### Synonyms of "Crony" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>best friend</b>	The person who is most outstanding or excellent; someone who tops all others.
<b>boon companion</b>	A desirable state.
<a href="#">brother</a>	A man or boy in relation to other sons and daughters of his parents. <i>The time is coming <b>brothers</b> for us to act.</i>
<a href="#">buddy</a>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I m working on it <b>buddy</b>.</i>
<b>chum</b>	Used as a friendly or familiar form of address between men or boys. <i>An old school <b>chum</b>.</i>

<u><b>companion</b></u>	A person, usually a woman, employed to live with and assist another. <i>A small <b>companion</b> galaxy.</i>
<u><b>confidant</b></u>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close <b>confidante</b> of the princess.</i>
<b>confidante</b>	A female confidant.
<u><b>familiar</b></u>	A spirit (usually in animal form) that acts as an assistant to a witch or wizard. <i>Her <b>familiars</b> were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.</i>
<b>friend</b>	One's close relatives. <i>All of a sudden you've got 50 <b>friends</b> online who need to stay connected.</i>
<b>intimate</b>	Someone to whom private matters are confided. <i>His circle of <b>intimates</b>.</i>
<u><b>pal</b></u>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>We've been <b>pals</b> for a long time.</i>
<b>second self</b>	1/60 of a minute; the basic unit of time adopted under the Systeme International d'Unites.
<u><b>sidekick</b></u>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>Sherlock Holmes bumbling <b>sidekick</b> Watson.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Crony" as a noun

- *He went gambling with his cronies.*

## Associations of "Crony" (30 Words)

<u><b>acquaintance</b></u>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>The pupils had little <b>acquaintance</b> with the language.</i>
<u><b>affinity</b></u>	The force attracting atoms to each other and binding them together in a molecule. <i>The mysterious <b>affinity</b> between them.</i>
<b>amicability</b>	A disinclination to quarrel.
<u><b>aunt</b></u>	The sister of your father or mother; the wife of your uncle. <i>She was brought up by her <b>aunt</b> and uncle.</i>
<u><b>brother</b></u>	A thing which resembles or is connected to another thing. <i>There I was with one white boy and this other <b>brother</b>.</i>

<b>buddy</b>	Become friendly and spend time with someone. <i>I m working on it <b>buddy</b>.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b>companion</b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>A traveller s <b>companion</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	The state of being with someone. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>comrade</b>	A fellow member of the Communist Party. <i>You re right <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>couple</b>	Bring two objects, ideas, or people together. <i>Clean the stains with a <b>couple</b> squirts dishwashing liquid.</i>
<b>cousin</b>	A person in one's wider extended family, to whom one is not closely related. <i>She s a distant <b>cousin</b>.</i>
<b>elder</b>	A leader or senior figure in a tribe or other group. <i>The <b>elder</b> of the two sons.</i>
<b>familial</b>	Relating to or having the characteristics of a family. <i>Certain diseases are <b>familial</b>.</i>
<b>fellow</b>	A boy or man. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Folk music. <i>A <b>folk</b> club.</i>
<b>fraternal</b>	(of twins) developed from separate ova and therefore genetically distinct and not necessarily of the same sex or more similar than other siblings. <i><b>Fraternal</b> twins are biovular.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He was my best <b>friend</b> at the university.</i>
<b>kinship</b>	Blood relationship. <i>Felt a deep <b>kinship</b> with the other students.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A male is <b>mated</b> to several females.</i>
<b>neighbour</b>	A person who lives (or is located) near another. <i>Our garden was the envy of the <b>neighbours</b>.</i>

<b><u>pal</u></b>	Spend time with a friend. <i>Back off <b>pal</b>.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	A person's partner in marriage. <i>A <b>partner</b> in a prosperous legal practice.</i>
<b><u>peer</u></b>	A nobleman, duke, or marquis, or earl, or viscount, or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>Faye <b>peered</b> at her with suspicion.</i>
<b><u>playground</u></b>	An area where many people go for recreation. <i><b>Playground</b> games.</i>
<b><u>sibling</u></b>	A person's brother or sister.
<b><u>sister</u></b>	A fellow woman seen in relation to feminist issues. <i>A <b>sister</b> ship.</i>
<b><u>sisterhood</u></b>	An association, society, or community of women linked by a common interest, religion, or trade. <i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their <b>sisterhood</b> with women around the globe.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	A twin bedded room. <i>Experiments were carried out using sets of identical <b>twins</b>.</i>
<b><u>uncle</u></b>	The brother of your father or mother; the husband of your aunt. <i>He played <b>uncle</b> to lonely students.</i>
