## Associations of "Cradle robber" (30 Words)

<a href="#">bandit</a>	An enemy aircraft. <i>The <b>bandit</b> produced a weapon and demanded money.</i>
<a href="#">brigand</a>	A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.
<a href="#">burglar</a>	A person who commits burglary.
<a href="#">burgle</a>	Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been <b>burgled</b>.</i>
<a href="#">crime</a>	An evil act not necessarily punishable by law. <i>They condemned apartheid as a <b>crime</b> against humanity.</i>
<a href="#">interloper</a>	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>Japanese consumers have in the past been unreceptive to foreign <b>interlopers</b> in the cell phone market.</i>
<a href="#">intrude</a>	Thrust oneself in as if by force. <i>The colors don't <b>intrude</b> on the viewer.</i>
<a href="#">intruder</a>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The <b>intruder</b> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
<a href="#">invade</a>	To intrude upon, infringe, encroach on, violate. <i>Demonstrators <b>invaded</b> the Presidential Palace.</i>
<a href="#">larceny</a>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<a href="#">outlaw</a>	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>The <b>outlaw</b> Ned Kelly.</i>
<a href="#">rapine</a>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>Industrial <b>rapine</b>.</i>

<b>recidivist</b>	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be <b>recidivist</b> than other criminals.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Take property unlawfully from (a person or place) by force or threat of force. <i>Bob thinks my suit cost 70 and even then he thinks I was <b>robbed</b>.</i>
<b>robbery</b>	Unashamed swindling or overcharging. <i>He was involved in drugs extortion and <b>robbery</b>.</i>
<b>rustler</b>	Someone who steals livestock (especially cattle). <i>Police have so far arrested 649 <b>rustlers</b> countrywide.</i>
<b>shoplift</b>	Steal goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>She was caught <b>shoplifting</b> a pair of shoes.</i>
<b>shoplifting</b>	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>She had convictions for <b>shoplifting</b>.</i>
<b>steal</b>	An act of stealing a base. <i>She was found guilty of <b>stealing</b> from her employers.</i>
<b><u>thief</u></b>	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Take by theft. <i>They began <b>thieving</b> again.</i>
<b>thievery</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty <b>thievery</b>.</i>
<b>transgression</b>	The action of going beyond or overstepping some boundary or limit. <i>Few ministers now stand down because of sexual <b>transgressions</b>.</i>
<b>trespass</b>	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>The worst <b>trespass</b> against the goddess Venus is to see her naked and asleep.</i>
<b>trespasser</b>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.</i>
<b>unlawful</b>	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i><b>Unlawful</b> love.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
<b>vagrancy</b>	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into <b>vagrancy</b> and drug abuse.</i>

**violate** Violate the sacred character of a place or language.  
*They **violated** the terms of a ceasefire.*

**waylay** Wait in hiding to attack.  
*He waylaid me on the stairs.*
