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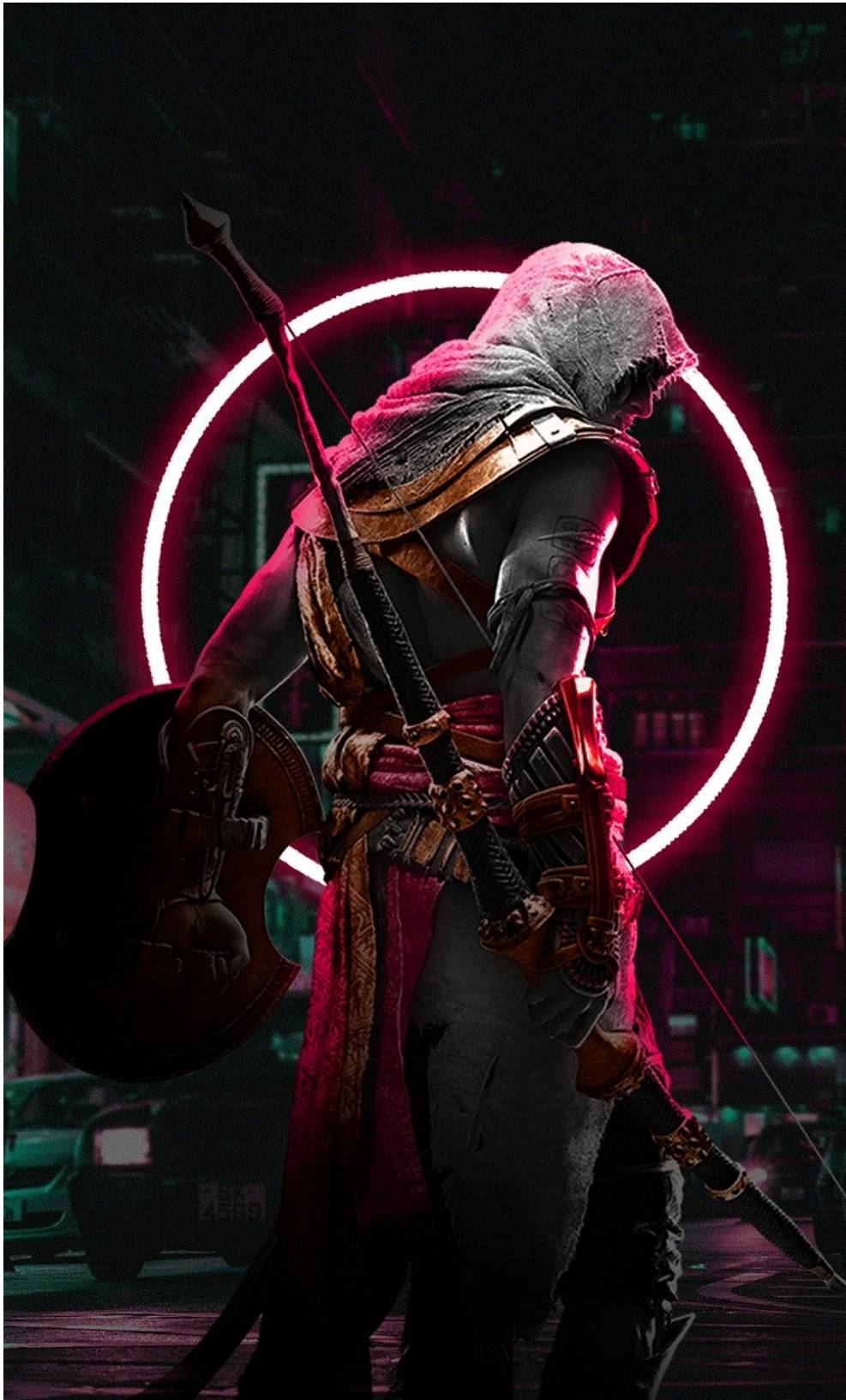

<b>credo</b>	A statement of the beliefs or aims which guide someone's actions. <i>He announced his <b>credo</b> in his first editorial.</i>
<b>denomination</b>	A group of religious congregations having its own organization and a distinctive faith. <i>He flashed a fistful of bills of large <b>denominations</b>.</i>
<b>dogma</b>	A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true. <i>The <b>dogmas</b> of faith.</i>
<b>ecclesiastic</b>	A clergyman or other person in religious orders. <i><b>Ecclesiastic</b> history.</i>
<b>faith</b>	An institution to express belief in a divine power. <i>They broke <b>faith</b> with their investors.</i>
<b>godly</b>	Devoutly religious; pious. <i>Leading a <b>godly</b> life.</i>
<b>heterodoxy</b>	Any opinions or doctrines at variance with the official or orthodox position. <i>His work was marked by elements of theological <b>heterodoxy</b>.</i>
<b>holy</b>	Belonging to or derived from or associated with a divine power. <i>Saints and <b>holy</b> men.</i>
<b>jewish</b>	Of or relating to Jews or their culture or religion.
<b>martyrdom</b>	A display of pretended or exaggerated suffering to obtain sympathy. <i>You know <b>martyrdom</b> isn't my style.</i>
<b>mormon</b>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of the Mormon Church.
<b>pharisaic</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
<b>pilgrimage</b>	Go on a pilgrimage. <i>His passion was opera and he made annual <b>pilgrimages</b> to Bayreuth.</i>
<b>pious</b>	Devoutly religious. <i>A deeply <b>pious</b> woman.</i>
<b>priest</b>	Ordain to the priesthood. <i>He was made deacon in 1990 and <b>priested</b> in 1994.</i>
<b>protestant</b>	An adherent of Protestantism.
<b>puritan</b>	A person with censorious moral beliefs, especially about self-indulgence and sex. <i>As the <b>puritan</b> ethic has weakened hedonism has replaced it.</i>

<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <b>Religious</b> attitude.
<b>sacrament</b>	(in the Christian Church) a religious ceremony or ritual regarded as imparting divine grace, such as baptism, the Eucharist and (in the Roman Catholic and many Orthodox Churches) penance and the anointing of the sick. <i>He heard Mass and received the <b>sacrament</b>.</i>
<b>saint</b>	Used in titles of religious saints. <i>The sandy shores of the River Nid where Holy Olaf's bones were laid to rest before he had been <b>sainted</b>.</i>
<b>saintly</b>	Relating to a saint. <i>A truly <b>saintly</b> woman.</i>
<b>sanctimonious</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious. <i>A sickening <b>sanctimonious</b> smile.</i>
<b>shrine</b>	Enclose in a shrine. <i>Her grave has become a <b>shrine</b> for fans from all over the world.</i>
<b>theism</b>	The doctrine or belief in the existence of a God or gods. <i>There are many different forms of <b>theism</b>.</i>
