- absolute** (of a transitive verb) used without an expressed object (e.g. guns kill).  
*An **absolute** dimwit.*
- asinine** Extremely stupid or foolish.  
*Lydia ignored his **asinine** remark.*
- blatant** Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious.  
*A **blatant** appeal to vanity.*
- blundering** Making or characterized by stupid or careless mistakes; clumsy.  
*Both her parents are supportive if a bit **blundering**.*
- boorish** Rough and bad-mannered; coarse.  
***Boorish** behaviour.*
- bovine** (of a person or their manner) sluggish or stupid.  
***Bovine** tissue.*
- coarse** Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish.  
*His **coarse** ugly features contorted with rage.*

<b>complete</b>	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A <b>complete</b> accounting.</i>
<b>dense</b>	Hard to pass through because of dense growth. <i><b>Dense</b> smoke.</i>
<b>doltish</b>	(of a person) stupid; idiotic. <i>A <b>doltish</b> character.</i>
<b>downright</b>	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i>A <b>downright</b> lie.</i>
<b>glaring</b>	Highly obvious or conspicuous. <i>The <b>glaring</b> sun.</i>
<b>gross</b>	Before any deductions. <i>A <b>gross</b> slap and tickle version of <i>The Taming of the Shrew</i>.</i>
<b>insensitive</b>	Deficient in human sensibility; not mentally or morally sensitive. <i>Both were in many ways <b>insensitive</b> to painting.</i>
<b>mindless</b>	Not marked by the use of reason. <i><b>Mindless</b> of the fact she was in her nightie she rushed to the door.</i>
<b>oafish</b>	Ill-mannered and coarse and contemptible in behavior or appearance. <i>Her stupid <b>oafish</b> husband.</i>
<b>out-and-out</b>	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
<b>outright</b>	Without reservation or exception. <i>An <b>outright</b> refusal.</i>
<b>perfect</b>	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>Life certainly isn't <b>perfect</b> at the moment.</i>
<b>sheer</b>	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i><b>Sheer</b> wine.</i>
<b>thick</b>	Spoken as if with a thick tongue. <i>A <b>thick</b> French accent.</i>
<b>thorough</b>	Painstakingly careful and accurate. <i>Made a <b>thorough</b> search.</i>
<b>total</b>	Complete in extent or degree and in every particular. <i>It is a matter of <b>total</b> indifference to me.</i>

**undisguised** (of a feeling) not disguised or concealed; open.  
*She looked at him with **undisguised** contempt.*

**unmitigated** Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier.

*An **unmitigated** lie.*

**unqualified** Not limited or restricted.  
*The experiment was not an **unqualified** success.*

**utter** Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers.  
*Charlotte stared at her in **utter** amazement.*

**vacuous** Void of expression.  
*A **vacuous** mind.*

**very great** Precisely as stated.

**witless** Lacking sense or understanding or judgment.  
*He was scared **witless**.*

<b>blithe</b>	Showing a casual and cheerful indifference considered to be callous or improper. <i>Spoke with <b>blithe</b> ignorance of the true situation.</i>
<b>bored</b>	Tired of the world. <i><b>Bored</b> with life.</i>
<b>callous</b>	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. <i>With a workman s <b>callous</b> hands.</i>
<b>coarse</b>	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. <i><b>Coarse</b> anglers.</i>
<u><b>dismissive</b></u>	Stopping to associate with. <i>His <b>dismissive</b> attitude towards women left him isolated.</i>

<b>ignorant</b>	Uneducated in general; lacking knowledge or sophistication. <i>She is <b>ignorant</b> of quantum mechanics.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Fail to consider (something significant). <i>He <b>ignored</b> her outraged question.</i>
<b>inattention</b>	Failure to attend to one's responsibilities; negligence. <i>His <b>inattention</b> to duty.</i>
<b>indifference</b>	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>She shrugged feigning <b>indifference</b>.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	(usually followed by `to') unwilling or refusing to pay heed. <i>A properly <b>indifferent</b> jury.</i>
<b>insensible</b>	Incapable of physical sensation. <i><b>Insensible</b> to the suffering around him.</i>
<u><b>insensitive</b></u>	Not sensitive to a physical sensation. <i><b>Insensitive</b> to radiation.</i>
<u><b>lazy</b></u>	Disinclined to work or exertion. <i><b>Lazy</b> writing.</i>
<u><b>oblivious</b></u>	Not aware of or concerned about what is happening around one. <i><b>Oblivious</b> old age.</i>
<b>obtuse</b>	Slow to learn or understand; lacking intellectual acuity. <i>He wondered if the doctor was being deliberately <b>obtuse</b>.</i>

<b>shiftless</b>	Characterized by laziness, indolence, and a lack of ambition. <i>Studied in a <b>shiftless</b> way.</i>
<b>silly</b>	Having or showing a lack of common sense or judgement; absurd and foolish. <i>He would brood about <b>silly</b> things.</i>
<b><u>simpleton</u></b>	A person lacking intelligence or common sense. <i>Stop grinning at me like a <b>simpleton</b>.</i>
<b><u>unashamed</u></b>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.</i>
<b><u>unconcerned</u></b>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Blithely <b>unconcerned</b> about his friend's plight.</i>
<b>uneducated</b>	Not having a good education. <i>The workforce remains largely <b>uneducated</b> and unskilled.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Having no care or interest in knowing. <i>She appeared totally <b>uninterested</b>.</i>
<b>unlettered</b>	Having little acquaintance with writing. <i>Special tutorials to assist the <b>unlettered</b> sector of society.</i>
<b>unmindful</b>	(followed by `to' or `of') lacking conscious awareness of. <i>Not <b>unmindful</b> of the heavy responsibility.</i>
<b><u>unrefined</u></b>	Not refined; uncouth. <i>How can a refined girl be drawn to such an <b>unrefined</b> man.</i>
<b><u>unsophisticated</u></b>	Awkwardly simple and provincial. <i><b>Unsophisticated</b> computer software.</i>
<b>untutored</b>	Not formally taught or trained. <i>An <b>untutored</b> genius.</i>
