- *A long narrow depression in a surface.*
- *A narrow opening or fissure, especially in a rock or wall.*
- *A long narrow opening.*



Synonyms of "Crevice" as a noun (20 Words)

breach	A gap in a wall, barrier, or defence, especially one made by an attacking army. <i>A breach in the mountain wall.</i>
chap	A crack in a lip caused usually by cold. <i>That chap is your host.</i>
cleft	A long narrow opening.
cranny	A long narrow depression in a surface. <i>Bugs and spiders conceal themselves in crannies of the bark.</i>
fissure	A long narrow depression in a surface. <i>The bacteria survive around vents or fissures in the deep ocean floor.</i>
fracture	A diphthong substituted by fracture. <i>It was a nasty fracture.</i>
interstice	An intervening space, especially a very small one. <i>The interstices of a network.</i>
nook	An interior angle formed by two meeting walls. <i>The fish should be able to find nooks and crannies in which they will be safe.</i>
perforation	A line of small holes for tearing at a particular place. <i>A perforation of the eardrum.</i>
rent	A payment or series of payments made by the lessee to an owner for use of some property, facility, equipment, or service. <i>The rise in council house rents.</i>
rift	A major fault separating blocks of the earth's surface a rift valley. <i>The wind had torn open a rift in the clouds.</i>
rupture	The act of making a sudden noisy break. <i>The rupture with his father would never be healed.</i>
scissure	Division into two parts; cleavage.
slit	A long, narrow cut or opening. <i>Arrow slits.</i>
slot	A slot machine that is used for gambling. <i>Landing slots at Heathrow airport.</i>
split	A single thickness of split hide. <i>Splits appeared in the decaying planks.</i>
vent	An opening that allows air, gas, or liquid to pass out of or into a confined space. <i>Children give vent to their anger in various ways.</i>



Usage Examples of "Crevice" as a noun

- *Many creatures hide in crevices in the rock.*



Associations of "Crevice" (30 Words)

aperture	An man-made opening; usually small. <i>The genital aperture of an insect.</i>
avulsion	The action of pulling or tearing away.
break	The occurrence of breaking. <i>The council says it will prosecute traders who break the law.</i>
cleavage	(embryology) the repeated division of a fertilised ovum. <i>She wore a dress that exposed an inch or two of cleavage.</i>
cleft	Split or divided. <i>A cleft stick.</i>

<u>collapse</u>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>The talks collapsed last week over territorial issues.</i>
deformity	An affliction in which some part of the body is misshapen or malformed. <i>Respiratory problems caused by spinal deformity.</i>
<u>diverge</u>	Move or draw apart. <i>The two paths diverge here.</i>
divergent	Diverging from another or from a standard. <i>A divergent opinion.</i>
epiglottis	A flap of cartilage that covers the windpipe while swallowing.
<u>faulty</u>	Having a defect. <i>A faulty brake.</i>
fissure	Break into fissures or fine cracks. <i>The dry years had cracked and fissured the cliffs.</i>
<u>fracture</u>	Become fractured. <i>He fractured his skull when he was a kid.</i>
gap	Make an opening or gap in. <i>The explosion made a gap in the wall.</i>
<u>hack</u>	An act of computer hacking. <i>Lots of people leave because they can t hack it.</i>
hole	Make a hole or holes in. <i>A fox s hole.</i>
incised	Sharply and deeply indented. <i>An incised design.</i>
interstice	An intervening space, especially a very small one. <i>The interstices of a network.</i>
lip	(of water) lap against. <i>Downsizing is on everyone s lips at the moment.</i>
palate	A person's ability to distinguish between and appreciate different flavours. <i>A fine range of drink for sophisticated palates.</i>
partible	(of e.g. property) capable of being parted or divided. <i>A partible estate.</i>
partition	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>Partition off part of a large bedroom to create a small bathroom.</i>
<u>rupture</u>	Breach or disturb (a harmonious feeling or situation). <i>The rupture with his father would never be healed.</i>

segmentation	<p>The act of dividing or partitioning; separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart.</p> <p>The segmentation of society means that often we don't have arguments across the political divide.</p>
separated	<p>Separated at the joint.</p> <p>His parents are separated.</p>
slot	<p>Place an object into a slot typically one specifically designed to receive it.</p> <p>He slotted in the opening goal.</p>
snap	<p>Tender green beans without strings that easily snap into sections.</p> <p>The quarterback fumbled the snap.</p>
<u>split</u>	<p>A split osier used in basketwork.</p> <p>They met up and split the booty.</p>
