Possession of the qualities (especially mental qualities) required to do something or get something done.

*The manager had lost his **ability** to motivate the players.*

### **activity**

A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient.

*Respiratory **activity**.*

### **aircraft**

An aeroplane, helicopter, or other machine capable of flight.

<b>art</b>	The products of human creativity works of art collectively. <i>An <b>art</b> exhibition.</i>
<b>artfulness</b>	The quality of being adroit in taking unfair advantage.
<b>boat</b>	A serving dish in the shape of a boat. <i>A gravy <b>boat</b>.</i>
<b>business</b>	Business concerns collectively. <i>The banks are continuing to lose <b>business</b>.</i>
<b><u>calling</u></b>	The action or sound of calling. <i>He considered engineering one of the highest possible <b>callings</b>.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The susceptibility of something to a particular treatment. <i>A graphics <b>capability</b>.</i>
<b><u>career</u></b>	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>He had a long <b>career</b> in the law.</i>
<b>cleverness</b>	Intelligence as manifested in being quick and witty. <i>The <b>cleverness</b> of its design.</i>
<b>competence</b>	The ability to do something successfully or efficiently. <i>Courses to improve the <b>competence</b> of staff.</i>
<b><u>conservative</u></b>	A person who is reluctant to accept changes and new ideas. <i>He was considered a <b>conservative</b> in his approach to Catholic teachings.</i>
<b>craftiness</b>	The quality of being crafty.
<b>craftsmanship</b>	The quality of design and work shown in something made by hand; artistry. <i>A piece of fine <b>craftsmanship</b>.</i>
<b><u>cunning</u></b>	Skill in achieving one's ends by deceit. <i>What resources of energy and <b>cunning</b> it took just to survive.</i>
<b>deviousness</b>	The quality of being deceitful and underhanded.
<b>employment</b>	A person's trade or profession. <i>He is looking for <b>employment</b>.</i>
<b>facility</b>	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>The pianist played with great <b>facility</b>.</i>
<b><u>field</u></b>	The force exerted or potentially exerted in a field. <i>The diamond <b>fields</b> of South Africa.</i>
<b><u>flair</u></b>	A special or instinctive aptitude or ability for doing something well. <i>She dressed with <b>flair</b>.</i>

<b>foxiness</b>	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception.
<b>genius</b>	A natural talent. <i>He sees Adams as the man s evil <b>genius</b>.</i>
<b>gift</b>	The act of giving. <i>That goal was an absolute <b>gift</b>.</i>
<b>guile</b>	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>He used all his <b>guile</b> and guts to free himself from the muddle he was in.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>He gave it up as a bad <b>job</b>.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A special way of doing something. <i>He had a <b>knack</b> for communicating.</i>
<b>line</b>	Denoting an image consisting of lines and solid areas with no gradation of tone. <i>A <b>line</b> block.</i>
<b>line of business</b>	Space for one line of print (one column wide and 1/14 inch deep) used to measure advertising.
<b>line of work</b>	A particular kind of product or merchandise.
<b>machine</b>	A person who acts with the mechanical efficiency of a machine. <i>Comedians are more than just laugh <b>machines</b>.</i>
<b>métier</b>	An asset of special worth or utility.
<b>normal</b>	A line at right angles to a given line or surface. <i>Her temperature was above <b>normal</b>.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	The control of a country by military forces of a foreign power. <i>He missed the bell in his <b>occupation</b> with the computer game.</i>
<b>position</b>	The relative position or standing of things or especially persons in a society. <i>Moved from third to fifth <b>position</b>.</i>
<b>post</b>	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>This military <b>post</b> provides an important source of income for the town nearby.</i>
<b><u>profession</u></b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>His chosen <b>profession</b> of teaching.</i>
<b><u>province</u></b>	Northern Ireland. <i>I made my way home to the dreary <b>provinces</b> by train.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	An activity of a specified kind, especially a recreational or sporting one. <i>The culprit started to run and the cop took off in <b>pursuit</b>.</i>

<b>regular</b>	A regular patron. <i>Pub <b>regulars</b>.</i>
<b>sailing boat</b>	The activity of flying a glider.
<b><u>ship</u></b>	A spaceship. <i>A cargo <b>ship</b>.</i>
<b>situation</b>	A position of employment; a job. <i>The <b>situation</b> between her and Jake had come to a head.</i>
<b>skill</b>	The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b>slyness</b>	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception.
<b>spacecraft</b>	A craft capable of traveling in outer space; technically, a satellite around the sun.
<b>spaceship</b>	A spacecraft, especially one controlled by a crew.
<b>standard</b>	Used in names of newspapers. <i>She was still in boarding school and had twice repeated the same <b>standard</b>.</i>
<b><u>talent</u></b>	Natural aptitude or skill. <i>Simon is a <b>talent</b> to watch.</i>
<b>technique</b>	Skill or ability in a particular field. <i>He has excellent <b>technique</b>.</i>
<b><u>trade</u></b>	A trade wind. <i>They are accused of conspiring to constrain <b>trade</b>.</i>
<b><u>trickery</u></b>	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>The dealer resorted to <b>trickery</b>.</i>
<b>trickiness</b>	The quality of being a slippery rascal. <i>These puzzles are famous for their <b>trickiness</b>.</i>
<b><u>vessel</u></b>	A tube in which a body fluid circulates. <i>Lord use this lowly <b>vessel</b> let me serve You as You will.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	A strong feeling of suitability for a particular career or occupation. <i>Her <b>vocation</b> as a poet.</i>
<b>walk of life</b>	Careers in general.
<b>watercraft</b>	Skill in sailing and other activities which take place on water.
<b>wiliness</b>	A hypothetical subatomic particle of large mass that interacts weakly with ordinary matter through gravitation; postulated as a constituent of the dark matter of the universe.



<b>work</b>	A place where work is done. <b>Work</b> equals force times distance.
<b>workmanship</b>	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
<b>yacht</b>	An expensive vessel propelled by sail or power and used for cruising or racing. <i>An eighty five foot diesel <b>yacht</b>.</i>

<b>artistry</b>	A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation. <i>The <b>artistry</b> of the pianist.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The power or ability to do something. <i>He had an intuitive <b>capability</b> of bringing the best out in people.</i>
<b>competence</b>	The quality of being adequately or well qualified physically and intellectually. <i>Courses to improve the <b>competence</b> of staff.</i>
<b>craftsmanship</b>	Skill in an occupation or trade. <i>A piece of fine <b>craftsmanship</b>.</i>
<b>creativity</b>	The ability to create. The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage <b>creativity</b>.</i>
<b>customize</b>	Make to specifications. <i>The software can be <b>customized</b> to the developing needs of your students.</i>
<b>dexterity</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Her <b>dexterity</b> with chopsticks.</i>
<b>exquisite</b>	Extremely beautiful and delicate. <i><b>Exquisite</b> jewel like portraits.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Great subtlety and tact in handling or manipulating people or difficult situations. <i>Despite the administration s attempts to <b>finesse</b> its mishaps the public remained wary.</i>
<b>handmade</b>	Made by hand, not by machine, and typically therefore of superior quality. <i>Delicate <b>handmade</b> baby dresses.</i>
<b>ingenuity</b>	The property of being ingenious. <i>The <b>ingenuity</b> of Haydn s scoring.</i>
<b>knack</b>	An acquired or natural skill at doing something. <i>John had the enviable <b>knack</b> of falling asleep anywhere.</i>
<b>originality</b>	The quality of being new and original (not derived from something else). <i>He congratulated her on the <b>originality</b> of her costume.</i>



<b>proficiency</b>	The quality of having great facility and competence. <i>Practice greatly improves <b>proficiency</b>.</i>
<b>skill</b>	A particular ability. <i>Training firms are already seeing a boost from companies looking to <b>skill</b> employees in cloud technologies.</i>
<b>skilled</b>	Having or showing the knowledge, ability, or training to perform a certain activity or task well. <i><b>Skilled</b> draughtsmen.</i>
<b>sleight</b>	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>tact</b>	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with <b>tact</b> and consideration.</i>
<b>talent</b>	Natural aptitude or skill. <i>I signed all the <b>talent</b> in Rome.</i>
<b>talented</b>	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A <b>talented</b> young musician.</i>
<b>technical</b>	Of or relating to or requiring special knowledge to be understood. <i>An important <b>technical</b> achievement.</i>
<b>technique</b>	A practical method or art applied to some particular task. <i>The <b>techniques</b> used by Turner Rembrandt and Degas.</i>
<b>toolmaker</b>	Someone skilled in making or repairing tools.
<b>virtuosity</b>	Technical skill or fluency or style exhibited by a virtuoso. <i>A performance of considerable <b>virtuosity</b>.</i>
<b>workmanlike</b>	Worthy of a good workman. <i>The book is a <b>workmanlike</b> job with chronology and bibliography and index.</i>
<b>workmanship</b>	Skill in an occupation or trade. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
