle passes over bumps.*

universe

All existing matter and space considered as a whole the cosmos The universe is believed to be at least 10 billion light years in diameter and contains a vast number of galaxies it has been expanding since its creation in the Big Bang about 13 billion years ago.
