### adversely

In a way that prevents success or development; harmfully or unfavourably.  
*His self confidence was **adversely** affected for years to come.*

<b><u>antithesis</u></b>	(in Hegelian philosophy) the negation of the thesis as the second stage in the process of dialectical reasoning. <i>Figures of speech such as <b>antithesis</b>.</i>
<b>antithetic</b>	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Hope is <b>antithetic</b> to despair.</i>
<b>antithetical</b>	Connected with, containing, or using the rhetorical device of antithesis. <i>People whose religious beliefs are <b>antithetical</b> to mine.</i>
<b>challenger</b>	A person who engages in a contest. <i>A potential <b>challenger</b> for the party leadership.</i>
<b>compare</b>	Estimate, measure, or note the similarity or dissimilarity between. <i>We can <b>compare</b> the Han dynasty to the Romans.</i>
<b><u>compete</u></b>	Compete for something engage in a contest measure oneself against others. <i>He <b>competed</b> with a number of other candidates.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	A person who takes part in a sporting contest. <i>Our main industrial <b>competitors</b>.</i>
<b><u>complement</u></b>	Make complete or perfect supply what is wanting or form the complement to. <i>A classic blazer <b>complements</b> a look that s smart or casual.</i>
<b><u>contender</u></b>	A person or group competing with others to achieve something. <i>A presidential <b>contender</b>.</i>
<b><u>contradictory</u></b>	A contradictory proposition. <i>The two studies came to <b>contradictory</b> conclusions.</i>
<b><u>converse</u></b>	A proposition obtained by conversion. <i>Parental and filial are <b>converse</b> terms.</i>
<b>different</b>	Not the same as another or each other; unlike in nature, form, or quality. <i>This meeting was <b>different</b> from the earlier one.</i>
<b>differently</b>	In a novel and unusual way. <i>He likes to do things a bit <b>differently</b>.</i>
<b><u>disagree</u></b>	Have or express a different opinion. <i>She <b>disagreed</b> with the system of apartheid.</i>
<b><u>dissent</u></b>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He expressed his <b>dissent</b> in a contrary opinion.</i>
<b><u>dissident</u></b>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. <i>A <b>dissident</b> who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i><b>Enemy</b> aircraft.</i>

<b>equivalent</b>	Belonging to the same equivalence class. <i>The French <b>equivalent</b> of the Bank of England.</i>
<b>objector</b>	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i><b>Objectors</b> to the housing plans.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>The news will delight <b>opponents</b> of GM foods.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Compete with (someone). <i>A workers movement <b>opposed</b> the regime.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	(of two or more subjects) differing from or in conflict with each other. <i>The brothers fought on <b>opposing</b> sides in the war.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>They sat <b>opposite</b> at the table.</i>
<b><u>opposition</u></b>	A contestant that you are matched against. <i>The home team made short work of the <b>opposition</b>.</i>
<b><u>oxymoron</u></b>	Conjoining contradictory terms (as in `deafening silence.
<b><u>parallel</u></b>	An imaginary line around the Earth parallel to the equator. <i><b>Parallel</b> processing.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>We are <b>rivaling</b> for first place in the race.</i>
<b><u>unlike</u></b>	Not like; different from. <i>They distributed <b>unlike</b> or unequal sums to the various charities.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
