carbon

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond occurs in all organic compounds.


*The level of **carbon** in the atmosphere has been consistently rising.*

An abundant nonmetallic tetravalent element occurring in three allotropic forms: amorphous carbon and graphite and diamond; occurs in all organic compounds.

<u>complement</u>	One or more words phrases or clauses governed by a verb or by a nominalization or a predicative adjective that complete the meaning of the predicate In generative grammar all the constituents of a sentence that are governed by a verb form the complement. <i>A fine wine is a perfect complement to the dinner.</i>
copy	A thing made to be similar or identical to another thing. <i>The clone was a copy of its ancestor.</i>
correlative	A word or concept that has a mutual relationship with another word or concept. <i>The child s right to education is a correlative of the parent s duty to send the child to school.</i>
equal	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>Entertainment facilities without equal in the British Isles.</i>
equivalent	A person or thing that is equal to or corresponds with another in value, amount, function, meaning, etc. <i>The French equivalent of the Bank of England.</i>
facsimile	An exact copy or reproduction. <i>A facsimile of the manuscript.</i>
<u>fellow</u>	A person in the same position, involved in the same activity, or otherwise associated with another. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his fellows.</i>
match	The score needed to win a match. <i>They were no match for the mercenaries.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>He lost the mate to his shoe.</i>
mimeo	A rotary duplicator that uses a stencil through which ink is pressed (trade mark Roneo).
mimeograph	A copy produced on a mimeograph.
opposite number	A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word, in which case the two words are antonyms of each other.
<u>parallel</u>	Two parallel lines as a reference mark. <i>A challenge which has no parallel in peacetime this century.</i>
<u>peer</u>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.
photocopy	A photographic copy of printed or written material produced by a process involving the action of light on a specially prepared surface.

reprint	<p>A publication such as a book that is reprinted without changes or editing and offered again for sale.</p> <p><i>The publishers had nearly sold out of the initial run of copies and ordered a reprint.</i></p>
similitude	<p>The quality or state of being similar to something.</p> <p><i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply similitude.</i></p>
<u>sister</u>	<p>A senior female nurse, typically in charge of a ward.</p> <p><i>The sisters announced that there would be a special rosary every morning.</i></p>
<u>twin</u>	<p>A twin engined aircraft.</p> <p><i>Experiments were carried out using sets of identical twins.</i></p>
vis-a-vis	<p>Small sofa that seats two people.</p>

<u>adversely</u>	In a way that prevents success or development; harmfully or unfavourably. <i>His self confidence was adversely affected for years to come.</i>
<u>antithesis</u>	A person or thing that is the direct opposite of someone or something else. <i>His theory is the antithesis of mine.</i>
antithetic	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Practices entirely antithetic to her professed beliefs.</i>
antithetical	Connected with, containing, or using the rhetorical device of antithesis. <i>Practices entirely antithetical to her professed beliefs.</i>
challenger	A person who disputes the truth of or places themselves in opposition to something. <i>A serious challenger for the title.</i>
compare	Have a specified relationship with another thing or person in terms of nature or quality. <i>This car does not compare with our line of Mercedes.</i>

competitor	A person who takes part in a sporting contest. <i>Two competitors were banned for taking drugs.</i>
<u>complement</u>	One or more words phrases or clauses governed by a verb or by a nominalization or a predicative adjective that complete the meaning of the predicate In generative grammar all the constituents of a sentence that are governed by a verb form the complement. <i>A classic blazer complements a look that s smart or casual.</i>
<u>contender</u>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>A presidential contender.</i>
<u>contradictory</u>	A contradictory proposition. <i>Perfect and imperfect are contradictory terms.</i>
<u>converse</u>	Of words so related that one reverses the relation denoted by the other. <i>It will be difficult in these converses not to talk of secular matter.</i>
different	Distinct or separate. <i>That s another or different issue altogether.</i>
differently	In another and different manner. <i>I think you will feel differently after you ve met her.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	Be different from one another. <i>The sea crossing disagreed with her.</i>

<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He was sent off for dissent.</i>
<u>dissident</u>	A person who opposes official policy, especially that of an authoritarian state. <i>A dissident who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>The enemy shot down four helicopters.</i>
equivalent	The atomic weight of an element that has the same combining capacity as a given weight of another element; the standard is 8 for oxygen. <i>One unit is equivalent to one glass of wine.</i>
objector	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i>Objectors to the housing plans.</i>
opponent	A person who disagrees with or resists a proposal or practice. <i>He beat his opponent by a landslide margin.</i>
oppose	Be against; express opposition to. <i>A candidate to oppose the leader in the presidential contest.</i>
opposing	Facing; opposite. <i>Opponent or opposing armies.</i>
opposite	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>The two chess kings are set up on squares of opposite colors.</i>
<u>opposition</u>	An armed adversary (especially a member of an opposing military force). <i>The opposition between practical and poetic language.</i>
<u>oxymoron</u>	A figure of speech in which apparently contradictory terms appear in conjunction (e.g. faith unfaithful kept him falsely true).
<u>parallel</u>	Mathematics one of a set of parallel geometric figures parallel lines or planes. <i>The road runs parallel to the Ottawa River.</i>
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>We are rivaling for first place in the race.</i>
<u>unlike</u>	Not like; different from. <i>He was very unlike to any other man.</i>
vie	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
