*His self confidence was **adversely** affected for years to come.*

<u>antithesis</u>	(in Hegelian philosophy) the negation of the thesis as the second stage in the process of dialectical reasoning. <i>Figures of speech such as antithesis.</i>
antithetic	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Hope is antithetic to despair.</i>
antithetical	Connected with, containing, or using the rhetorical device of antithesis. <i>People whose religious beliefs are antithetical to mine.</i>
challenger	A person who engages in a contest. <i>A potential challenger for the party leadership.</i>
compare	Estimate, measure, or note the similarity or dissimilarity between. <i>We can compare the Han dynasty to the Romans.</i>
<u>compete</u>	Compete for something engage in a contest measure oneself against others. <i>He competed with a number of other candidates.</i>
competitor	A person who takes part in a sporting contest. <i>Our main industrial competitors.</i>
<u>complement</u>	Make complete or perfect supply what is wanting or form the complement to. <i>A classic blazer complements a look that s smart or casual.</i>
<u>contender</u>	A person or group competing with others to achieve something. <i>A presidential contender.</i>
<u>contradictory</u>	A contradictory proposition. <i>The two studies came to contradictory conclusions.</i>
<u>converse</u>	A proposition obtained by conversion. <i>Parental and filial are converse terms.</i>
different	Not the same as another or each other; unlike in nature, form, or quality. <i>This meeting was different from the earlier one.</i>
differently	In a novel and unusual way. <i>He likes to do things a bit differently.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	Have or express a different opinion. <i>She disagreed with the system of apartheid.</i>
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He expressed his dissent in a contrary opinion.</i>
<u>dissident</u>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. <i>A dissident who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>Enemy aircraft.</i>

equivalent	Belonging to the same equivalence class. <i>The French equivalent of the Bank of England.</i>
objector	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>Objectors to the housing plans.</i>
opponent	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>The news will delight opponents of GM foods.</i>
oppose	Compete with (someone). <i>A workers movement opposed the regime.</i>
opposing	(of two or more subjects) differing from or in conflict with each other. <i>The brothers fought on opposing sides in the war.</i>
opposite	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>They sat opposite at the table.</i>
<u>opposition</u>	A contestant that you are matched against. <i>The home team made short work of the opposition.</i>
<u>oxymoron</u>	Conjoining contradictory terms (as in `deafening silence.
<u>parallel</u>	An imaginary line around the Earth parallel to the equator. <i>Parallel processing.</i>
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>We are rivaling for first place in the race.</i>
<u>unlike</u>	Not like; different from. <i>They distributed unlike or unequal sums to the various charities.</i>
vie	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
