advice	Information; news. <i>On their solicitors advice the trustees have accepted 577 000 by way of compensation.</i>
advocate	A person who puts a case on someone else's behalf. <i>Care managers can become advocates for their clients.</i>
barrister	A person called to the bar and entitled to practise as an advocate, particularly in the higher courts.
<u>conference</u>	A prearranged meeting for consultation or exchange of information or discussion (especially one with a formal agenda). <i>An international conference on the environment.</i>
consultation	The act of referring or consulting. <i>A consultation with a homeopathic doctor.</i>
conversation	The use of speech for informal exchange of views or ideas or information etc. <i>The two men were deep in conversation.</i>
counseling	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.

counsellor	Someone who gives advice about problems. <i>A marriage counsellor.</i>
counselor	Someone who gives advice about problems.
counselor-at-law	The learned profession that is mastered by graduate study in a law school and that is responsible for the judicial system.
<u>deliberation</u>	Planning something carefully and intentionally. <i>It was the deliberation of his act that was insulting.</i>
<u>dialogue</u>	A conversation between two or more people as a feature of a book, play, or film. <i>Interfaith dialogue.</i>
direction	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>He looked the other direction.</i>
discussion	An extended communication (often interactive) dealing with some particular topic. <i>The book contains an excellent discussion of modal logic.</i>
enlightenment	The beatitude that transcends the cycle of reincarnation; characterized by the extinction of desire and suffering and individual consciousness. <i>Robbie looked to me for enlightenment.</i>
guidance	The directing of the motion or position of something, especially an aircraft, spacecraft, or missile. <i>A laser guidance system.</i>
information	In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>Genetically transmitted information.</i>
instruction	(computer science) a line of code written as part of a computer program. <i>Always study the instructions supplied.</i>
<u>lawyer</u>	A person who practises or studies law, especially (in the UK) a solicitor or a barrister or (in the US) an attorney.
pleader	A lawyer who pleads cases in court.

- *Give advice to (someone).*



Synonyms of "Counsel" as a verb (11 Words)

<u>admonish</u>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>He admonished the child for his bad behavior.</i>
advise	Recommend. <i>I advised him that the rent was due.</i>
caution	Warn or advise against (doing something). <i>Having cautioned her the police were ready to take her away for questioning.</i>
direct	Aim something in a particular direction or at a particular person. <i>He directed that no picture from his collection could be sold.</i>
encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>The intention is to encourage new writing talent.</i>
<u>entreat</u>	Ask earnestly or anxiously for (something). <i>A message had been sent entreating aid for the Navahos.</i>

guide	Use as a guide. <i>He guided her to the front row and sat beside her.</i>
recommend	Express a good opinion of. <i>A book I recommended to a friend of mine.</i>
rede	Give advice to. <i>Therefore my son I rede thee stay at home.</i>
urge	Encourage someone to continue or succeed. <i>I urged him to finish his studies.</i>
warn	Notify of danger, potential harm, or risk. <i>Police warned people not to keep large amounts of cash in their homes.</i>



Usage Examples of "Counsel" as a verb

- *The athlete's coach counselled caution.*
- *The lawyer counselled me when I was accused of tax fraud.*
- *Careers officers should counsel young people in making their career decisions.*
- *He was being counselled for depression.*

- *The teacher counsels troubled students.*
- *He was counselled by his supporters to return to Germany.*

evaluator	A person who assesses the amount, extent, or value of something. <i>The government appointed an independent evaluator to determine the value of the mine.</i>
exhort	Force or impel in an indicated direction. <i>Come on you guys exhorted Linda.</i>
guidance	The directing of the motion or position of something, especially an aircraft, spacecraft, or missile. <i>A laser guidance system.</i>
healer	Something that alleviates distress or anguish. <i>His parents consulted a traditional healer for help.</i>
hortative	Giving strong encouragement.
hortatory	Giving strong encouragement. <i>A series of hortatory epistles.</i>
maxim	A saying that is widely accepted on its own merits. <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i>

psychiatrist	A medical practitioner specializing in the diagnosis and treatment of mental illness.
recommend	Advise (someone) to do something. <i>George had recommended some local architects.</i>
recommendation	Something (as a course of action) that is recommended as advisable. <i>Her pleasant personality is already a recommendation.</i>
teach	A teacher. <i>She teaches me French.</i>
<u>therapist</u>	A person who treats psychological problems a psychotherapist. <i>A certified massage therapist.</i>
warning	Serving to warn. <i>The warning was to beware of surprises.</i>
