<b>makeweight</b>	Anything added to fill out a whole. <i>He has waited a long time to establish himself after two years as squad <b>makeweight</b>.</i>
<b>offset</b>	A bend in a pipe to carry it past an obstacle. <i><b>Offset</b> adjustment circuits.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	Payment or reward (as for service rendered). <i>Substantial damages were paid in <b>recompense</b>.</i>
<b>stabilizer</b>	A device for making something stable. <i>The role of taxes and public spending as automatic <b>stabilizers</b> in modern economies.</i>

<b>countervail</b>	Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions. <i>Stereotypes are <b>countervailed</b> by more realistic assessments.</i>
<a href="#"><u>equalize</u></a>	Make the same in quantity, size, or degree throughout a place or group. <i>Let s <b>equalize</b> the duties among all employees in this office.</i>

<b>even off</b>	Make even or more even.
<b>even out</b>	Make level or straight.
<b>even up</b>	Make even or more even.
<b>finance</b>	Obtain or provide money for. <i>The health service is <b>financed</b> almost entirely by the taxpayer.</i>
<b>fund</b>	Place or store up in a fund for accumulation. <i>The government <b>funds</b> basic research in many areas.</i>
<b>have enough money for</b>	Suffer from; be ill with.
<b>make up</b>	Form by assembling individuals or constituents.
<b>make up for</b>	Charge with a function; charge to be.
<b>negate</b>	Prove negative; show to be false. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b><u>neutralize</u></b>	Get rid of (someone who may be a threat) by killing. <i>Splashes on skin should be <b>neutralized</b> immediately.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b><u>offset</u></b>	Create an offset in. <i>Several places where the ridge was <b>offset</b> at right angles to its length.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Set into opposition or rivalry. <i>The board <b>opposed</b> his motion.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Give what is due or deserved to. <i>It <b>pays</b> to choose varieties carefully.</i>

<b>equilibrium</b>	A stable situation in which forces cancel one another. <i>Ice is in <b>equilibrium</b> with water.</i>
<b>equipoise</b>	Equality of distribution. <i>Capital flows act as an <b>equipoise</b> to international imbalances in savings.</i>
<b>equity</b>	The quality of being fair and impartial. <i><b>Equity</b> of treatment.</i>
<b>even</b>	Make or become even. <i>He knows <b>even</b> less about it than I do.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>He believes he has a <b>fair</b> chance of success.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>The <b>impartial</b> eye of a scientist.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>

<b><u>justice</u></b>	A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>A tragic miscarriage of <b>justice</b>.</i>
<b><u>lithograph</u></b>	A print produced by lithography. <i>He <b>lithographed</b> the diploma leaving only two blanks one for the name of the recipient and the other for the date.</i>
<b><u>negate</u></b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>This action will <b>negate</b> the effect of my efforts.</i>
<b><u>neutral</u></b>	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i><b>Neutral</b> soil conditions.</i>
<b><u>neutrality</u></b>	PH value of 7. <i>The structure has overall electrical <b>neutrality</b>.</i>
<b><u>neutralize</u></b>	(in military or espionage contexts) used euphemistically to refer to killing or destruction. <i>Impatience at his frailty began to <b>neutralize</b> her fear.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Declare invalid. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby <b>nullify</b> the effects of training.</i>
<b><u>objectivity</u></b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>
<b><u>offset</u></b>	Produce by offset printing. <i><b>Offset</b> adjustment circuits.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Travel or move over. <i>The House vote in favour of the bill was 10 votes short of the requisite majority for an <b>override</b>.</i>
<b><u>rationalism</u></b>	The practice of treating reason as the ultimate authority in religion. <i>Scientific <b>rationalism</b>.</i>
<b><u>rescind</u></b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b><u>same</u></b>	Same in identity. <i>The very <b>same</b> people who practised all the rules are now the most sceptical.</i>
<b><u>symmetry</u></b>	A law or operation where a physical property or process has an equivalence in two or more directions. <i>The political <b>symmetry</b> between the two debates.</i>
<b><u>withdrawal</u></b>	The action of ceasing to participate in an activity. <i>The <b>withdrawal</b> of French troops from Vietnam.</i>
