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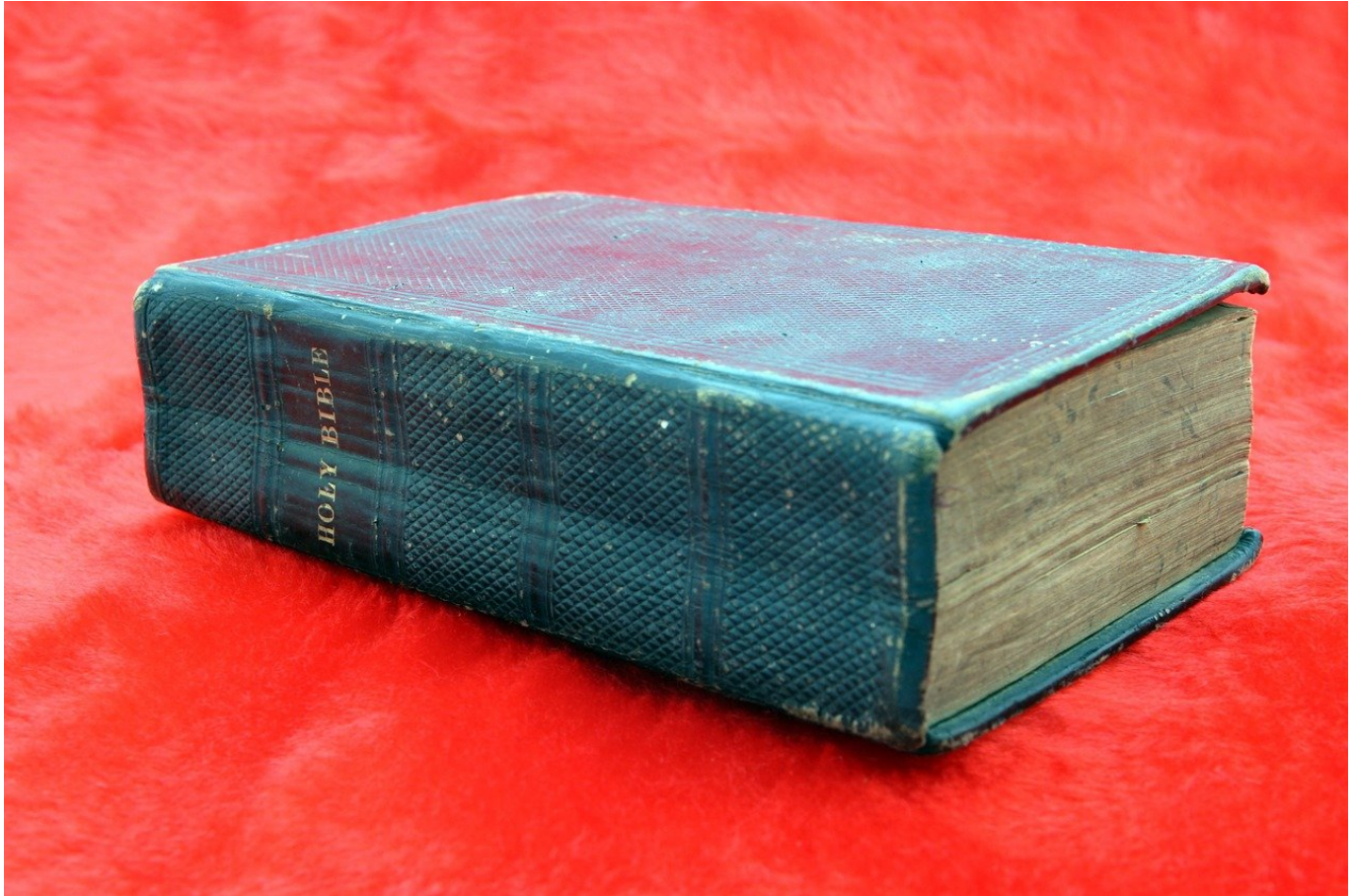

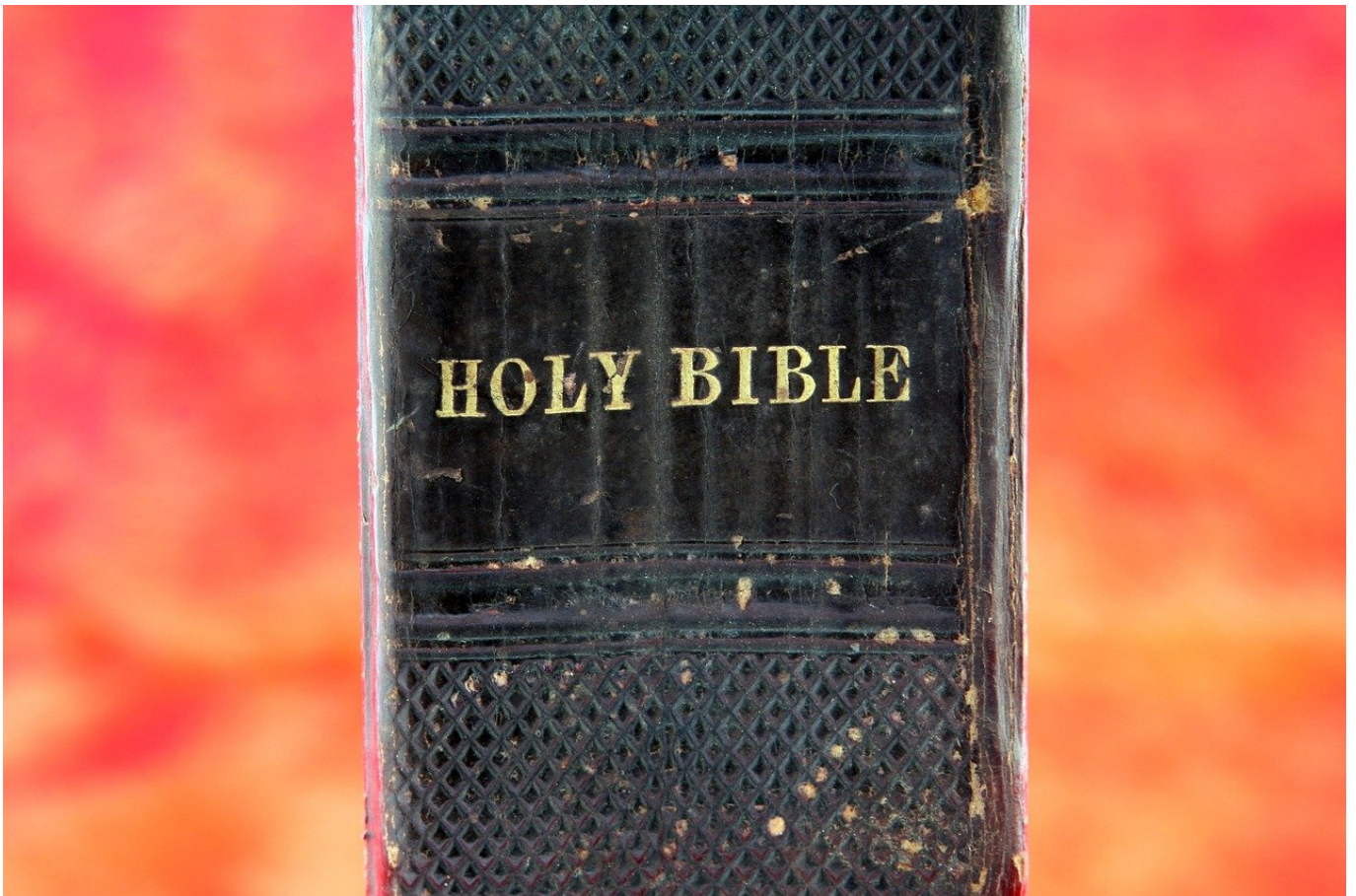
The list of works considered to be permanently established as being of the highest quality.

code of ethics	A coding system used for transmitting messages requiring brevity or secrecy.
<u>conscience</u>	Motivation deriving logically from ethical or moral principles that govern a person's thoughts and actions. <i>He has no conscience about his cruelty.</i>
<u>creed</u>	Any system of principles or beliefs. <i>People of many creeds and cultures.</i>
criterion	A basis for comparison; a reference point against which other things can be evaluated. <i>They award a green label to products that meet certain environmental criteria.</i>
decency	Things required for a reasonable standard of life. <i>She had the decency to come and confess.</i>
<u>dictum</u>	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old dictum might is right.</i>
<u>doctrine</u>	A belief or set of beliefs held and taught by a Church, political party, or other group. <i>The doctrine of predestination.</i>
<u>dogma</u>	A doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>He believed all the Marxist dogma.</i>
ethic	A set of moral principles, especially ones relating to or affirming a specified group, field, or form of conduct. <i>The Puritan ethic.</i>
ethics	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong. <i>A code of ethics.</i>
<u>formula</u>	A formulation. <i>A legal formula.</i>
guideline	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. <i>The organization has issued guidelines for people working with prisoners.</i>
high-mindedness	Elevated ideals or conduct; the quality of believing that ideals should be pursued.
honour	High respect; great esteem. <i>She died defending her honour.</i>
ideals	The idea of something that is perfect; something that one hopes to attain.

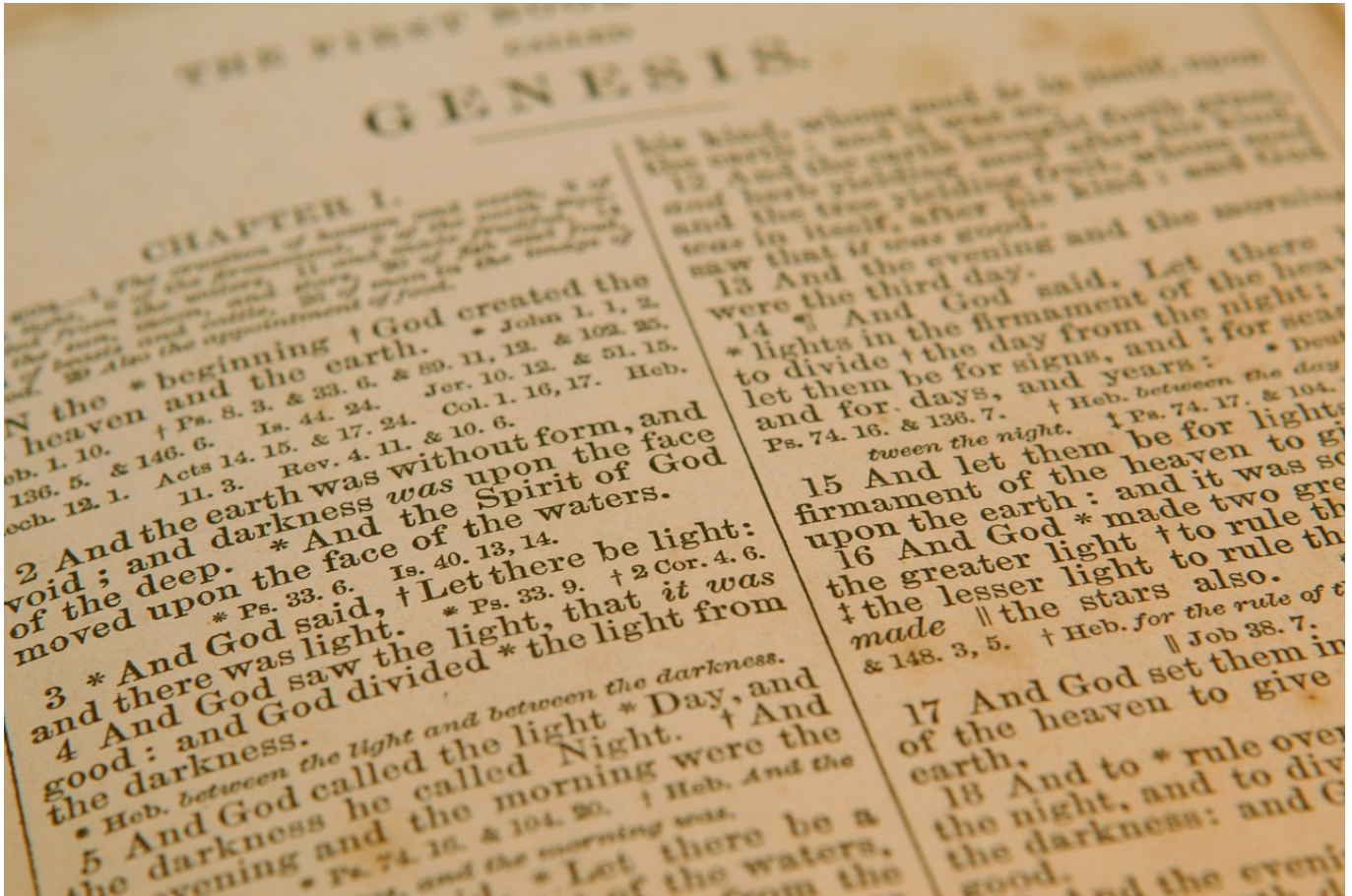
integrity	An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting. <i>They admired his scrupulous professional integrity.</i>
law	Statute law and the common law. <i>The laws of the game.</i>
maxim	A saying that is widely accepted on its own merits. <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i>
moral standards	The significance of a story or event.
moral values	The significance of a story or event.
morality	The extent to which an action is right or wrong. <i>The issue of the morality of the possession of nuclear weapons.</i>
morals	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong.
motto	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>The family motto is Faithful though Unfortunate.</i>
notion	Items used in sewing, such as buttons, pins, and hooks. <i>She had a notion to ring her friend at work.</i>
probity	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>Financial probity.</i>
rectitude	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
righteousness	The quality of being morally right or justifiable. <i>Conviction of his own moral righteousness gave his oratory an irresistible power.</i>
rule	A strip of wood or other rigid material used for measuring length or marking straight lines a ruler. <i>The rule of St Dominic.</i>
scruples	An ethical or moral principle that inhibits action.
sense of duty	A natural appreciation or ability.
sense of honour	A natural appreciation or ability.
standard	A board measure = 1980 board feet. <i>The system had become an industry standard.</i>
standards	A board measure = 1980 board feet. <i>Lamps supported on standards provided illumination.</i>
tenet	A principle or belief, especially one of the main principles of a religion or philosophy. <i>The tenets of classical liberalism.</i>

truism	A statement that is obviously true and says nothing new or interesting. <i>The truism that you get what you pay for.</i>
uprightness	The condition or quality of being honourable or honest; rectitude. <i>There is a general lack of uprightness in these postmodern times.</i>
virtue	Morality with respect to sexual relations. <i>Mike was extolling the virtues of the car.</i>

dogma	A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true. <i>The dogmas of faith.</i>
ecclesiastic	A priest or member of the clergy. <i>Ecclesiastic history.</i>
faith	Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>He cherished the faith of a good woman.</i>
godly	Emanating from God. <i>How to live the godly life.</i>
heterodoxy	The quality of being unorthodox. <i>His work was marked by elements of theological heterodoxy.</i>
jewish	Of or relating to Jews or their culture or religion.
martyrdom	Death that is imposed because of the person's adherence of a religious faith or cause. <i>You know martyrdom isn't my style.</i>
mormon	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of the Mormon Church.
pantheism	The worship or tolerance of many gods.
persecution	Hostility and ill-treatment, especially on the basis of ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation or political beliefs. <i>His persecution at the hands of other students.</i>
pharisaic	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
pilgrimage	Go on a pilgrimage. <i>He wanted to go on a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela.</i>
pious	Dutiful or loyal, especially towards one's parents. <i>Pious readings.</i>
puritan	Having or displaying censorious moral beliefs, especially about self-indulgence and sex. <i>As the puritan ethic has weakened hedonism has replaced it.</i>
religious	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>A religious man.</i>
sacrament	A formal religious ceremony conferring a specific grace on those who receive it; the two Protestant ceremonies are baptism and the Lord's Supper; in the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church there are seven traditional r. <i>He heard Mass and received the sacrament.</i>

saint	Declare a dead person to be a saint. <i>The sandy shores of the River Nid where Holy Olaf's bones were laid to rest before he had been sainted.</i>
saintly	Marked by utter benignity; resembling or befitting an angel or saint. <i>A saintly concern for his fellow men.</i>
<u>sanctimonious</u>	Excessively or hypocritically pious. <i>What happened to all the sanctimonious talk about putting his family first.</i>
sect	A group of people with somewhat different religious beliefs (typically regarded as heretical) from those of a larger group to which they belong. <i>Two of the older sects the Congregationalists and the Baptists were able to increase their membership dramatically.</i>
<u>shrine</u>	Enclose in a shrine. <i>The medieval pilgrim route to the shrine of St James.</i>
theism	Belief in the existence of a god or gods, specifically of a creator who intervenes in the universe. <i>There are many different forms of theism.</i>
theological	Of or relating to or concerning theology. <i>Theological writings.</i>
