<b>at no cost</b>	100 at equal 1 kip in Laos.
<b><u>chivalry</u></b>	The medieval knightly system with its religious, moral, and social code. <i>He still retained a sense of <b>chivalry</b> towards women.</i>
<b><u>civility</u></b>	Formal politeness and courtesy in behaviour or speech. <i>I hope we can treat each other with <b>civility</b> and respect.</i>
<b>consideration</b>	A considerate and thoughtful act. <i>You can buy the books for a small <b>consideration</b>.</i>
<b>cordiality</b>	A cordial disposition.
<b>courteousness</b>	A courteous or respectful or considerate act.
<b>courtliness</b>	Elegance suggestive of a royal court.
<b>decorousness</b>	Propriety in manners and conduct.

<b><u>deference</u></b>	Courteous regard for people's feelings. <i>His <b>deference</b> to her wishes was very flattering.</i>
<b>diplomacy</b>	The profession, activity, or skill of managing international relations, typically by a country's representatives abroad. <i>With perfect <b>diplomacy</b> he divided his attention between Meryl and Anthea.</i>
<b><u>discretion</u></b>	The trait of judging wisely and objectively. <i>She knew she could rely on his <b>discretion</b>.</i>
<b>for nothing</b>	A quantity of no importance.
<b>free</b>	People who are free. <i>The home of the <b>free</b> and the brave.</i>
<b>free of charge</b>	People who are free.
<b>gallantry</b>	Gallant actions or words. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>
<b>geniality</b>	A disposition to be friendly and approachable (easy to talk to). <i>He was endowed with <b>geniality</b> and good humour.</i>
<b>gentility</b>	Elegance by virtue of fineness of manner and expression. <i>Her grandmother's pretensions to <b>gentility</b>.</i>
<b>good breeding</b>	Benefit.
<b>good manners</b>	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
<b><u>graciousness</u></b>	Excellence of manners or social conduct.
<b>kindness</b>	Tendency to be kind and forgiving. <i>He thanked them for their <b>kindness</b> and support.</i>
<b>polish</b>	A preparation used in polishing. <i>A tin of shoe <b>polish</b>.</i>
<b>politeness</b>	The act of showing regard for others. <i>He always treated me with the utmost <b>politeness</b>.</i>
<b><u>refinement</u></b>	The result of improving something. <i>He described a <b>refinement</b> of this technique.</i>
<b>respect</b>	The state of being admired or respected. <i>It differs in that <b>respect</b>.</i>
<b>respectfulness</b>	Courteous regard for people's feelings.
<b><u>tact</u></b>	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with <b>tact</b> and consideration.</i>
<b>thought</b>	The organized beliefs of a period or group or individual. <i>Sophie sat deep in <b>thought</b>.</i>

- thoughtfulness** A calm, lengthy, intent consideration.  
*Her generosity and **thoughtfulness** was unbounded.*
- urbanity** Polished courtesy; elegance of manner.  
*A picture of banal **urbanity**.*
- without charge** Attention and management implying responsibility for safety.
- without payment** An act of requiting; returning in kind.

<b>affable</b>	Friendly, good-natured, or easy to talk to. <i>An <b>affable</b> and agreeable companion.</i>
<b><u>amiable</u></b>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An <b>amiable</b> villain with a cocky sidelong grin.</i>
<b><u>chivalrous</u></b>	Relating to the historical concept of chivalry. <i>The concept of <b>chivalrous</b> combat.</i>
<b><u>civility</u></b>	Formal or perfunctory politeness. <i>I hope we can treat each other with <b>civility</b> and respect.</i>
<b><u>courteous</u></b>	Polite, respectful, or considerate in manner. <i>She was <b>courteous</b> and obliging to all.</i>
<b>couth</b>	(used facetiously) refinement. <i>It is more <b>couth</b> to hold your shrimp genteelly by the tail when eating.</i>

<b>curtsy</b>	Perform a curtsy. <i>She bobbed a <b>curtsy</b> to him.</i>
<b><u>decent</u></b>	Decently clothed. <i>People need <b>decent</b> homes.</i>
<b>decorous</b>	In keeping with good taste and propriety; polite and restrained. <i>Charlotte gave David a <b>decorous</b> kiss.</i>
<b><u>friendliness</u></b>	A feeling of liking for another person; enjoyment in their company. <i>I was overwhelmed by the <b>friendliness</b> of the people here.</i>
<b>friendly</b>	Characteristic of or befitting a friend. <i>She gave me a <b>friendly</b> smile.</i>
<b>genteel</b>	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>A <b>genteel</b> old lady.</i>
<b>gesture</b>	Express something with a gesture or gestures. <i>So much is conveyed by <b>gesture</b>.</i>
<b>greeting</b>	A polite word or sign of welcome or recognition. <i>Warm <b>greetings</b> to you all.</i>
<b><u>honest</u></b>	Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent. <i>An <b>honest</b> working stiff.</i>
<b>humble</b>	Of low birth or station ('base' is archaic in this sense). <i>Of <b>humble</b> or lowly birth.</i>
<b>kind</b>	Agreeable, conducive to comfort. <i>All <b>kinds</b> of music.</i>
<b>kindness</b>	The quality of being warmhearted and considerate and humane and sympathetic. <i>It would be a <b>kindness</b> on your part to invite her.</i>
<b><u>modest</u></b>	Not large but sufficient in size or amount. <i>Drink <b>modest</b> amounts of alcohol.</i>
<b>nice</b>	(of a person) good-natured; kind. <i>A job requiring <b>nice</b> measurements with a micrometer.</i>
<b><u>outspoken</u></b>	Given to expressing yourself freely or insistently. <i>He has been <b>outspoken</b> in his criticism.</i>
<b><u>polite</u></b>	Showing regard for others in manners, speech, behavior, etc. <i>They thought she was wrong but were too <b>polite</b> to say so.</i>
<b>politely</b>	In a polite manner. <i>He waited <b>politely</b> for me to ask questions.</i>

<b>respectfully</b>	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>I must <b>respectfully</b> disagree with your claim.</i>
<b>straightforwardness</b>	Without hypocrisy. <i>What some people take for rudeness is really <b>straightforwardness</b>.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Telling or expressing the truth; honest. <i>A <b>truthful</b> person.</i>
<b>unassuming</b>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i><b>Unassuming</b> to a fault skeptical about the value of his work.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>An <b>unbiased</b> account of her family problems.</i>
<b>unpretentious</b>	Not attempting to impress others with an appearance of greater importance, talent, or culture than is actually possessed. <i>An <b>unpretentious</b> country church.</i>
<b>veracious</b>	Precisely accurate. <i>A <b>veracious</b> witness.</i>
