### Definitions of "Crevice" as a noun

- *A long narrow depression in a surface.*
- *A narrow opening or fissure, especially in a rock or wall.*
- *A long narrow opening.*



## Synonyms of "Crevice" as a noun (20 Words)

<b>breach</b>	A gap in a wall, barrier, or defence, especially one made by an attacking army. <i>A <b>breach</b> in the mountain wall.</i>
<b>chap</b>	A crack in a lip caused usually by cold. <i>That <b>chap</b> is your host.</i>
<b>cleft</b>	A long narrow opening.
<b>cranny</b>	A long narrow depression in a surface. <i>Bugs and spiders conceal themselves in <b>crannies</b> of the bark.</i>
<b>fissure</b>	A long narrow depression in a surface. <i>The bacteria survive around vents or <b>fissures</b> in the deep ocean floor.</i>
<b>fracture</b>	A diphthong substituted by fracture. <i>It was a nasty <b>fracture</b>.</i>
<b>interstice</b>	An intervening space, especially a very small one. <i>The <b>interstices</b> of a network.</i>
<b>nook</b>	An interior angle formed by two meeting walls. <i>The fish should be able to find <b>nooks</b> and <b>crannies</b> in which they will be safe.</i>
<b>perforation</b>	A line of small holes for tearing at a particular place. <i>A <b>perforation</b> of the eardrum.</i>
<b>rent</b>	A payment or series of payments made by the lessee to an owner for use of some property, facility, equipment, or service. <i>The rise in council house <b>rents</b>.</i>
<b>rift</b>	A major fault separating blocks of the earth's surface a rift valley. <i>The wind had torn open a <b>rift</b> in the clouds.</i>
<b>rupture</b>	The act of making a sudden noisy break. <i>The <b>rupture</b> with his father would never be healed.</i>
<b>scissure</b>	Division into two parts; cleavage.
<b>slit</b>	A long, narrow cut or opening. <i>Arrow <b>slits</b>.</i>
<b>slot</b>	A slot machine that is used for gambling. <i>Landing <b>slots</b> at Heathrow airport.</i>
<b>split</b>	A single thickness of split hide. <i><b>Splits</b> appeared in the decaying planks.</i>
<b>vent</b>	An opening that allows air, gas, or liquid to pass out of or into a confined space. <i>Children give <b>vent</b> to their anger in various ways.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Crevice" as a noun

- *Many creatures hide in crevices in the rock.*



## Associations of "Crevice" (30 Words)

<b>aperture</b>	An man-made opening; usually small. <i>The genital <b>aperture</b> of an insect.</i>
<b>avulsion</b>	The action of pulling or tearing away.
<b>break</b>	The occurrence of breaking. <i>The council says it will prosecute traders who <b>break</b> the law.</i>
<b>cleavage</b>	(embryology) the repeated division of a fertilised ovum. <i>She wore a dress that exposed an inch or two of <b>cleavage</b>.</i>
<b>cleft</b>	Split or divided. <i>A <b>cleft</b> stick.</i>

<b><u>collapse</u></b>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>The talks <b>collapsed</b> last week over territorial issues.</i>
<b>deformity</b>	An affliction in which some part of the body is misshapen or malformed. <i>Respiratory problems caused by spinal <b>deformity</b>.</i>
<b><u>diverge</u></b>	Move or draw apart. <i>The two paths <b>diverge</b> here.</i>
<b>divergent</b>	Diverging from another or from a standard. <i>A <b>divergent</b> opinion.</i>
<b>epiglottis</b>	A flap of cartilage that covers the windpipe while swallowing.
<b><u>faulty</u></b>	Having a defect. <i>A <b>faulty</b> brake.</i>
<b>fissure</b>	Break into fissures or fine cracks. <i>The dry years had cracked and <b>fissured</b> the cliffs.</i>
<b><u>fracture</u></b>	Become fractured. <i>He <b>fractured</b> his skull when he was a kid.</i>
<b>gap</b>	Make an opening or gap in. <i>The explosion made a <b>gap</b> in the wall.</i>
<b><u>hack</u></b>	An act of computer hacking. <i>Lots of people leave because they can t <b>hack</b> it.</i>
<b>hole</b>	Make a hole or holes in. <i>A fox s <b>hole</b>.</i>
<b>incised</b>	Sharply and deeply indented. <i>An <b>incised</b> design.</i>
<b>interstice</b>	An intervening space, especially a very small one. <i>The <b>interstices</b> of a network.</i>
<b>lip</b>	(of water) lap against. <i>Downsizing is on everyone s <b>lips</b> at the moment.</i>
<b>palate</b>	A person's ability to distinguish between and appreciate different flavours. <i>A fine range of drink for sophisticated <b>palates</b>.</i>
<b>partible</b>	(of e.g. property) capable of being parted or divided. <i>A <b>partible</b> estate.</i>
<b>partition</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i><b>Partition</b> off part of a large bedroom to create a small bathroom.</i>
<b><u>rupture</u></b>	Breach or disturb (a harmonious feeling or situation). <i>The <b>rupture</b> with his father would never be healed.</i>

<b>segmentation</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning; separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The <b>segmentation</b> of society means that often we don't have arguments across the political divide.</i>
<b>separated</b>	Separated at the joint. <i>His parents are <b>separated</b>.</i>
<b>slot</b>	Place an object into a slot typically one specifically designed to receive it. <i>He <b>slotted</b> in the opening goal.</i>
<b>snap</b>	Tender green beans without strings that easily snap into sections. <i>The quarterback fumbled the <b>snap</b>.</i>
<b><u>split</u></b>	A split osier used in basketwork. <i>They met up and <b>split</b> the booty.</i>
