
## Cringe as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Cringe" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "cringe" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Experience an inward shiver of embarrassment or disgust.
- Show submission or fear.
- Bend one's head and body in fear or apprehension or in a servile manner.
- Draw back, as with fear or pain.





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### Synonyms of "Cringe" as a verb (35 Words)

blanch	Make white or pale by extracting colour. <i>The cold light <b>blanch</b>ed her face.</i>
blench	Make a sudden flinching movement out of fear or pain. A shudder shook the boy s frame and his face <b>blench</b> ed.
<u>blush</u>	Show shyness, embarrassment, or shame by becoming red in the face. <i>Her cheeks</i> <b>blush</b> ed in the cold winter air.
bow and scrape	Bend the head or the upper part of the body in a gesture of respect or greeting.
<u>cower</u>	Crouch or curl up. Children <b>cower</b> ed in terror as the shoot out erupted.
<u>crawl</u>	Swim by doing the crawl. Glazes can <b>crawl</b> away from a crack in the piece.
<u>creep</u>	(of a thing) move very slowly and inexorably. The fog was <b>creep</b> ing up from the marsh.
crouch	Sit on one's heels. We <b>crouch</b> ed down in the trench.
<u>dodge</u>	Move quickly to one side or out of the way. Adam <b>dodge</b> d between the cars.
draw back	Take in, also metaphorically.
duck	To move (the head or body) quickly downwards or away. <i>Before he could <b>duck</b> another stone struck him.</i>
fawn	Have fawns. Deer <b>fawn</b> .
<u>flinch</u>	Make a quick, nervous movement as an instinctive reaction to fear, pain, or surprise. <i>He had faced death without <b>flinch</b>ing.</i>
<u>flush</u>	Remove or dispose of an object or substance by flushing. The sky <b>flush</b> ed with rosy splendor.
funk	Draw back, as with fear or pain. I could have seen him this morning but I <b>funk</b> ed it.
go red	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
grovel	Act in an obsequious way in order to obtain someone's forgiveness or favour. They criticized leaders who <b>grovel</b> led to foreign patrons.



kowtow	Kneel and touch the ground with the forehead in worship or submission as part of Chinese custom. <i>He is always</i> <b>kowtow</b> ing to his boss.
pull back	Move into a certain direction.
quail	Draw back, as with fear or pain.
quake	(especially of the earth) shake or tremble. The rumbling vibrations set the whole valley quaking.
<u>quiver</u>	Cause (something) to make a slight rapid motion. The bird runs along in a zigzag path <b>quiver</b> ing its wings.
<u>recoil</u>	Spring back, as from a forceful thrust. He <b>recoil</b> ed in horror.
shake	Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state. The escalation in costs is certain to <b>shake</b> the confidence of private investors.
<u>shrink</u>	Be averse to or unwilling to do (something difficult or unappealing. The metal is unsuitable for <b>shrink</b> ing on to wooden staves.
<u>shudder</u>	(of a person) tremble convulsively, typically as a result of fear or revulsion. <i>She still <b>shudder</b>ed at the thought of him.</i>
shy	(especially of a horse) start suddenly aside in fright at an object, noise, or movement. Don t <b>shy</b> away from saying what you think.
shy away	Throw quickly.
squinch	Draw back, as with fear or pain.
<u>squirm</u>	Wriggle or twist the body from side to side, especially as a result of nervousness or discomfort. <i>He looked uncomfortable and <b>squirm</b>ed in his chair.</i>
start	Play in the starting lineup. The teacher can <b>start</b> by capitalizing on children s curiosity.
toady	Try to gain favor by cringing or flattering. She imagined him <b>toady</b> ing to his rich clients.
<u>tremble</u>	Be in a state of extreme apprehension. I <b>tremble</b> to think that we could ever return to conditions like these.
truckle	Yield to out of weakness.
<u>wince</u>	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>He <b>wince</b>d at the disgust in her voice</i> .

<u>admit</u>	Declare to be true or admit the existence or reality or truth of. The paramilitaries <b>admit</b> ted to the illegal possession of arms.
apology	A very poor or inadequate example of. <i>He wrote a letter of <b>apology</b> to the hostess.</i>
boggle	(of a person) hesitate to do or accept. The inflated salary of a star <b>boggle</b> s the mind.
compensation	The action or process of awarding compensation. A <b>compensation</b> claim.
<u>cower</u>	Show submission or fear. Children <b>cower</b> ed in terror as the shoot out erupted.
<u>crawl</u>	Feel as if crawling with insects. The tiny spider was <b>crawl</b> ing up Nicky s arm.
<u>creep</u>	(of a plant) grow along the ground or other surface by means of extending stems or branches. Stones and earth slowly slip down the slopes by soil <b>creep</b> .
crouch	A crouching stance or posture. We <b>crouch</b> ed down in the trench.
duck	The meat of a duck as food. Before he could <b>duck</b> another stone struck him.
<u>excuse</u>	Defend explain clear away or make excuses for by reasoning. <i>Please excuse me from this class.</i>
<u>flinch</u>	An act of flinching. Don t call me that he said with a <b>flinch</b> .
<u>gather</u>	The act of gathering something. The destroyer <b>gather</b> ed speed.
grovel	Lie or crawl abjectly on the ground with one's face downwards. They criticized leaders who <b>grovel</b> led to foreign patrons.
groveling	Totally submissive.
heartfelt	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i>Heartfelt</i> condolences.



huddle	A number of people gathered together to speak about private or secret matters.
	The colonel <b>huddle</b> d with A J at the dining room table.
kneel	Supporting yourself on your knees. In church you have to <b>kneel</b> during parts of the service.
<u>posture</u>	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. I got out of the car in an alert <b>posture</b> .
purloin	Steal (something. He must have managed to <b>purloin</b> a copy of the key.
<u>rebound</u>	The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>He blasted the <b>rebound</b> into the net.</i>
<u>recoil</u>	The action of recoiling. His body jerked with the <b>recoil</b> of the rifle.
<u>shrink</u>	(of clothes or material) become smaller as a result of being immersed in water. <i>You should see a <b>shrink</b>.</i>
silently	Without making any sound. He <b>silently</b> cursed himself for his actions.
<u>sincere</u>	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>Felt <b>sincere</b> regret that they were leaving.</i>
<u>sit</u>	Be or remain in a particular position or state. Kelly had been cat <b>sit</b> ting for me.
<u>sneak</u>	Someone who prowls or sneaks about usually with unlawful intentions. A <b>sneak</b> preview.
squat	In gymnastics an exercise involving a squatting movement or action. A <b>squat</b> ty red smokestack.
stealthily	In a cautious and surreptitious manner, so as not to be seen or heard. We need to move <b>stealthily</b> and look inconspicuous.
stoop	Carry oneself, often habitually, with head, shoulders, and upper back bent forward. <i>The man</i> <b>stoop</b> s his head.
<u>wince</u>	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>He <b>wince</b>d at the disgust in her voice</i> .
