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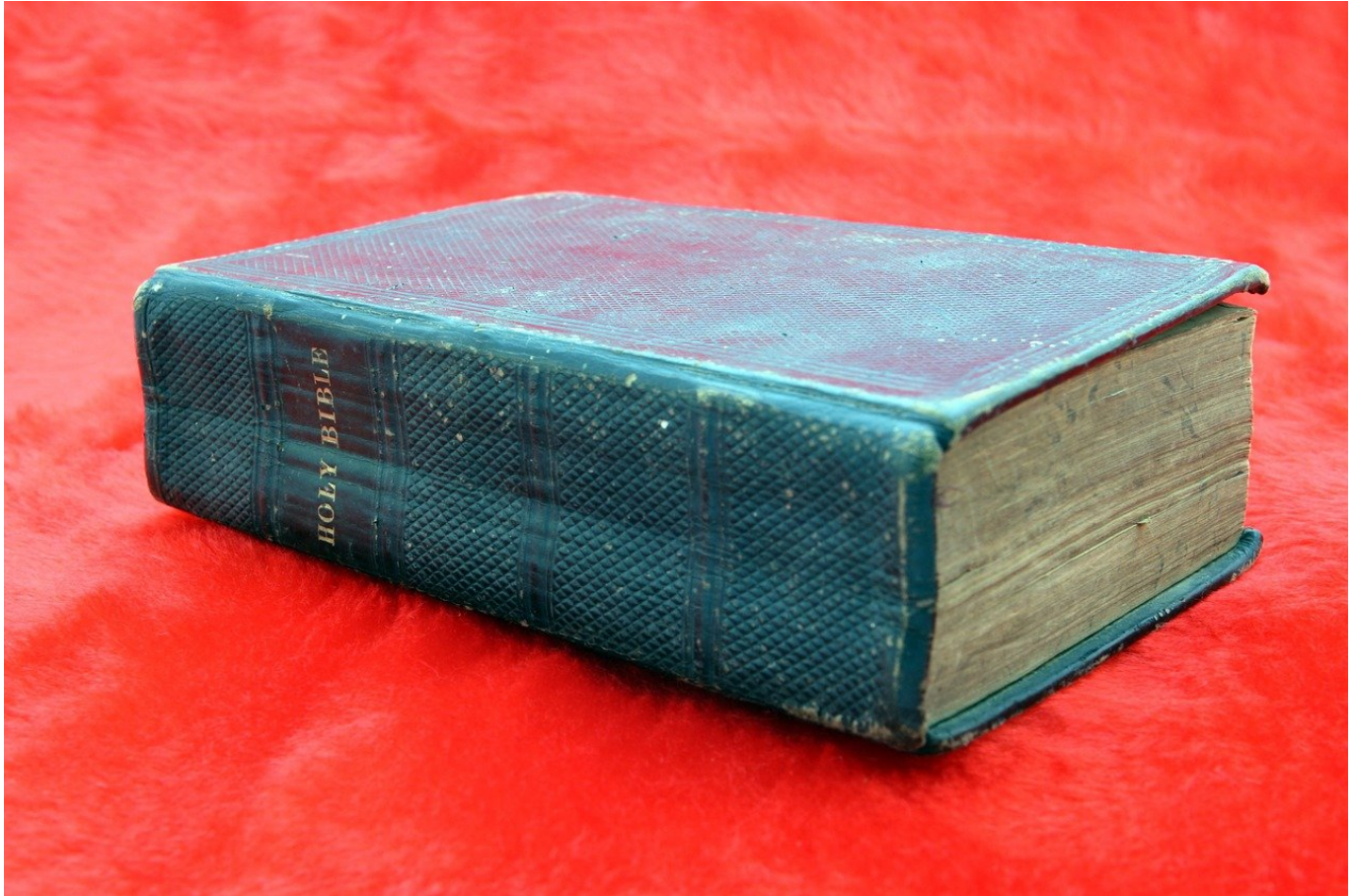

The list of works considered to be permanently established as being of the highest quality.

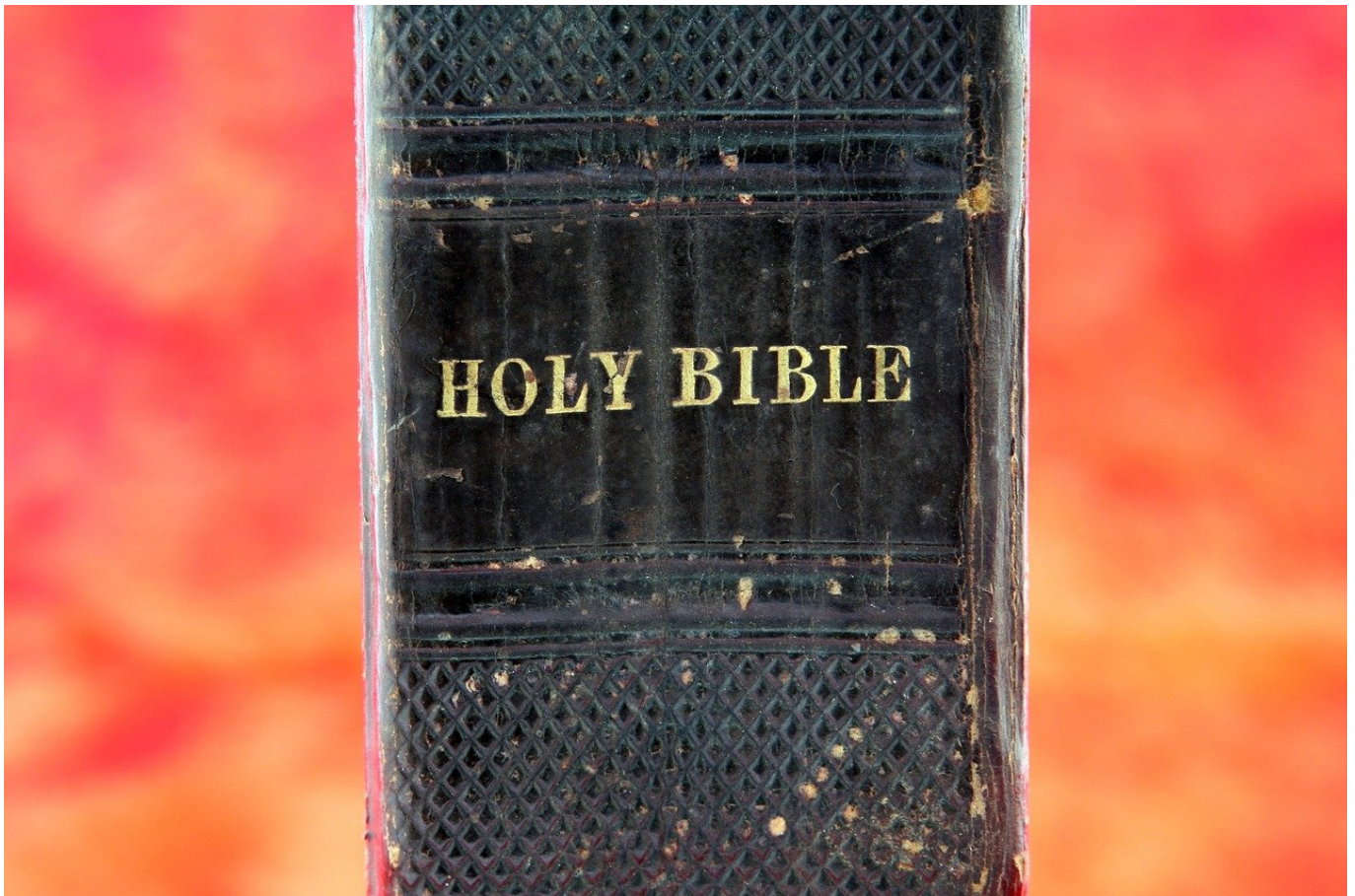

<b><u>code</u></b>	Program instructions. <i>A strict dress <b>code</b>.</i>
<b>code of ethics</b>	A coding system used for transmitting messages requiring brevity or secrecy.
<b><u>conscience</u></b>	Motivation deriving logically from ethical or moral principles that govern a person's thoughts and actions. <i>He has no <b>conscience</b> about his cruelty.</i>
<b><u>creed</u></b>	Any system of principles or beliefs. <i>People of many <b>creeds</b> and cultures.</i>
<b>criterion</b>	A basis for comparison; a reference point against which other things can be evaluated. <i>They award a green label to products that meet certain environmental criteria.</i>
<b>decency</b>	Things required for a reasonable standard of life. <i>She had the <b>decency</b> to come and confess.</i>
<b><u>dictum</u></b>	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old <b>dictum</b> might is right.</i>
<b><u>doctrine</u></b>	A belief or set of beliefs held and taught by a Church, political party, or other group. <i>The <b>doctrine</b> of predestination.</i>
<b><u>dogma</u></b>	A doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>He believed all the Marxist <b>dogma</b>.</i>
<b>ethic</b>	A set of moral principles, especially ones relating to or affirming a specified group, field, or form of conduct. <i>The Puritan <b>ethic</b>.</i>
<b>ethics</b>	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong. <i>A code of <b>ethics</b>.</i>
<b><u>formula</u></b>	A formulation. <i>A legal <b>formula</b>.</i>
<b>guideline</b>	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. <i>The organization has issued <b>guidelines</b> for people working with prisoners.</i>
<b>high-mindedness</b>	Elevated ideals or conduct; the quality of believing that ideals should be pursued.
<b>honour</b>	High respect; great esteem. <i>She died defending her <b>honour</b>.</i>
<b>ideals</b>	The idea of something that is perfect; something that one hopes to attain.

<b>integrity</b>	An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting. <i>They admired his scrupulous professional <b>integrity</b>.</i>
<b>law</b>	Statute law and the common law. <i>The <b>laws</b> of the game.</i>
<b>maxim</b>	A saying that is widely accepted on its own merits. <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>moral standards</b>	The significance of a story or event.
<b>moral values</b>	The significance of a story or event.
<b>morality</b>	The extent to which an action is right or wrong. <i>The issue of the <b>morality</b> of the possession of nuclear weapons.</i>
<b>morals</b>	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong.
<b>motto</b>	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>The family <b>motto</b> is Faithful though Unfortunate.</i>
<b>notion</b>	Items used in sewing, such as buttons, pins, and hooks. <i>She had a <b>notion</b> to ring her friend at work.</i>
<b>probity</b>	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>Financial <b>probity</b>.</i>
<b>rectitude</b>	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of <b>rectitude</b>.</i>
<b>righteousness</b>	The quality of being morally right or justifiable. <i>Conviction of his own moral <b>righteousness</b> gave his oratory an irresistible power.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A strip of wood or other rigid material used for measuring length or marking straight lines a ruler. <i>The <b>rule</b> of St Dominic.</i>
<b>scruples</b>	An ethical or moral principle that inhibits action.
<b>sense of duty</b>	A natural appreciation or ability.
<b>sense of honour</b>	A natural appreciation or ability.
<b>standard</b>	A board measure = 1980 board feet. <i>The system had become an industry <b>standard</b>.</i>
<b>standards</b>	A board measure = 1980 board feet. <i>Lamps supported on <b>standards</b> provided illumination.</i>
<b>tenet</b>	A principle or belief, especially one of the main principles of a religion or philosophy. <i>The <b>tenets</b> of classical liberalism.</i>

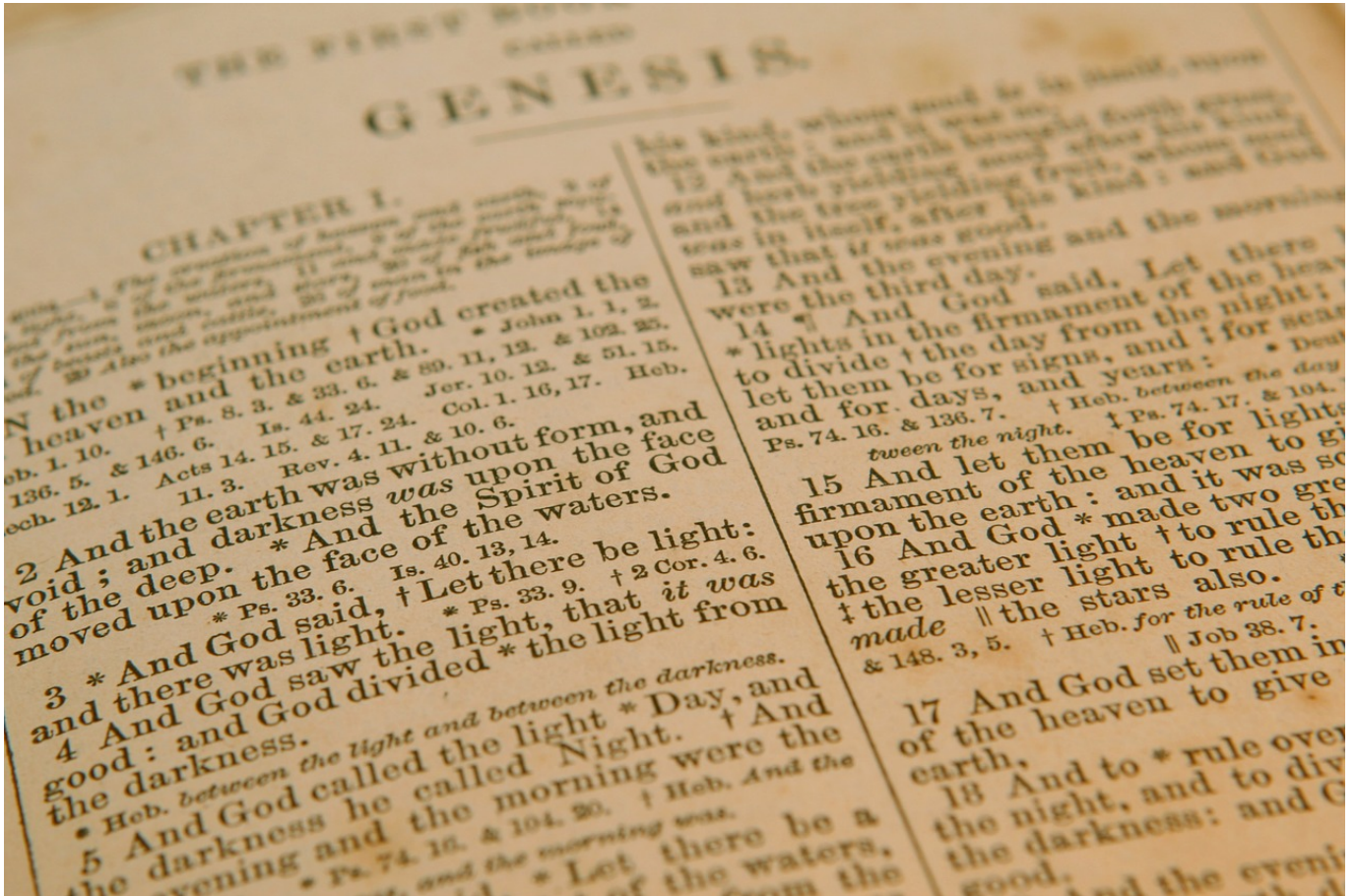


<b>truism</b>	A statement that is obviously true and says nothing new or interesting. <i>The <b>truism</b> that you get what you pay for.</i>
<b>uprightness</b>	The condition or quality of being honourable or honest; rectitude. <i>There is a general lack of <b>uprightness</b> in these postmodern times.</i>
<b>virtue</b>	Morality with respect to sexual relations. <i>Mike was extolling the <b>virtues</b> of the car.</i>

<b>dogma</b>	A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true. <i>The <b>dogmas</b> of faith.</i>
<b>ecclesiastic</b>	A priest or member of the clergy. <i><b>Ecclesiastic</b> history.</i>
<b>faith</b>	Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>He cherished the <b>faith</b> of a good woman.</i>
<b>godly</b>	Emanating from God. <i>How to live the <b>godly</b> life.</i>
<b>heterodoxy</b>	The quality of being unorthodox. <i>His work was marked by elements of theological <b>heterodoxy</b>.</i>
<b>jewish</b>	Of or relating to Jews or their culture or religion.
<b>martyrdom</b>	Death that is imposed because of the person's adherence of a religious faith or cause. <i>You know <b>martyrdom</b> isn't my style.</i>
<b>mormon</b>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of the Mormon Church.
<b>pantheism</b>	The worship or tolerance of many gods.
<b>persecution</b>	Hostility and ill-treatment, especially on the basis of ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation or political beliefs. <i>His <b>persecution</b> at the hands of other students.</i>
<b>pharisaic</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
<b>pilgrimage</b>	Go on a pilgrimage. <i>He wanted to go on a <b>pilgrimage</b> to Santiago de Compostela.</i>
<b>pious</b>	Dutiful or loyal, especially towards one's parents. <i><b>Pious</b> readings.</i>
<b>puritan</b>	Having or displaying censorious moral beliefs, especially about self-indulgence and sex. <i>As the <b>puritan</b> ethic has weakened hedonism has replaced it.</i>
<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>A <b>religious</b> man.</i>
<b>sacrament</b>	A formal religious ceremony conferring a specific grace on those who receive it; the two Protestant ceremonies are baptism and the Lord's Supper; in the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church there are seven traditional r. <i>He heard Mass and received the <b>sacrament</b>.</i>

<b>saint</b>	Declare a dead person to be a saint. <i>The sandy shores of the River Nid where Holy Olaf's bones were laid to rest before he had been <b>sainted</b>.</i>
<b>saintly</b>	Marked by utter benignity; resembling or befitting an angel or saint. <i>A <b>saintly</b> concern for his fellow men.</i>
<b>sanctimonious</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious. <i>What happened to all the <b>sanctimonious</b> talk about putting his family first.</i>
<b>sect</b>	A group of people with somewhat different religious beliefs (typically regarded as heretical) from those of a larger group to which they belong. <i>Two of the older <b>sects</b> the Congregationalists and the Baptists were able to increase their membership dramatically.</i>
<b>shrine</b>	Enclose in a shrine. <i>The medieval pilgrim route to the <b>shrine</b> of St James.</i>
<b>theism</b>	Belief in the existence of a god or gods, specifically of a creator who intervenes in the universe. <i>There are many different forms of <b>theism</b>.</i>
<b>theological</b>	Of or relating to or concerning theology. <i><b>Theological</b> writings.</i>
