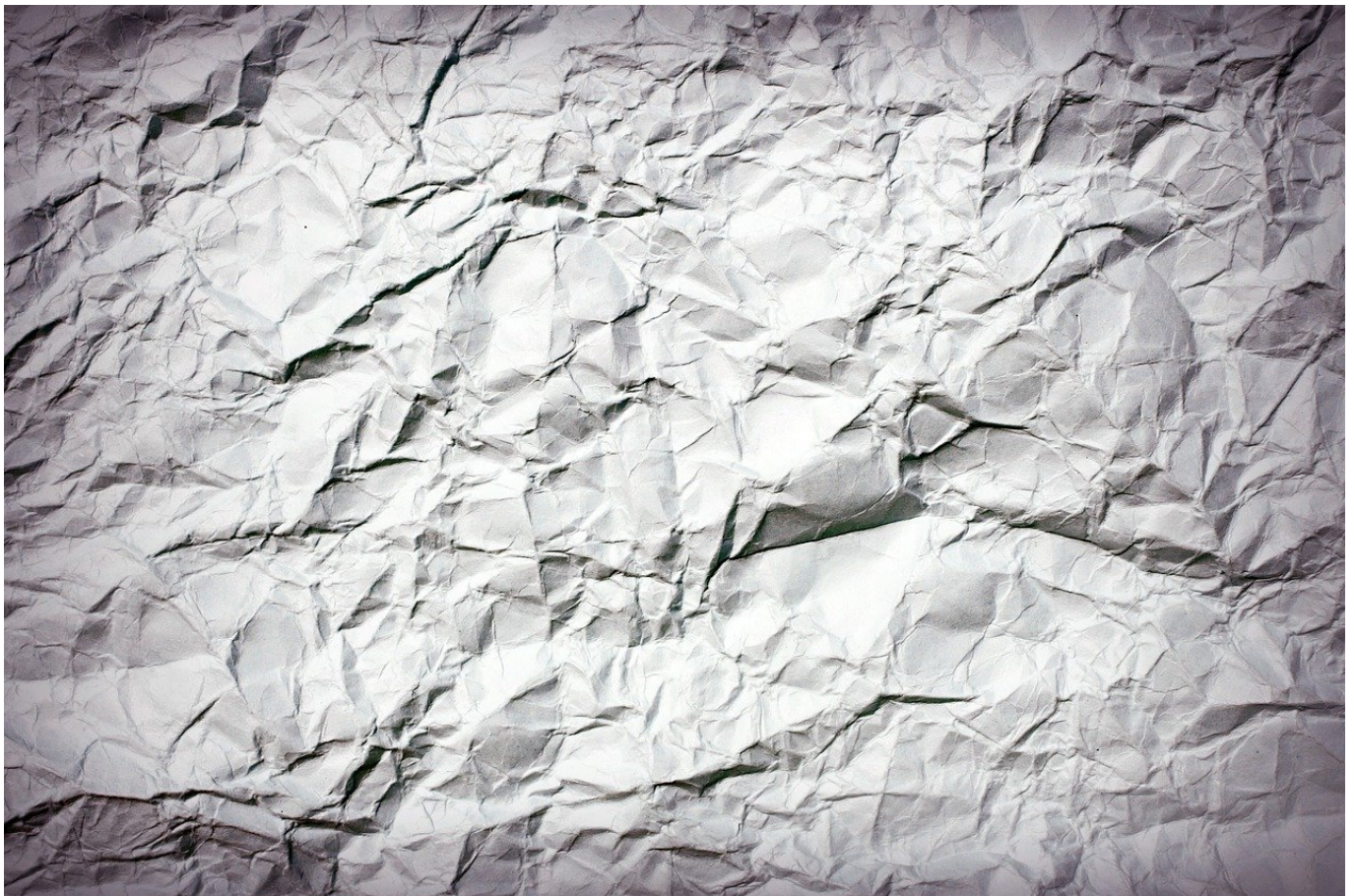
Crease as a Noun

Definitions of "Crease" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “crease” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Any of a number of lines marked on the pitch at specified places.*
- *An area around the goal in ice hockey or lacrosse which the players may not enter unless the puck or the ball has already done so.*
- *A wrinkle or furrow in the skin, especially of the face, caused by age or a particular facial expression.*
- *A slight depression or fold in the smoothness of a surface.*
- *A slight depression in the smoothness of a surface.*
- *A Malayan dagger with a wavy blade.*

- A line or ridge produced on paper or cloth by folding, pressing, or crushing.
- An angular or rounded shape made by folding.
- The position of a batsman during their innings.

| furrow | A rut, groove, or trail in the ground or another surface. <i>Regular furrows in a ploughed field.</i> |
| groove | A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process such as erosion or by a tool as e g a groove in a phonograph record. <i>His thoughts were slipping into a familiar groove.</i> |
| kris | A Malay or Indonesian dagger with a wavy-edged blade. |
| laughter line | The activity of laughing; the manifestation of joy or mirth or scorn. |
| line | Each of usually five horizontal lines forming a stave in musical notation. <i>His entire lineage has been warriors.</i> |
| pleat | A double or multiple fold in a garment or other item made of cloth, held by stitching the top or side. |
| plication | A fold or corrugation. <i>A plication on her blouse.</i> |
| pucker | A tightly gathered wrinkle or small fold. <i>A pucker between his eyebrows.</i> |
| ridge | A long narrow natural elevation on the floor of the ocean. <i>A path led through the ridges and furrows of fields long left to nature.</i> |
| ruck | A group of three players who follow the play without fixed positions. <i>Harry squeezed through the ruck to order another pint.</i> |
| seam | A slight depression in the smoothness of a surface. <i>The track cleaves a seam through corn.</i> |
| tuck | A narrow flattened pleat or fold that is stitched in place. <i>Lenzi nailed a reverse 3 1 2 somersault tuck on his final dive.</i> |
| wrinkle | A clever innovation, or useful piece of information or advice. <i>Learning the wrinkles from someone more experienced saves time.</i> |

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "crease" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Burst out or cause to burst out laughing.*
- *(of a bullet) graze (someone or something).*
- *Make wrinkles or creases on a smooth surface; make a pressed, folded or wrinkled line in; 'crisp' is archaic.*
- *Make a crease in (cloth or paper).*
- *Cause a crease to appear temporarily in (the face or its features), typically as a result of the expression of an emotion or feeling.*
- *Hit or punch (someone) hard.*
- *Scrape gently.*

- *Make wrinkles or creases on a smooth surface; make a pressed, folded or wrinkled line in.*

| <u>tickle</u> | Lightly touch or prod (a person or a part of the body) in a way that causes mild discomfort or itching and often laughter. <i>Here are a couple of anecdotes that might tickle your fancy.</i> |
| wrinkle | Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>This fabric won t wrinkle.</i> |

| <u>stitch</u> | Make mend or join something with stitches. <i>Hand stitched dresses.</i> |
| strut | Brace something with a strut or struts. <i>A spindly framework of long slender struts girders and bracing wire.</i> |
| <u>tangle</u> | A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. <i>A tangle of government regulations.</i> |

- undulate** Have a smoothly rising and falling form or outline.
*The landscape rolled and **undulated** for miles in every direction.*
- waistline** The measurement around a person's body at the waist.

- wizened** Shrivelled or wrinkled with age.
*A **wizened** little man with frizzy grey hair.*
- wrinkle** Grimace and cause wrinkles on a part of the face.
