activity

A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient.

*Respiratory **activity**.*

aircraft

An aeroplane, helicopter, or other machine capable of flight.

art	The products of human creativity works of art collectively. <i>An art exhibition.</i>
artfulness	The quality of being adroit in taking unfair advantage.
boat	A serving dish in the shape of a boat. <i>A gravy boat.</i>
business	Business concerns collectively. <i>The banks are continuing to lose business.</i>
<u>calling</u>	The action or sound of calling. <i>He considered engineering one of the highest possible callings.</i>
capability	The susceptibility of something to a particular treatment. <i>A graphics capability.</i>
<u>career</u>	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>He had a long career in the law.</i>
cleverness	Intelligence as manifested in being quick and witty. <i>The cleverness of its design.</i>
competence	The ability to do something successfully or efficiently. <i>Courses to improve the competence of staff.</i>
<u>conservative</u>	A person who is reluctant to accept changes and new ideas. <i>He was considered a conservative in his approach to Catholic teachings.</i>
craftiness	The quality of being crafty.
craftsmanship	The quality of design and work shown in something made by hand; artistry. <i>A piece of fine craftsmanship.</i>
<u>cunning</u>	Skill in achieving one's ends by deceit. <i>What resources of energy and cunning it took just to survive.</i>
deviousness	The quality of being deceitful and underhanded.
employment	A person's trade or profession. <i>He is looking for employment.</i>
facility	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>The pianist played with great facility.</i>
<u>field</u>	The force exerted or potentially exerted in a field. <i>The diamond fields of South Africa.</i>
<u>flair</u>	A special or instinctive aptitude or ability for doing something well. <i>She dressed with flair.</i>

foxiness	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception.
genius	A natural talent. <i>He sees Adams as the man s evil genius.</i>
gift	The act of giving. <i>That goal was an absolute gift.</i>
guile	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>He used all his guile and guts to free himself from the muddle he was in.</i>
job	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>He gave it up as a bad job.</i>
knack	A special way of doing something. <i>He had a knack for communicating.</i>
line	Denoting an image consisting of lines and solid areas with no gradation of tone. <i>A line block.</i>
line of business	Space for one line of print (one column wide and 1/14 inch deep) used to measure advertising.
line of work	A particular kind of product or merchandise.
machine	A person who acts with the mechanical efficiency of a machine. <i>Comedians are more than just laugh machines.</i>
métier	An asset of special worth or utility.
normal	A line at right angles to a given line or surface. <i>Her temperature was above normal.</i>
<u>occupation</u>	The control of a country by military forces of a foreign power. <i>He missed the bell in his occupation with the computer game.</i>
position	The relative position or standing of things or especially persons in a society. <i>Moved from third to fifth position.</i>
post	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>This military post provides an important source of income for the town nearby.</i>
<u>profession</u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>His chosen profession of teaching.</i>
<u>province</u>	Northern Ireland. <i>I made my way home to the dreary provinces by train.</i>
pursuit	An activity of a specified kind, especially a recreational or sporting one. <i>The culprit started to run and the cop took off in pursuit.</i>

regular	A regular patron. <i>Pub regulars.</i>
sailing boat	The activity of flying a glider.
<u>ship</u>	A spaceship. <i>A cargo ship.</i>
situation	A position of employment; a job. <i>The situation between her and Jake had come to a head.</i>
skill	The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>The skill of a well trained boxer.</i>
slyness	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception.
spacecraft	A craft capable of traveling in outer space; technically, a satellite around the sun.
spaceship	A spacecraft, especially one controlled by a crew.
standard	Used in names of newspapers. <i>She was still in boarding school and had twice repeated the same standard.</i>
<u>talent</u>	Natural aptitude or skill. <i>Simon is a talent to watch.</i>
technique	Skill or ability in a particular field. <i>He has excellent technique.</i>
<u>trade</u>	A trade wind. <i>They are accused of conspiring to constrain trade.</i>
<u>trickery</u>	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>The dealer resorted to trickery.</i>
trickiness	The quality of being a slippery rascal. <i>These puzzles are famous for their trickiness.</i>
<u>vessel</u>	A tube in which a body fluid circulates. <i>Lord use this lowly vessel let me serve You as You will.</i>
vocation	A strong feeling of suitability for a particular career or occupation. <i>Her vocation as a poet.</i>
walk of life	Careers in general.
watercraft	Skill in sailing and other activities which take place on water.
wiliness	A hypothetical subatomic particle of large mass that interacts weakly with ordinary matter through gravitation; postulated as a constituent of the dark matter of the universe.

work	A place where work is done. Work equals force times distance.
workmanship	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor workmanship.</i>
yacht	An expensive vessel propelled by sail or power and used for cruising or racing. <i>An eighty five foot diesel yacht.</i>

handmade	Made by hand, not by machine, and typically therefore of superior quality. <i>Delicate handmade baby dresses.</i>
ingenuity	The property of being ingenious. <i>The ingenuity of Haydn s scoring.</i>
knack	An acquired or natural skill at doing something. <i>John had the enviable knack of falling asleep anywhere.</i>
originality	The quality of being new and original (not derived from something else). <i>He congratulated her on the originality of her costume.</i>

proficiency	The quality of having great facility and competence. <i>Practice greatly improves proficiency.</i>
skill	A particular ability. <i>Training firms are already seeing a boost from companies looking to skill employees in cloud technologies.</i>
skilled	Having or showing the knowledge, ability, or training to perform a certain activity or task well. <i>Skilled draughtsmen.</i>
sleight	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by sleight of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
tact	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with tact and consideration.</i>
talent	Natural aptitude or skill. <i>I signed all the talent in Rome.</i>
talented	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A talented young musician.</i>
technical	Of or relating to or requiring special knowledge to be understood. <i>An important technical achievement.</i>
technique	A practical method or art applied to some particular task. <i>The techniques used by Turner Rembrandt and Degas.</i>
toolmaker	Someone skilled in making or repairing tools.
virtuosity	Technical skill or fluency or style exhibited by a virtuoso. <i>A performance of considerable virtuosity.</i>
workmanlike	Worthy of a good workman. <i>The book is a workmanlike job with chronology and bibliography and index.</i>
