Worrying or disturbing. alarming

Our countryside is disappearing at an alarming rate.

Extremely shocking; horrific.

awful An awful voice.

Provoking fear terror. **chilling**

A chilling account of the prisoners fate.

creepy-crawly Causing a sensation as of things crawling on your skin.

Making someone afraid or anxious; terrifying. **frightening**

A **frightening** experience.

Of or like a ghost in appearance or sound; eerie and unnatural. ghostly

A **ghostly** face at the window.

hair-raising Extremely alarming.



harrowing Extremely painful.

A harrowing film about racism and violence.

horrible Provoking horror.

War is beyond all words horrible.

horrific Causing fear or dread or terror.

Horrific injuries.

horrifying Causing horror; extremely shocking. *An alarming even horrifying picture.*

macabre Disturbing because concerned with or causing a fear of death.

Macabre tales of war and plague in the Middle ages.

nightmarish Extremely alarming.

A **nightmarish** vision of the future.

petrifying Paralyzing with terror.

shocking Glaringly vivid and graphic; marked by sensationalism.

Shocking behaviour.

Causing extreme terror.

The **terrifying** events of the past few weeks.





Usage Examples of "Creepy" as an adjective

- The creepy feelings one often gets in a strange house.
- Some creepy kids were bothering her.
- A creepy story.
- I had a creepy-crawly feeling.





Associations of "Creepy" (30 Words)

A formal written defense of something you believe in strongly. apology

We owe you an apology.

Cause (a person or their mind) to be astonished. boggle

The inflated salary of a star **boggle**s the mind.

Crouch or curl up. cower

Children **cower**ed in terror as the shoot out erupted.

Feel as if crawling with insects. <u>crawl</u>

I turned without stopping and **crawl**ed back to the deep end.

Show submission or fear.

cringe I **cringe**d at the fellow s stupidity.

A crouching stance or posture. crouch

He **crouch**ed down.



duck Flesh of a duck domestic or wild.

Before he could **duck** another stone struck him.

flinch An act of flinching.

I rarely **flinch** from a fight when I m sure of myself.

Marked by quiet and caution and secrecy; taking pains to avoid being

<u>furtive</u> observed.

A **furtive** manner.

grovel Lie or crawl abjectly on the ground with one's face downwards.

He **grovel**led at George s feet.

A number of people gathered together to speak about private or secret

huddle matters.

He controls the **huddle** and the team better than anybody else.

insidious Beguiling but harmful. *Insidious* pleasures.

(of an unpleasant quality) be present in a latent or barely discernible state,

lurk although still presenting a threat.

Danger lurks beneath the surface.

Assume a posture as for artistic purposes.

And still these two were **posture**d motionless.

purloinMake off with belongings of others.

He must have managed to **purloin** a copy of the key.

The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed

rebound shot.

His shot hammered into the post and **rebound**ed across the goal.

The action of recoiling.

recoil

If man upsets his planetary ecosystem it will automatically recoil upon him.

(of a clock or watch) indicate (a specified time.

Let us **say** that he did not tell the truth.

In secrecy; not openly.

Met **secretly** to discuss the invasion plans.

Fit something tightly on or on to another object by expanding it with heat

shrink and then cooling it rapidly after positioning.

The metal is unsuitable for **shrink**ing on to wooden staves.

Without speaking.

She sobbed **silently** in the corner.

A period of sitting.

The Senate has 100 members who **sit** for 6 years.



sneak Someone who prowls or sneaks about usually with unlawful intentions.

Sneak a look.

snitch Steal.

Someone **snitch**ed my wallet.

squatA squatting position.
A **squat** grey house.

In a stealthy manner.

stealthilyI woke up and **stealthily** crept downstairs.
