### **agreement**

They had an **agreement** that they would not interfere in each other's business.

<b>arrangement</b>	An organized structure for arranging or classifying. <i>An intricate <b>arrangement</b> of gravel paths.</i>
<b><u>bargain</u></b>	A thing bought or offered for sale much more cheaply than is usual or expected. <i>She got a <b>bargain</b> at the auction.</i>
<b>bond</b>	Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>A 10 000 <b>bond</b> was furnished by an alderman.</i>
<b><u>compact</u></b>	A mass of powdered metal compacted together in preparation for sintering. <i>Strength is then introduced by infiltrating glass into the <b>compact</b>.</i>
<b>concordat</b>	An agreement or treaty, especially one between the Vatican and a secular government relating to matters of mutual interest. <i>Napoleon I s <b>concordat</b> with the papacy.</i>
<b>contract</b>	Contract bridge the highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>South can make the <b>contract</b> with correct play.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>He rose to prominence through a series of shady <b>deals</b>.</i>
<b>entente</b>	An informal alliance between countries. <i>The emperor hoped to bring about an <b>entente</b> with Russia.</i>
<b>guarantee</b>	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A degree is no <b>guarantee</b> of a fast track career.</i>
<b>indenture</b>	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i>The 30 apprentices have received their <b>indentures</b> on completion of their training.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b><u>pledge</u></b>	Someone accepted for membership but not yet fully admitted to the group. <i>His saxophone was in <b>pledge</b>.</i>
<b>promise</b>	An indication that something is likely to occur. <i>He showed great <b>promise</b> even as a junior officer.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	A procedure for carrying out a scientific experiment or a course of medical treatment. <i>A <b>protocol</b> to the treaty allowed for this Danish referendum.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The process of establishing a settlement or settlements. <i>A boundary wall which has cracked due to <b>settlement</b> is to be replaced.</i>



**treaty**

A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states.

*The two Presidents signed a ten year **treaty** of solidarity.*

**understanding**

The capacity for rational thought or inference or discrimination.

*He and I have an **understanding**.*

**warrant**

A document issued by a legal or government official authorizing the police or another body to make an arrest, search premises, or carry out some other action relating to the administration of justice.

*We ll issue you with a travel **warrant**.*

### agree

Reach agreement about something after negotiation.

*I don't **agree** with random drugs testing in schools.*

### **bind oneself**

Bind by an obligation; cause to be indebted.

### **commit oneself**

Engage in or perform.

### **contract**

Enter into a contractual arrangement.

*Glass **contracts** as it cools.*

### engage

Engage for service under a term of contract.

*She had offered to **engage** a room in the house of the woman.*

**enter into an agreement** Become a participant; be involved in.

**give an undertaking** Inflict as a punishment.

**give one's word** Cause to happen or be responsible for.

**guarantee** Provide a guarantee for.

*The company **guarantees** to refund your money.*

### pledge

Bind or secure by a pledge.

*I was **pledged** to silence.*

### **promise**

Promise to undertake or give.

*I've been **promised** to him for years.*

### undertake

Enter upon an activity or enterprise.

*A lorry driver implicitly **undertakes** that he is reasonably skilled as a driver.*

### vow

Make a vow promise.

*I **vowed** myself to this enterprise.*

### **warrant**

Provide adequate grounds to justify (a certain course of action).

*I **warrant** this information.*





## Usage Examples of "Covenant" as a verb

- *The company have covenanted £1,000 a year to the Law Library.*
- *The nations covenanted to fight terrorism around the world.*
- *The landlord covenants to repair the property.*

### allegiance

Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause.

*A complex pattern of cross party **allegiances**.*

### **anticipate**

Guess or be aware of (what will happen) and take action in order to be prepared.

*This is to **anticipate** the argument.*

<b><u>commitment</u></b>	The state or quality of being dedicated to a cause, activity, etc. <i>With so many business <b>commitments</b> time for recreation was limited.</i>
<b>concordat</b>	A signed written agreement between two or more parties (nations) to perform some action. <i>Napoleon I s <b>concordat</b> with the papacy.</i>
<b>contract</b>	The highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>He has just signed a <b>contract</b> keeping him with the club.</i>
<b><u>devotion</u></b>	Prayers or religious observances. <i>She went to her <b>devotions</b>.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i>His <b>fidelity</b> to liberal ideals.</i>
<b><u>forsake</u></b>	Leave someone who needs or counts on you; leave in the lurch. <i>He would never <b>forsake</b> Tara.</i>
<b><u>fulfillment</u></b>	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc.
<b><u>honesty</u></b>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the <b>honesty</b> box.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b>negotiation</b>	Discussion aimed at reaching an agreement. <i>The buyout <b>negotiation</b> lasted several days.</i>
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>Each took the <b>oath</b> and then gave evidence.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b><u>pledge</u></b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>Japan <b>pledged</b> 100 million in humanitarian aid.</i>
<b>posterity</b>	All future generations. <i>The victims names are recorded for <b>posterity</b>.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Promise to undertake or give. <i>Dawn came with the <b>promise</b> of fine weather.</i>

<b><u>prophecy</u></b>	Knowledge of the future (usually said to be obtained from a divine source). <i>A bleak <b>prophecy</b> of war and ruin.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Predict or reveal through, or as if through, divine inspiration. <i>Jacques was <b>prophesying</b> a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i><b>Ratification</b> of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Fail to fulfill a promise or obligation. <i>The government had <b>reneged</b> on its election promises.</i>
<b>satisfaction</b>	Compensation for a wrong. <i>The chef tasted the sauce with great <b>satisfaction</b>.</i>
<b>soothsayer</b>	A person supposed to be able to foresee the future.
<b>stipulate</b>	Demand or specify (a requirement), typically as part of an agreement. <i>They <b>stipulated</b> to release all the prisoners.</i>
<b>terms</b>	The amount of money needed to purchase something. <i>On good <b>terms</b> with her in laws.</i>
<b><u>treaty</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>troth</b>	A mutual promise to marry. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
