- *A group of people who work closely together.*
- *An informal body of friends.*
- *A group of people working on a ship, aircraft, etc. other than the officers.*
- *The men and women who man a vehicle (ship, aircraft, etc).*
- *The team of men manning a racing shell.*

<b>crowd</b>	An audience, especially one at a sporting event. <i>The <b>crowd</b> of tall buildings.</i>
<b>force</b>	The army navy and air force of a country. <i>He might still be a <b>force</b> for peace and unity.</i>
<b>gang</b>	A group of people, especially young people, who regularly associate together. <i>A street <b>gang</b>.</i>
<b>group</b>	A set that is closed, associative, has an identity element and every element has an inverse. <i>A methyl <b>group</b>.</i>
<b>hands</b>	Ability. <i>My fate is in your <b>hands</b>.</i>
<b>herd</b>	A group of cattle or sheep or other domestic mammals all of the same kind that are herded by humans. <i>The children resembled a fairy <b>herd</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>It s just one <b>lot</b> of rich people stealing from another.</i>
<b>mariners</b>	A man who serves as a sailor.
<b>mob</b>	The Mafia or a similar criminal organization. <i>My <b>mob</b> travelled and traded with other people.</i>
<b>pack</b>	A quantity of fish fruit or other foods packed or canned in a particular season. <i>A <b>pack</b> of wolves will encircle an ailing prey.</i>
<b>party</b>	A social gathering of invited guests, typically involving eating, drinking, and entertainment. <i>Draft the <b>party</b> s election manifesto.</i>
<b>posse</b>	A group of people who have a common characteristic or occupation. <i>The followers of the so called Techno phenomenon the vibed up whistle <b>posse</b>.</i>
<b>sailors</b>	Any member of a ship's crew.
<b>set</b>	The descent of a heavenly body below the horizon. <i>He did four <b>sets</b> of the incline bench press.</i>
<b>shift</b>	The group of people who work during a particular shift. <i>The bus was still waiting there when the day <b>shift</b> went home.</i>
<b>squad</b>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The 39 year old actress and her <b>squad</b> snapped some pics together after the show.</i>

<b>swarm</b>	A large number of people or things. <i>A <b>swarm</b> of insects obscured the light.</i>
<b>team</b>	A cooperative unit (especially in sports). <i>A <b>team</b> of researchers.</i>
<b>troop</b>	Soldiers or armed forces. <i>A <b>troop</b> of children.</i>
<b>unit</b>	The smallest measure of investment in a unit trust. <i>The sentence as a <b>unit</b> of grammar.</i>
<b>work party</b>	Activity directed toward making or doing something.
<b>working party</b>	A mine or quarry that is being or has been worked.

<b>airport</b>	Relating to or denoting light popular fiction such as is offered for sale to travellers in airports. <i>An <b>airport</b> thriller.</i>
<b>aviation</b>	The flying or operating of aircraft. <i>Two events launched the history of modern <b>aviation</b>.</i>
<b>ballooning</b>	Flying in a balloon. <i>A <b>ballooning</b> accident.</i>
<b>boatswain</b>	A petty officer on a merchant ship who controls the work of other seamen.
<b>cabin</b>	Confine to a small space such as a cabin. <i>The <b>cabin</b> lay three miles into the reserve.</i>
<b>disembarkation</b>	The act of passengers and crew getting off of a ship or aircraft.
<u><b>flight</b></u>	Shoot a bird in flight. <i>His <b>flight</b> was an indication of his guilt.</i>
<u><b>flying</b></u>	Used in names of animals that can glide by using winglike membranes or other structures e g flying squirrel. <i>A <b>flying</b> visit.</i>
<b>hangar</b>	House an aircraft in a hangar. <i>The army choppers that were <b>hangared</b> out at Springs.</i>
<b>helicopter</b>	Transport by helicopter. <i>They were <b>helicoptering</b> daily between Bath and London.</i>
<b>jack</b>	Used in names of animals that are smaller than similar kinds e g jack snipe. <i>You don t know <b>jack</b>.</i>
<b>jet</b>	A jet engine. <i>The newly weds <b>jettted</b> off for a honeymoon in New York.</i>
<b>laborer</b>	Someone who works with their hands; someone engaged in manual labor.
<b>mariner</b>	A man who serves as a sailor. <i>The intrepid <b>mariners</b> of yesteryear set out to discover new worlds.</i>
<u><b>navigator</b></u>	A person who navigates a ship, aircraft, etc. <i>The driver relies on his <b>navigator</b> s skill at reading the road.</i>
<u><b>sailor</b></u>	A person who rarely (or often) becomes sick at sea in rough weather. <i>Hawaii was an important stopping point for <b>sailors</b> to restock provisions.</i>
<b>shipwreck</b>	Of a person or ship suffer a shipwreck. <i>That was the <b>shipwreck</b> of their romance.</i>



<b>shuttle</b>	Transport in a shuttle. <i>A <b>shuttle</b> bus departs every 30 minutes.</i>
<b>stewardess</b>	A woman employed to look after the passengers on a ship or aircraft.
<b>transatlantic</b>	Crossing the Atlantic Ocean. <i>The <b>transatlantic</b> relationship.</i>
<b>transcontinental</b>	A transcontinental railway or train. <i>A <b>transcontinental</b> radio audience.</i>
<b>voyage</b>	Go on a voyage. <i>Writing a biography is a <b>voyage</b> of discovery.</i>
<b>wrecking</b>	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. <i>The locals reverted to the age old practice of <b>wrecking</b>.</i>
