Something having the property of being analogous to something else.  
*Thioacids are sulphur **analogues** of oxyacids.*

### [brother](#)

A man or boy in relation to other sons and daughters of his parents.  
*The machine is almost identical to its larger **brother**.*

### **carbon**

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond occurs in all organic compounds.

*The level of **carbon** in the atmosphere has been consistently rising.*

### **carbon copy**

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms: amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond; occurs in all organic compounds.

<b><u>complement</u></b>	One or more words phrases or clauses governed by a verb or by a nominalization or a predicative adjective that complete the meaning of the predicate In generative grammar all the constituents of a sentence that are governed by a verb form the complement. <i>A fine wine is a perfect <b>complement</b> to the dinner.</i>
<b>copy</b>	A thing made to be similar or identical to another thing. <i>The clone was a <b>copy</b> of its ancestor.</i>
<b>correlative</b>	A word or concept that has a mutual relationship with another word or concept. <i>The child s right to education is a <b>correlative</b> of the parent s duty to send the child to school.</i>
<b>equal</b>	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>Entertainment facilities without <b>equal</b> in the British Isles.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	A person or thing that is equal to or corresponds with another in value, amount, function, meaning, etc. <i>The French <b>equivalent</b> of the Bank of England.</i>
<b>facsimile</b>	An exact copy or reproduction. <i>A <b>facsimile</b> of the manuscript.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A person in the same position, involved in the same activity, or otherwise associated with another. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>
<b>match</b>	The score needed to win a match. <i>They were no <b>match</b> for the mercenaries.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>He lost the <b>mate</b> to his shoe.</i>
<b>mimeo</b>	A rotary duplicator that uses a stencil through which ink is pressed (trade mark Roneo).
<b>mimeograph</b>	A copy produced on a mimeograph.
<b>opposite number</b>	A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word, in which case the two words are antonyms of each other.
<b><u>parallel</u></b>	Two parallel lines as a reference mark. <i>A challenge which has no <b>parallel</b> in peacetime this century.</i>
<b><u>peer</u></b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.
<b>photocopy</b>	A photographic copy of printed or written material produced by a process involving the action of light on a specially prepared surface.



<b>reprint</b>	<p>A publication such as a book that is reprinted without changes or editing and offered again for sale. <i>The publishers had nearly sold out of the initial run of copies and ordered a <b>reprint</b>.</i></p>
<b>similitude</b>	<p>The quality or state of being similar to something. <i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply <b>similitude</b>.</i></p>
<a href="#"><u>sister</u></a>	<p>A senior female nurse, typically in charge of a ward. <i>The <b>sisters</b> announced that there would be a special rosary every morning.</i></p>
<a href="#"><u>twin</u></a>	<p>A twin engined aircraft. <i>Experiments were carried out using sets of identical <b>twins</b>.</i></p>
<b>vis-a-vis</b>	<p>Small sofa that seats two people.</p>

<b><u>adversely</u></b>	In a way that prevents success or development; harmfully or unfavourably. <i>His self confidence was <b>adversely</b> affected for years to come.</i>
<b><u>antithesis</u></b>	A person or thing that is the direct opposite of someone or something else. <i>His theory is the <b>antithesis</b> of mine.</i>
<b>antithetic</b>	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Practices entirely <b>antithetic</b> to her professed beliefs.</i>
<b>antithetical</b>	Connected with, containing, or using the rhetorical device of antithesis. <i>Practices entirely <b>antithetical</b> to her professed beliefs.</i>
<b>challenger</b>	A person who disputes the truth of or places themselves in opposition to something. <i>A serious <b>challenger</b> for the title.</i>
<b>compare</b>	Have a specified relationship with another thing or person in terms of nature or quality. <i>This car does not <b>compare</b> with our line of Mercedes.</i>
<b><u>compete</u></b>	Compete for something engage in a contest measure oneself against others. <i>He <b>competed</b> with a number of other candidates.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	A person who takes part in a sporting contest. <i>Two <b>competitors</b> were banned for taking drugs.</i>
<b><u>complement</u></b>	One or more words phrases or clauses governed by a verb or by a nominalization or a predicative adjective that complete the meaning of the predicate In generative grammar all the constituents of a sentence that are governed by a verb form the complement. <i>A classic blazer <b>complements</b> a look that s smart or casual.</i>
<b><u>contender</u></b>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>A presidential <b>contender</b>.</i>
<b><u>contradictory</u></b>	A contradictory proposition. <i>Perfect and imperfect are <b>contradictory</b> terms.</i>
<b><u>converse</u></b>	Of words so related that one reverses the relation denoted by the other. <i>It will be difficult in these <b>converses</b> not to talk of secular matter.</i>
<b>different</b>	Distinct or separate. <i>That s another or <b>different</b> issue altogether.</i>
<b>differently</b>	In another and different manner. <i>I think you will feel <b>differently</b> after you ve met her.</i>
<b><u>disagree</u></b>	Be different from one another. <i>The sea crossing <b>disagreed</b> with her.</i>

<b><u>dissent</u></b>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He was sent off for <b>dissent</b>.</i>
<b><u>dissident</u></b>	A person who opposes official policy, especially that of an authoritarian state. <i>A <b>dissident</b> who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i>The <b>enemy</b> shot down four helicopters.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	The atomic weight of an element that has the same combining capacity as a given weight of another element; the standard is 8 for oxygen. <i>One unit is <b>equivalent</b> to one glass of wine.</i>
<b>objector</b>	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i><b>Objectors</b> to the housing plans.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	A person who disagrees with or resists a proposal or practice. <i>He beat his <b>opponent</b> by a landslide margin.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Be against; express opposition to. <i>A candidate to <b>oppose</b> the leader in the presidential contest.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	Facing; opposite. <i>Opponent or <b>opposing</b> armies.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>The two chess kings are set up on squares of <b>opposite</b> colors.</i>
<b><u>opposition</u></b>	An armed adversary (especially a member of an opposing military force). <i>The <b>opposition</b> between practical and poetic language.</i>
<b><u>oxymoron</u></b>	A figure of speech in which apparently contradictory terms appear in conjunction (e.g. faith unfaithful kept him falsely true).
<b><u>parallel</u></b>	Mathematics one of a set of parallel geometric figures parallel lines or planes. <i>The road runs <b>parallel</b> to the Ottawa River.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>We are <b>rivaling</b> for first place in the race.</i>
<b><u>unlike</u></b>	Not like; different from. <i>He was very <b>unlike</b> to any other man.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
