| <b><u>famine</u></b>     | Hunger.<br><i>Drought resulted in <b>famine</b> throughout the region.</i>   |
| <b>grasping</b>          | The act of gripping something firmly with the hands (or the tentacles).<br><i><b>Grasping</b> commercialism.</i>           |
| <b>greedy</b>            | Wanting to eat or drink more than one can reasonably consume.<br><i><b>Greedy</b> for money and power.</i>                 |
