- *Show submission or fear.*
- *Bend one's head and body in fear or apprehension or in a servile manner.*
- *Draw back, as with fear or pain.*



Synonyms of "Cringe" as a verb (35 Words)

blanch	Make white or pale by extracting colour. <i>The cold light blanched her face.</i>
blench	Make a sudden flinching movement out of fear or pain. <i>A shudder shook the boy's frame and his face blenched.</i>
<u>blush</u>	Show shyness, embarrassment, or shame by becoming red in the face. <i>Her cheeks blushed in the cold winter air.</i>
bow and scrape	Bend the head or the upper part of the body in a gesture of respect or greeting.
<u>cower</u>	Crouch or curl up. <i>Children cowered in terror as the shoot out erupted.</i>
<u>crawl</u>	Swim by doing the crawl. <i>Glazes can crawl away from a crack in the piece.</i>
<u>creep</u>	(of a thing) move very slowly and inexorably. <i>The fog was creeping up from the marsh.</i>
crouch	Sit on one's heels. <i>We crouched down in the trench.</i>
<u>dodge</u>	Move quickly to one side or out of the way. <i>Adam dodged between the cars.</i>
draw back	Take in, also metaphorically.
duck	To move (the head or body) quickly downwards or away. <i>Before he could duck another stone struck him.</i>
fawn	Have fawns. <i>Deer fawn.</i>
<u>flinch</u>	Make a quick, nervous movement as an instinctive reaction to fear, pain, or surprise. <i>He had faced death without flinching.</i>
<u>flush</u>	Remove or dispose of an object or substance by flushing. <i>The sky flushed with rosy splendor.</i>
funk	Draw back, as with fear or pain. <i>I could have seen him this morning but I funked it.</i>
go red	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
grovel	Act in an obsequious way in order to obtain someone's forgiveness or favour. <i>They criticized leaders who grovelled to foreign patrons.</i>

kowtow	Kneel and touch the ground with the forehead in worship or submission as part of Chinese custom. <i>He is always kowtowing to his boss.</i>
pull back	Move into a certain direction.
quail	Draw back, as with fear or pain.
quake	(especially of the earth) shake or tremble. <i>The rumbling vibrations set the whole valley quaking.</i>
<u>quiver</u>	Cause (something) to make a slight rapid motion. <i>The bird runs along in a zigzag path quivering its wings.</i>
<u>recoil</u>	Spring back, as from a forceful thrust. <i>He recoiled in horror.</i>
shake	Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state. <i>The escalation in costs is certain to shake the confidence of private investors.</i>
<u>shrink</u>	Be averse to or unwilling to do (something difficult or unappealing). <i>The metal is unsuitable for shrinking on to wooden staves.</i>
<u>shudder</u>	(of a person) tremble convulsively, typically as a result of fear or revulsion. <i>She still shuddered at the thought of him.</i>
shy	(especially of a horse) start suddenly aside in fright at an object, noise, or movement. <i>Don't shy away from saying what you think.</i>
shy away	Throw quickly.
squinch	Draw back, as with fear or pain.
<u>squirm</u>	Wriggle or twist the body from side to side, especially as a result of nervousness or discomfort. <i>He looked uncomfortable and squirmed in his chair.</i>
start	Play in the starting lineup. <i>The teacher can start by capitalizing on children's curiosity.</i>
toady	Try to gain favor by cringing or flattering. <i>She imagined him toadying to his rich clients.</i>
<u>tremble</u>	Be in a state of extreme apprehension. <i>I tremble to think that we could ever return to conditions like these.</i>
truckle	Yield to out of weakness.
<u>wince</u>	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>He wincing at the disgust in her voice.</i>

<u>admit</u>	Declare to be true or admit the existence or reality or truth of. <i>The paramilitaries admitted to the illegal possession of arms.</i>
apology	A very poor or inadequate example of. <i>He wrote a letter of apology to the hostess.</i>
boggle	(of a person) hesitate to do or accept. <i>The inflated salary of a star boggles the mind.</i>
compensation	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>A compensation claim.</i>
<u>cower</u>	Show submission or fear. <i>Children cowered in terror as the shoot out erupted.</i>
<u>crawl</u>	Feel as if crawling with insects. <i>The tiny spider was crawling up Nicky's arm.</i>
<u>creep</u>	(of a plant) grow along the ground or other surface by means of extending stems or branches. <i>Stones and earth slowly slip down the slopes by soil creep.</i>
crouch	A crouching stance or posture. <i>We crouched down in the trench.</i>
duck	The meat of a duck as food. <i>Before he could duck another stone struck him.</i>
<u>excuse</u>	Defend explain clear away or make excuses for by reasoning. <i>Please excuse me from this class.</i>
<u>flinch</u>	An act of flinching. <i>Don't call me that he said with a flinch.</i>
<u>gather</u>	The act of gathering something. <i>The destroyer gathered speed.</i>
grovel	Lie or crawl abjectly on the ground with one's face downwards. <i>They criticized leaders who grovelled to foreign patrons.</i>
groveling	Totally submissive.
heartfelt	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i>Heartfelt condolences.</i>

huddle	A number of people gathered together to speak about private or secret matters. <i>The colonel huddled with A J at the dining room table.</i>
kneel	Supporting yourself on your knees. <i>In church you have to kneel during parts of the service.</i>
<u>posture</u>	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>I got out of the car in an alert posture.</i>
purloin	Steal (something). <i>He must have managed to purloin a copy of the key.</i>
<u>rebound</u>	The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>He blasted the rebound into the net.</i>
<u>recoil</u>	The action of recoiling. <i>His body jerked with the recoil of the rifle.</i>
<u>shrink</u>	(of clothes or material) become smaller as a result of being immersed in water. <i>You should see a shrink.</i>
silently	Without making any sound. <i>He silently cursed himself for his actions.</i>
<u>sincere</u>	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>Felt sincere regret that they were leaving.</i>
<u>sit</u>	Be or remain in a particular position or state. <i>Kelly had been cat sitting for me.</i>
<u>sneak</u>	Someone who prowls or sneaks about usually with unlawful intentions. <i>A sneak preview.</i>
squat	In gymnastics an exercise involving a squatting movement or action. <i>A squatty red smokestack.</i>
stealthily	In a cautious and surreptitious manner, so as not to be seen or heard. <i>We need to move stealthily and look inconspicuous.</i>
stoop	Carry oneself, often habitually, with head, shoulders, and upper back bent forward. <i>The man stoops his head.</i>
<u>wince</u>	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>He winced at the disgust in her voice.</i>
