differential Constituting a specific difference; distinctive.

distinction A distinguishing difference between similar things or people.

equal Be equal to in quality or ability.

One dollar **equal**s 1 000 rubles these days.



equateCause (two or more things) to be the same in quantity or value.

That sum **equate**s to half a million pounds today.

impartially In a way that treats all rivals or disputants equally.

The adjudicator should act **impartially** in carrying out his duties.

invidious (of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust.

It seems **invidious** to make special mention of one aspect of his work.

kin Animals or plants that are related to a particular species or kind.

Many elderly people have no **kin** to turn to for assistance.

Find enjoyable or agreeable.

Dogs foxes and the like.

liken Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous.

Racism is **liken**ed to a contagious disease.

likeness Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things.

Humans are described as being made in God s **likeness**.

proportionate Being in due proportion.

Proportionate representation of a minority group.

relative A relative pronoun determiner or adverb.

A **relative** stranger.

relatively Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite.

They were very poor but **relatively** speaking they had been lucky.

remarkably

To a remarkable degree or extent.

Her condition improved **remarkably**.

resemblance A way in which two or more things are alike.

There was a close **resemblance** between herself and Anne.

similar Having the same or similar characteristics.

They wore **similar** coats.

similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things.

There is a striking **similitude** between the brother and sister.

Having similarity in size, shape, and relative position of corresponding

symmetrical parts.

The shape of a hill smooth and **symmetrical**.

twofold Having two parts or elements.

A **twofold** increase in the risk.

unfavorable (of winds or weather) tending to hinder or oppose.
