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Associations of "Cradle robber" (30 Words)

bandit	An enemy aircraft. <i>The bandit produced a weapon and demanded money.</i>
brigand	A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.
burglar	A person who commits burglary.
burgle	Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been burgled.</i>
crime	An evil act not necessarily punishable by law. <i>They condemned apartheid as a crime against humanity.</i>
interloper	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>Japanese consumers have in the past been unreceptive to foreign interlopers in the cell phone market.</i>
intrude	Thrust oneself in as if by force. <i>The colors don't intrude on the viewer.</i>
intruder	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The intruder had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
invade	To intrude upon, infringe, encroach on, violate. <i>Demonstrators invaded the Presidential Palace.</i>
larceny	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
outlaw	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>The outlaw Ned Kelly.</i>
rapine	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>Industrial rapine.</i>

recidivist	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be recidivist than other criminals.</i>
rob	Take property unlawfully from (a person or place) by force or threat of force. <i>Bob thinks my suit cost 70 and even then he thinks I was robbed.</i>
robbery	Unashamed swindling or overcharging. <i>He was involved in drugs extortion and robbery.</i>
rustler	Someone who steals livestock (especially cattle). <i>Police have so far arrested 649 rustlers countrywide.</i>
shoplift	Steal goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>She was caught shoplifting a pair of shoes.</i>
shoplifting	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>She had convictions for shoplifting.</i>
steal	An act of stealing a base. <i>She was found guilty of stealing from her employers.</i>
thief	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.</i>
thieve	Take by theft. <i>They began thieving again.</i>
thievery	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty thievery.</i>
transgression	The action of going beyond or overstepping some boundary or limit. <i>Few ministers now stand down because of sexual transgressions.</i>
trespass	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>The worst trespass against the goddess Venus is to see her naked and asleep.</i>
trespasser	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A trespasser on his land.</i>
unlawful	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i>Unlawful love.</i>
usurpation	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
vagrancy	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into vagrancy and drug abuse.</i>

violate

Violate the sacred character of a place or language.
*They **violated** the terms of a ceasefire.*

waylay

Wait in hiding to attack.
He waylaid me on the stairs.
