- *A person or thing having the same function or characteristics as another.*

### [analogue](#)

Something having the property of being analogous to something else.  
*Thioacids are sulphur **analogues** of oxyacids.*

### [brother](#)

A man or boy in relation to other sons and daughters of his parents.  
*The machine is almost identical to its larger **brother**.*

### **carbon**

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond occurs in all organic compounds.

*The level of **carbon** in the atmosphere has been consistently rising.*

### **carbon copy**

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms: amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond; occurs in all organic compounds.

| <b>equal</b>             | A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.<br><i>Entertainment facilities without <b>equal</b> in the British Isles.</i>   |
| <b>equivalent</b>        | A person or thing that is equal to or corresponds with another in value, amount, function, meaning, etc.<br><i>The French <b>equivalent</b> of the Bank of England.</i>  |
| <b>facsimile</b>         | An exact copy or reproduction.<br><i>A <b>facsimile</b> of the manuscript.</i>   |
| <b><u>fellow</u></b>     | A person in the same position, involved in the same activity, or otherwise associated with another.<br><i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>   |
| <b>match</b>             | The score needed to win a match.<br><i>They were no <b>match</b> for the mercenaries.</i>  |
| <b>mate</b>              | South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate.<br><i>He lost the <b>mate</b> to his shoe.</i>   |
| <b>mimeo</b>             | A rotary duplicator that uses a stencil through which ink is pressed (trade mark Roneo).   |
| <b>mimeograph</b>        | A copy produced on a mimeograph.   |
| <b>opposite number</b>   | A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word, in which case the two words are antonyms of each other.  |
| <b><u>parallel</u></b>   | Two parallel lines as a reference mark.<br><i>A challenge which has no <b>parallel</b> in peacetime this century.</i>  |
| <b><u>peer</u></b>       | A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.  |
| <b>photocopy</b>         | A photographic copy of printed or written material produced by a process involving the action of light on a specially prepared surface.  |

| <a href="#"><u>sister</u></a> | A senior female nurse, typically in charge of a ward.<br><i>The <b>sisters</b> announced that there would be a special rosary every morning.</i>  |
| <a href="#"><u>twin</u></a>   | A twin engined aircraft.<br><i>Experiments were carried out using sets of identical <b>twins</b>.</i>   |

| <b><u>converse</u></b>      | Of words so related that one reverses the relation denoted by the other.<br><i>It will be difficult in these <b>converses</b> not to talk of secular matter.</i>  |
| <b>different</b>            | Distinct or separate.<br><i>That s another or <b>different</b> issue altogether.</i>  |
| <b>differently</b>          | In another and different manner.<br><i>I think you will feel <b>differently</b> after you ve met her.</i>   |

| <b>enemy</b>      | A personal enemy.<br><i>The <b>enemy</b> shot down four helicopters.</i>   |
| <b>equivalent</b> | The atomic weight of an element that has the same combining capacity as a given weight of another element; the standard is 8 for oxygen.<br><i>One unit is <b>equivalent</b> to one glass of wine.</i> |
