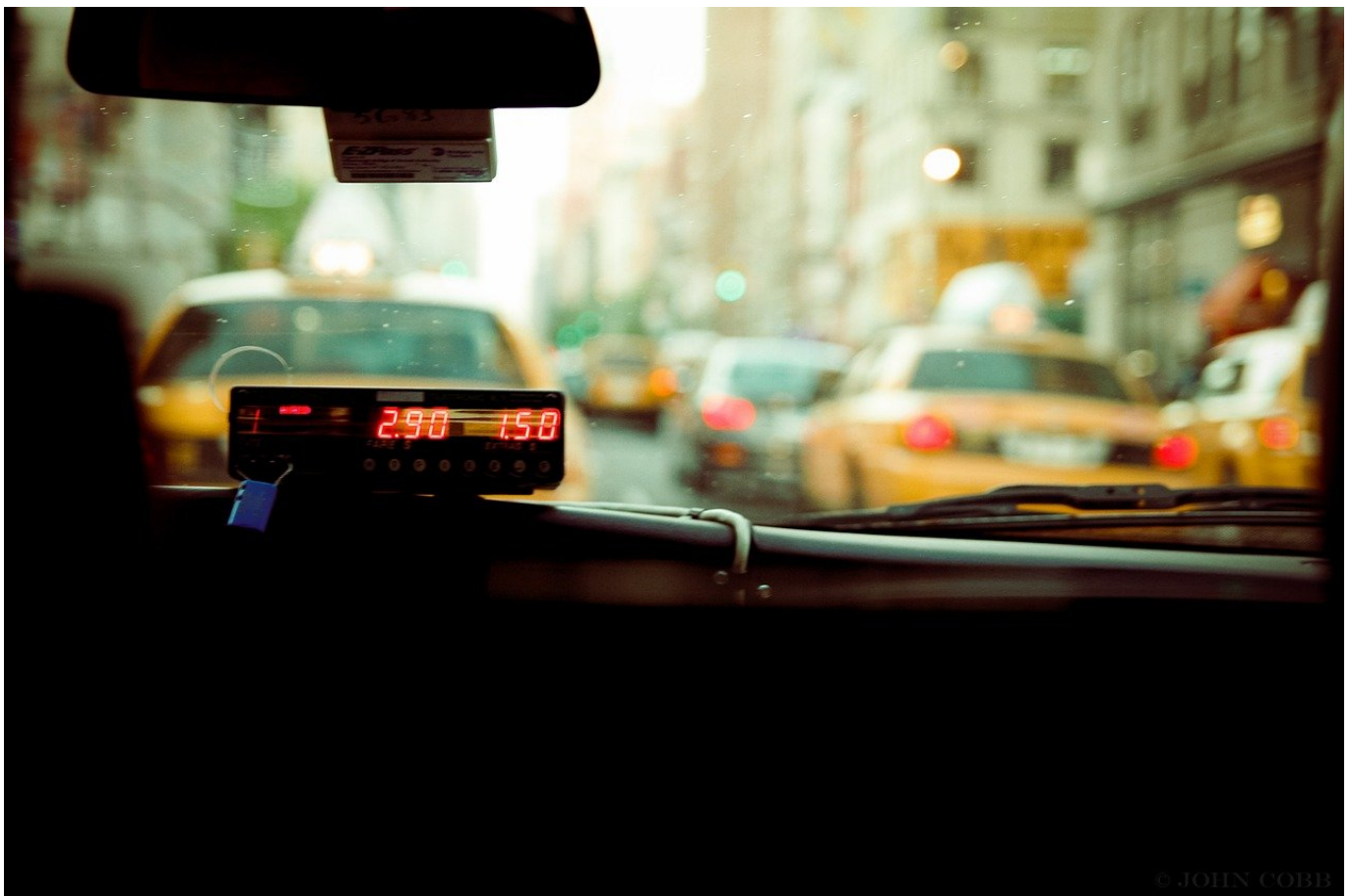
Definitions of "Counters" as a noun

heel counter The lower end of a ship's mast.

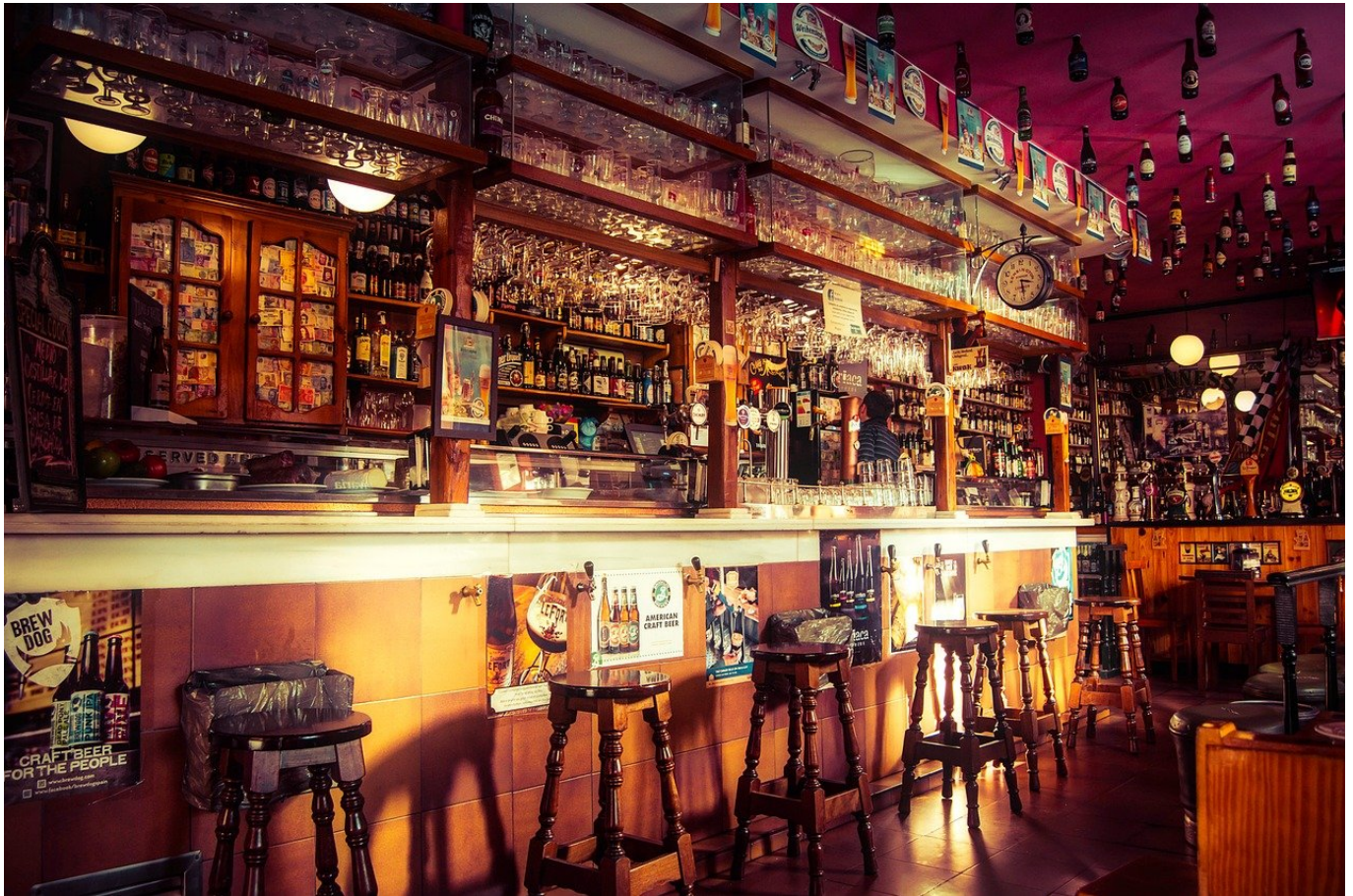
parry An act of parrying something.

rejoinder	(law) a pleading made by a defendant in response to the plaintiff's replication. <i>She would have made some cutting rejoinder but none came to mind.</i>
replication	The repetition of a sound resulting from reflection of the sound waves. <i>Scientists will not believe an experimental result until they have seen at least one replication.</i>
<u>retort</u>	A sharp, angry, or witty reply. <i>She opened her mouth to make a suitably cutting retort.</i>
return	A key pressed on a computer keyboard to simulate a carriage return in a word processing program or to indicate the end of a command or data string. <i>He celebrated his safe return from the war.</i>
riposte	A counterattack made immediately after successfully parrying the opponents lunge.
sideboard	A piece of furniture that stands at the side of a dining room; has shelves and drawers. <i>Bushy sideboards and a moustache.</i>
tabulator	A facility in a word-processing program, or a device on a keyboard, for advancing to a sequence of set positions in tabular work. <i>Businessmen speak out their minds to a tabulator on various issues.</i>

- *A counter may be used to stiffen the material around the heel and to give support to the foot.*

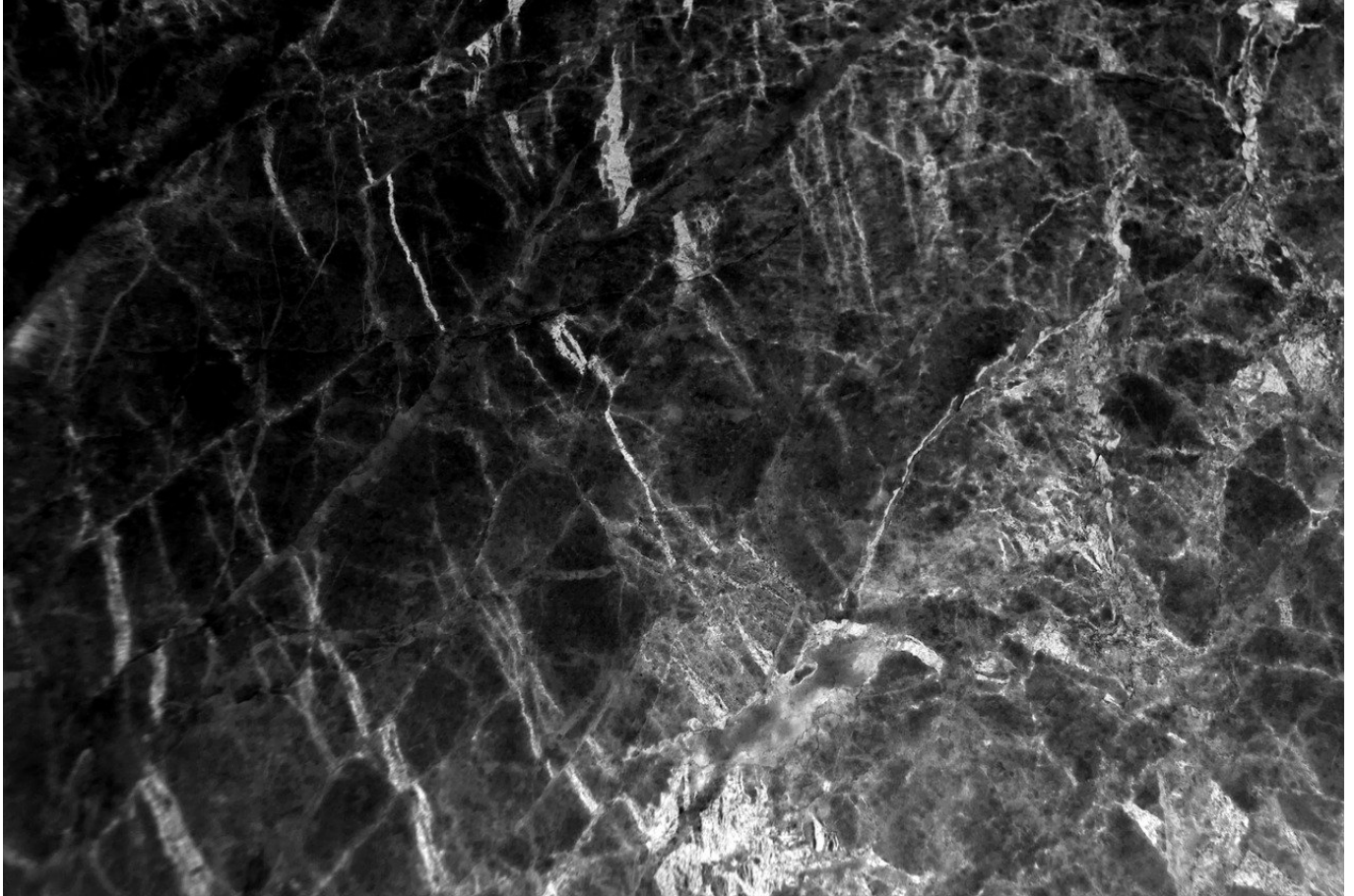


Counters as a Verb

backslide Drop to a lower level, as in one's morals or standards.
*There are many things that can cause slimmers to **backslide**.*

backward At or to or toward the back or rear.
*A **backward** view.*

contrary	A contrary proposition. <i>He ignored contrary advice and agreed on the deal.</i>
converse	Conversation. <i>Parental and filial are converse terms.</i>
cultivate	Foster the growth of. <i>Damp well cultivated soil.</i>
inverse	Something that is the opposite or reverse of something else. <i>Power is the inverse of dependence.</i>
inversion	A transformation in which each point of a given figure is replaced by another point on the same straight line from a fixed point especially in such a way that the product of the distances of the two points from the centre of inversion is constant. <i>Since the company maintains a franchisee model it is a viable target for inversion.</i>
opposite	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>They went in opposite directions.</i>
paradoxical	Seemingly absurd or self-contradictory. <i>By glorifying the acts of violence they achieve the paradoxical effect of making them trivial.</i>
pay	Render. <i>It was his way of paying out Maguire for giving him the push.</i>
receipt	Report the receipt of. <i>She spent hours in the kitchen trying all sorts of receipts.</i>
reception	(American football) the act of catching a pass in football. <i>The tight end made a great reception on the 20 yard line.</i>
recurring	Coming back. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
refractive	Of or relating to or capable of refraction. <i>The refractive characteristics of the eye.</i>
refractory	Temporarily unresponsive or not fully responsive to nervous or sexual stimuli. <i>A refractory case of acne.</i>
refund	Pay back money to. <i>You may be allowed to claim a refund of the tax.</i>
repay	Make repayment for or return something. <i>These sites would repay more detailed investigation.</i>

repeated	Recurring again and again. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	The restoration of something to its original state. <i>The ANC had demanded the restitution of land seized from black people.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration looked exactly like the original.</i>
retrace	Trace (something) back to its source or beginning. <i>He began to retrace his steps to the station car park.</i>
return	A good rate of return. <i>McAllister went out in 43 and returned in 32.</i>
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A reversion to the two party system.</i>
<u>revert</u>	(of property) return to (the original owner) by reversion. <i>In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would revert to the Church.</i>
<u>revolutionize</u>	Change (something) radically or fundamentally. <i>E mail revolutionized communication in academe.</i>
<u>rotate</u>	Perform a job or duty on a rotating basis. <i>Radial tyres should only be rotated from front to rear on the same side.</i>
statistics	The practice or science of collecting and analysing numerical data in large quantities, especially for the purpose of inferring proportions in a whole from those in a representative sample.
till	A strongbox for holding cash. <i>Till the soil.</i>
wayward	Resistant to guidance or discipline. <i>Wayward behavior.</i>
