<b>set of two</b>	The process of becoming hard or solid by cooling or drying or crystallization.
<b><u>span</u></b>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>The gannets had black tipped wings with a six foot <b>span</b>.</i>
<b>twain</b>	Two items of the same kind.
<b>two or three</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of one and one and one.
<b>twosome</b>	A pair who associate with one another. <i>An inseparable <b>twosome</b>.</i>
<b>yoke</b>	A pair of animals yoked together. <i>The pinafore fell amply from a short <b>yoke</b>.</i>

<b>accompany</b>	Perform an accompaniment to. <i>He would play his violin and Mother used to <b>accompany</b> him on our organ.</i>
<b><u>ally</u></b>	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He allied his racing experience with his father's business acumen.</i>
<b>associate</b>	Bring or come into association or action. <i>I <b>associated</b> wealth with freedom.</i>
<b>attach</b>	Be attached be in contact with. <i>The Earl Marshal <b>attached</b> Gloucester for high treason.</i>
<b><u>bind</u></b>	Of a quantifier be applied to a given variable so that the variable falls within its scope For example in an expression of the form For every x if x is a dog x is an animal the universal quantifier is binding the variable x. <i>The hydrogen <b>binds</b> the oxygen.</i>

<b>breed</b>	Cause (an animal) to produce offspring, especially in a controlled and organized way. <i>She <b>breeds</b> dogs.</i>
<b><u>chain</u></b>	Fasten or secure with a chain. <i>As an actuary you will not be <b>chained</b> to a desk.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Groups of teachers <b>combined</b> to tackle a variety of problems.</i>
<b>connect</b>	Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. <i>The brick <b>connected</b> on her head knocking her out.</i>
<b><u>copulate</u></b>	Engage in sexual intercourse. <i>Only the dominant male <b>copulates</b> with the female.</i>
<b>couple on</b>	Link together.
<b>couple up</b>	Bring two objects, ideas, or people together.
<b>fasten</b>	Become fixed or fastened. <i>A blue nightie that <b>fastens</b> down the back.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>She <b>fixed</b> her gaze on the man.</i>
<b>harness</b>	Put a harness on a horse or other draught animal. <i>Projects that <b>harness</b> the creativity of those living in the ghetto.</i>
<b>hitch</b>	Travel by hitch hiking. <i>She <b>hitched</b> up her skirt and ran.</i>
<b>hitch up</b>	Connect to a vehicle.
<b>incorporate</b>	Form a corporation. <i>Add the cheeses and butter and process briefly to <b>incorporate</b> them.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The protest forced the bus companies to <b>integrate</b> the buses.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>The tap was <b>joined</b> to a pipe.</i>
<b>join up</b>	Cause to become joined or linked.
<b>lash</b>	Lash or flick about sharply. <i>I could feel the wind <b>lashing</b> at me.</i>
<b><u>link</u></b>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>She <b>linked</b> up with an artistic group.</i>
<b>match</b>	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>He tried to <b>match</b> her nonchalance.</i>
<b>mate</b>	Connect or be connected mechanically. <i>The four cylinder engine is <b>mated</b> to a five speed gearbox.</i>

<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i><b>Mixing</b> sounds.</i>
<b>pair</b>	Occur in pairs. <i>You ll now be able to <b>pair</b> your watch directly with a set of Bluetooth headphones.</i>
<b>pair off</b>	Occur in pairs.
<b>partner off</b>	Provide with a partner.
<b>rope</b>	Catch fasten or secure with rope. <i><b>Rope</b> the bag securely.</i>
<b>secure</b>	Compress (a blood vessel) to prevent bleeding. <i>Doors are likely to be well <b>secured</b> at night.</i>
<b>strap</b>	Fasten or secure in a specified place or position with a strap. <i><b>Strap</b> a razor.</i>
<b>team</b>	Form a team. <i>He <b>teamed</b> up with the band to produce the disc.</i>
<b>tether</b>	Tie with a tether. <i>The horse had been <b>tethered</b> to a post.</i>
<b>tie</b>	Unite musical notes by a tie. <i><b>Tie</b> a knot in one end of the cotton.</i>
<b>truss</b>	Support a roof bridge or other structure with a truss or trusses. <i>I found him <b>trussed</b> up in his cupboard.</i>

<b>yoke</b>	Put a yoke on a pair of animals couple or attach with or to a yoke. <i>Two crackheads <b>yoked</b> this girl.</i>

<b>cohabit</b>	Share living quarters; usually said of people who are not married and live together as a couple. <i>Mary is now <b>cohabiting</b> with Paul.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Make contact or come together. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>

<b>dowry</b>	An amount of property or money brought by a bride to her husband on their marriage. <i>Elizabeth s <b>dowry</b> was to be 45 000 in diamonds.</i>
<b>estranged</b>	Caused to be unloved. <i>His <b>estranged</b> wife.</i>
<b>estrangement</b>	The fact of no longer living with one's spouse or partner; separation. <i>A parent s rights in the event of divorce or <b>estrangement</b>.</i>
<b>ex</b>	Out of fashion. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<b>heterosexual</b>	A heterosexual person. <i><b>Heterosexual</b> relationships.</i>
<b>honeymoon</b>	Spend a honeymoon. <i>The new President s <b>honeymoon</b> period.</i>
<b>husband</b>	A married man; a woman's partner in marriage. <i>She <b>husbanded</b> their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
<b>kiss</b>	The act of caressing with the lips (or an instance thereof). <i>There was a brief <b>kiss</b> of their hands in passing.</i>
<b>kissing</b>	Affectionate play (or foreplay without contact with the genital organs).
<b>marriage</b>	The state of being a married couple voluntarily joined for life (or until divorce). <i>A happy <b>marriage</b>.</i>
<b>married</b>	Married people. <i>A <b>married</b> couple.</i>
<b>marry</b>	Join in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don t <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A plumber s <b>mate</b>.</i>
<b>morganatic</b>	(of marriages) of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a <b>morganatic</b> marriage with a German born actress.</i>
<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<b>paramour</b>	A woman who cohabits with an important man.



<b><u>partner</u></b>	A person who is a member of a partnership. <i>Make sure that you or your <b>partner</b> are using an effective method of contraception.</i>
<b>polygamist</b>	An animal that has more than one mate. <i><b>Polygamist</b> communities.</i>
<b>polygamy</b>	The condition or practice of having more than one spouse at a time.
<b>prenuptial</b>	Relating to events before a marriage. <i><b>Prenuptial</b> pregnancy.</i>
<b><u>spouse</u></b>	A person's partner in marriage.
<b><u>suitor</u></b>	A man who courts a woman. <i>The company agreed to negotiate with its <b>suitor</b>.</i>
<b>wed</b>	Give or join in marriage. <i>In this album he <b>weds</b> an excellent programme with a distinctive vocal style.</i>
<b><u>wife</u></b>	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>He and his <b>wife</b> are keen gardeners.</i>
