alliance	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>His party is in alliance with the Greens.</i>
band	A plain ring for the finger, especially a gold wedding ring. <i>Look for a leg band on the osprey.</i>
brotherhood	The relationship between brothers. <i>A religious brotherhood.</i>
cabal	A plot to carry out some harmful or illegal act (especially a political plot). <i>A cabal of dissidents.</i>

<u>camp</u>	A group of people living together in a camp. <i>Both the liberal and conservative camps were annoyed by his high handed manner.</i>
caucus	An informal group composed of legislators who have shared concerns or interests. <i>She is renowned for her ability to unite her caucus.</i>
<u>cell</u>	The local area covered by one of the short range transmitters in a cellular telephone system. <i>Terrorist cells.</i>
<u>circle</u>	Something approximating the shape of a circle. <i>The lamp spread a circle of light.</i>
<u>clan</u>	A large family. <i>The Watts clan is one of racing s oldest families.</i>
clique	A small close-knit group of people who do not readily allow others to join them. <i>The old school clique.</i>
<u>club</u>	The premises used by a particular club. <i>The club scene.</i>
community	(ecology) a group of interdependent organisms inhabiting the same region and interacting with each other. <i>The preachers and the bootleggers found they had a community of interests.</i>
<u>crew</u>	A group of people who work on and operate a ship, aircraft, etc. <i>A crew of assorted computer geeks.</i>
crowd	An audience, especially one at a sporting event. <i>He d become just another face in the crowd.</i>
<u>faction</u>	A clique (often secret) that seeks power usually through intrigue. <i>A council increasingly split by faction.</i>
fellowship	An association of people who share common beliefs or activities. <i>The church welcomed new members into its fellowship.</i>
fraternity	A group of people sharing a common profession or interests. <i>The medical fraternity.</i>
<u>gang</u>	An organized group of people doing manual work. <i>Gang warfare.</i>
ingroup	An exclusive circle of people with a common purpose.
junta	A deliberative or administrative council in Spain or Portugal. <i>The country s ruling military junta.</i>

league	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>Austin s in a league of his own.</i>
nucleus	The center of the head of a comet; consists of small solid particles of ice and frozen gas that vaporizes on approaching the sun to form the coma and tail. <i>The nucleus of a British film producing industry.</i>
pack	A quantity of fish fruit or other foods packed or canned in a particular season. <i>Japanese cars are ahead of the pack in this category.</i>
sect	A dissenting clique. <i>A sect of anarchists.</i>
set	(psychology) being temporarily ready to respond in a particular way. <i>The early sets ran on storage batteries.</i>
sorority	A society for female students in a university or college.
syndicate	An association or agency supplying material simultaneously to a number of newspapers or periodicals. <i>A crime syndicate.</i>

Associations of "Coterie" (30 Words)

band	Put a band on a bird for identification. <i>Channels in the UHF band.</i>
bivouac	Stay in a bivouac. <i>We bivouacked on the north side of the town.</i>
bonfire	A large open-air fire used for burning rubbish or as part of a celebration. <i>The smell of burning leaves from a garden bonfire.</i>
camp	Establish or set up a camp. <i>The press will be camping on your doorstep once they get on to this story.</i>
camping	The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp. <i>A camping trip.</i>
campsite	A site where people on holiday can pitch a tent.
clique	An exclusive circle of people with a common purpose. <i>His flat became a haven for a clique of young men of similar tastes.</i>

clump	Form a clump or clumps. <i>Clumps of earth.</i>
<u>cluster</u>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Clusters of the disease have been reported leading to speculation about person to person transmission.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A preview of their autumn collection.</i>
covey	A small flock of grouse or partridge. <i>Coveys of actors rushed through the rooms.</i>
encamp	Settle in or establish a camp. <i>We encamped for the night by a river.</i>
encampment	The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp. <i>A Bedouin encampment.</i>
environmentalist	A person who is concerned about protecting the environment. <i>The environmentalist movement.</i>
forest	Establish a forest on previously unforested land. <i>A pine forest.</i>
friend	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>They are friends of the library.</i>
<u>gang</u>	Of a number of people form a group or gang. <i>They ganged up on me and nicked my pocket money.</i>
group	Arrange into a group or groups. <i>Growers began to group together to form cooperatives.</i>
hammock	A hanging bed of canvas or rope netting (usually suspended between two trees); swings easily.
house	The people living in a house a household. <i>A hundred musicians performed in front of a full house.</i>
hovel	An open shed or outhouse, used for sheltering cattle or storing grain or tools. <i>People were living in rat infested hovels.</i>
<u>hut</u>	Provide with huts. <i>A beach hut.</i>
<u>mountain</u>	A land mass that projects well above its surroundings; higher than a hill. <i>A mountain of paperwork.</i>

<u>outside</u>	Outside a building. <i>The outside lane.</i>
posse	A group of people who have a common characteristic or occupation. <i>The followers of the so called Techno phenomenon the vibed up whistle posse.</i>
shanty	Small crude shelter used as a dwelling.
<u>tent</u>	A web that resembles a tent or carpet. <i>Tim tented his fingers.</i>
tepee	A Native American tent; usually of conical shape.
tipi	A Native American tent; usually of conical shape.
<u>vacation</u>	Spend or take a vacation. <i>I was vacationing in Europe with my family.</i>
