- *A human being; 'wight' is an archaic term.*

animal	An animal as opposed to a human being. <i>Those men have to be animals what they did to that boy was savage.</i>
beast	A thing possessing a specified quality. <i>Sex beasts who are assaulting victims.</i>
beggar	A person of a specified type, especially one to be envied or pitied. <i>Poor little beggars.</i>
<u>being</u>	Being alive living. <i>Many factions remained in being.</i>
brute	A living organism characterized by voluntary movement. <i>A great brute of a machine.</i>
character	A characteristic property that defines the apparent individual nature of something. <i>To what do I owe this attack on my character.</i>

fauna	The animals of a particular region, habitat, or geological period. <i>The flora and fauna of Siberia.</i>
<u>fellow</u>	An informal form of address for a man. <i>He was elected a fellow of the American Physiological Association.</i>
flunkey	A person of unquestioning obedience.
hireling	A person who works only for money. <i>The poorly paid hirelings in their shabby clothes.</i>
human	A human being.
human being	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
individual	A human being. <i>Boat trips for parties and individuals.</i>
lackey	A servant, especially a liveried footman or manservant. <i>Lackeys were waiting to help them from the carriage.</i>
<u>minion</u>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i>
mortal	A human being subject to death, as opposed to a divine being. <i>An ambassador had to live in a style which was not expected of lesser mortals.</i>
person	A category used in the classification of pronouns possessive determiners and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker first person the addressee second person or a third party third person. <i>A weapon was hidden on his person.</i>
<u>puppet</u>	A small figure of a person operated from above with strings by a puppeteer. <i>A former revolutionary hero who is now a puppet of the state.</i>
retainer	A servant, especially one who has worked for a person or family for a long time. <i>Faithful family retainers.</i>
<u>servant</u>	A person employed in the service of a government. <i>A government servant.</i>
soul	The spiritual or immaterial part of a human being or animal, regarded as immortal. <i>Brevity is the soul of wit.</i>
<u>subordinate</u>	An assistant subject to the authority or control of another. <i>He was mild mannered especially with his subordinates.</i>
thing	Anything used for emphasis. <i>He looks like he s wearing boxers underneath his trunks is that a thing.</i>

tool	A distinct design in the tooling of a book. <i>Computers are an essential tool.</i>
vassal	A person or country in a subordinate position to another. <i>A vassal state of the Ottoman Empire.</i>
wight	A human being wight is an archaic term. <i>He always was an unlucky wight.</i>
wretch	Someone you feel sorry for. <i>Can the poor wretch s corpse tell us anything.</i>

- being** Being alive living.

- biologically** With respect to biology.
*The world s most **biologically** diverse ecosystems.*

brute	A living organism characterized by voluntary movement. <i>A great brute of a machine.</i>
dweller	A person or animal that lives in or at a specified place. <i>City dwellers.</i>
existence	All that exists. <i>The biggest tree in existence.</i>
<u>existential</u>	Of or as conceived by existentialism. <i>Formal logicians are not concerned with existential matters.</i>
<u>extant</u>	Still in existence; surviving. <i>Extant manuscripts.</i>
fauna	All the animal life in a particular region or period. <i>The flora and fauna of Siberia.</i>
flagellate	A usually nonphotosynthetic free-living protozoan with whiplike appendages; some are pathogens of humans and other animals. <i>He flagellated himself with branches.</i>
fungus	An organism of the kingdom Fungi lacking chlorophyll and feeding on organic matter; ranging from unicellular or multicellular organisms to spore-bearing syncytia. <i>Fallen logs were overgrown with bright fungus.</i>
genetically	By genetic mechanisms. <i>Hair colour is genetically determined.</i>
<u>habitat</u>	The natural home or environment of an animal, plant, or other organism. <i>A marine habitat.</i>
humankind	Human beings considered collectively (used as a neutral alternative to 'mankind'). <i>The origin of humankind.</i>
<u>incarnation</u>	The form taken by a person or thing during an incarnation. <i>In a previous journalistic incarnation I worked at Westminster.</i>
<u>inhabit</u>	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>Strange notions inhabited her mind.</i>
life	An account of the series of events making up a person's life. <i>She didn't want to die she loved life.</i>
<u>lifelong</u>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i>
<u>living</u>	Pertaining to living persons. <i>What does he do for a living.</i>

<u>organism</u>	The material structure of an organism. <i>The Church is a divinely constituted organism.</i>
outlive	Survive or last beyond (a specified period or expected lifespan). <i>She outlived her husband by many years.</i>
phylum	(linguistics) a large group of languages that are historically related.
physiology	The branch of the biological sciences dealing with the functioning of organisms. <i>The physiology of the brain.</i>
<u>presence</u>	The act of being present. <i>My presence in the flat made her happy.</i>
protoplasm	The substance of a living cell (including cytoplasm and nucleus).
unicellular	(of an evolutionary or developmental stage) characterized by the formation or presence of a single cell or cells. <i>The unicellular precursors of arms and legs.</i>
vertebrate	Denoting a vertebrate or relating to the vertebrates as a group.
zoology	The branch of biology that studies animals. <i>The zoology of the Pliocene epoch.</i>
