arrangement	An organized structure for arranging or classifying. <i>An intricate arrangement of gravel paths.</i>
<u>bargain</u>	A thing bought or offered for sale much more cheaply than is usual or expected. <i>She got a bargain at the auction.</i>
bond	Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>A 10 000 bond was furnished by an alderman.</i>
<u>compact</u>	A mass of powdered metal compacted together in preparation for sintering. <i>Strength is then introduced by infiltrating glass into the compact.</i>
concordat	An agreement or treaty, especially one between the Vatican and a secular government relating to matters of mutual interest. <i>Napoleon I s concordat with the papacy.</i>
contract	Contract bridge the highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>South can make the contract with correct play.</i>
deal	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>He rose to prominence through a series of shady deals.</i>
entente	An informal alliance between countries. <i>The emperor hoped to bring about an entente with Russia.</i>
guarantee	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A degree is no guarantee of a fast track career.</i>
indenture	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i>The 30 apprentices have received their indentures on completion of their training.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Someone accepted for membership but not yet fully admitted to the group. <i>His saxophone was in pledge.</i>
promise	An indication that something is likely to occur. <i>He showed great promise even as a junior officer.</i>
protocol	A procedure for carrying out a scientific experiment or a course of medical treatment. <i>A protocol to the treaty allowed for this Danish referendum.</i>
settlement	The process of establishing a settlement or settlements. <i>A boundary wall which has cracked due to settlement is to be replaced.</i>

treaty

A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states.

*The two Presidents signed a ten year **treaty** of solidarity.*

understanding

The capacity for rational thought or inference or discrimination.

*He and I have an **understanding**.*

warrant

A document issued by a legal or government official authorizing the police or another body to make an arrest, search premises, or carry out some other action relating to the administration of justice.

*We ll issue you with a travel **warrant**.*

- *There was a covenant between them that her name was never to be mentioned.*

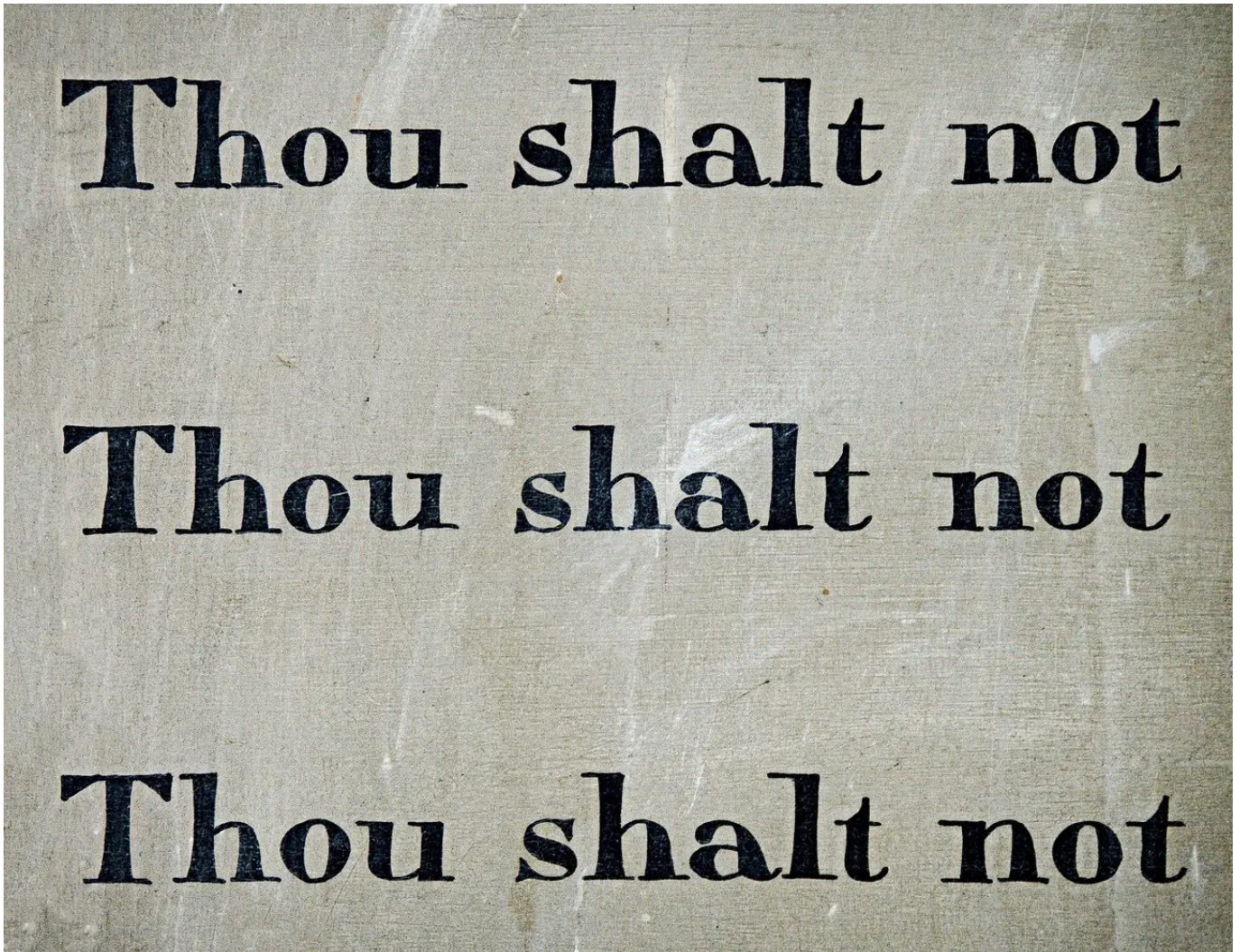


Covenant as a Verb

Definitions of "Covenant" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "covenant" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Enter into a covenant.*
- *Undertake to give (a sum of money) regularly to charity by means of a covenant.*
- *Enter into a covenant or formal agreement.*
- *Agree by lease, deed, or other legal contract.*



Synonyms of "Covenant" as a verb (14 Words)

agree	Reach agreement about something after negotiation. <i>I don't agree with random drugs testing in schools.</i>
bind oneself	Bind by an obligation; cause to be indebted.
commit oneself	Engage in or perform.
contract	Enter into a contractual arrangement. <i>Glass contracts as it cools.</i>
engage	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>She had offered to engage a room in the house of the woman.</i>
enter into an agreement	Become a participant; be involved in.
give an undertaking	Inflict as a punishment.
give one's word	Cause to happen or be responsible for.
guarantee	Provide a guarantee for. <i>The company guarantees to refund your money.</i>
pledge	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I was pledged to silence.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>I've been promised to him for years.</i>
undertake	Enter upon an activity or enterprise. <i>A lorry driver implicitly undertakes that he is reasonably skilled as a driver.</i>
vow	Make a vow promise. <i>I vowed myself to this enterprise.</i>
warrant	Provide adequate grounds to justify (a certain course of action). <i>I warrant this information.</i>

<u>fulfillment</u>	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc.
<u>honesty</u>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the honesty box.</i>
loyalty	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
negotiation	Discussion aimed at reaching an agreement. <i>The buyout negotiation lasted several days.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>Each took the oath and then gave evidence.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>Japan pledged 100 million in humanitarian aid.</i>
posterity	All future generations. <i>The victims names are recorded for posterity.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>Dawn came with the promise of fine weather.</i>

prophecy	Knowledge of the future (usually said to be obtained from a divine source). <i>A bleak prophecy of war and ruin.</i>
prophecy	Predict or reveal through, or as if through, divine inspiration. <i>Jacques was prophecying a bumper harvest.</i>
ratification	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i>Ratification of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>
ratify	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
renege	Fail to fulfill a promise or obligation. <i>The government had reneged on its election promises.</i>
satisfaction	Compensation for a wrong. <i>The chef tasted the sauce with great satisfaction.</i>
soothsayer	A person supposed to be able to foresee the future.
stipulate	Demand or specify (a requirement), typically as part of an agreement. <i>They stipulated to release all the prisoners.</i>
terms	The amount of money needed to purchase something. <i>On good terms with her in laws.</i>
treaty	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i>
troth	A mutual promise to marry. <i>A token of troth.</i>
