- *(of a space) full of people, leaving little or no room for movement; packed.*
- *Overfilled or compacted or concentrated.*



Synonyms of "Crowded" as an adjective (17 Words)

busy

Of facilities such as telephones or lavatories unavailable for use by anyone else or indicating unavailability engaged is a British term for a busy telephone line.

*The team members are **busy** raising money.*

congested

(of a road or place) so crowded with traffic or people as to hinder or prevent freedom of movement.

*The **congested** streets of the West End.*

cramped

Inhibiting the development of someone or something.

*There is no way a computer will be able to decipher my **cramped** handwriting.*

crushed

Subdued or brought low in condition or status.

***Crushed** velvet.*

filled to capacity Taken up.

full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>He kept his fast pace going for the full 14 mile distance.</i>
full to bursting	Containing as much or as many as is possible or normal.
overcrowded	(of accommodation or a space) filled beyond what is comfortable, safe, or desirable. <i>The train was seriously overcrowded.</i>
overflowing	(of a container) so full that the contents go over the sides. <i>An overflowing ashtray.</i>
overfull	Exceeding demand. <i>An overfull cup of tea.</i>
overpeopled	(of a place) containing an excessive number of people. <i>An increasingly overpeopled world.</i>
overpopulated	Having an excessively large population. <i>Overpopulated industrial countries.</i>
<u>packed</u>	Extremely crowded or filled to capacity. <i>Packed snow.</i>
populous	Densely populated. <i>The populous city of Shanghai.</i>
swarming	Moving in or forming a large or dense group. <i>A swarming mass of bodies.</i>
<u>teeming</u>	Abundantly filled with especially living things. <i>The Third World s teeming millions.</i>
thronged	Filled with great numbers crowded together. <i>I try to avoid the thronged streets and stores just before Christmas.</i>

bazaar	A shop where a variety of goods are sold. <i>The church bazaar.</i>
bottleneck	The style of playing that uses a bottleneck. <i>His laziness has bottlenecked our efforts to reform the system.</i>
clump	Form a clump or clumps. <i>A clump of ferns.</i>
<u>compact</u>	Make more compact by or as if by pressing. <i>Compact soil.</i>
compactly	With concise and precise brevity; to the point. <i>He wrote compactly but clearly.</i>
<u>compress</u>	A cloth pad or dressing (with or without medication) applied firmly to some part of the body (to relieve discomfort or reduce fever). <i>In this chapter we compress into summary form the main findings.</i>

compressed	Reduced in volume by pressure. <i>With lips compressed.</i>
compression	The process or result of becoming smaller or pressed together.
congested	(of a part of the body) abnormally full of blood. <i>Congested arteries.</i>
congestion	The state of being congested. <i>Traffic congestion.</i>
constrict	(of a snake) coil round (prey) in order to asphyxiate it. <i>He felt his throat constrict.</i>
constricted	Inhibited; restricted. <i>A constricted blood vessel.</i>
dense	Permitting little if any light to pass through because of denseness of matter. <i>Dense as lead.</i>
filled	Of purchase orders that have been filled. <i>Fog filled air.</i>
full	The period point or state of the greatest fullness or strength. <i>His diary is full of entries about her.</i>
impenetrable	Impossible to understand. <i>Her expression was impenetrable.</i>
jammed	Filled to capacity. <i>A suitcase jammed with dirty clothes.</i>
lush	(of vegetation, especially grass) growing luxuriantly. <i>I had some really lush pressies.</i>
narrowed	Made narrow; limited in breadth. <i>His narrowed eyes.</i>
nonporous	Not porous; especially not having vessels that appear as pores.
overcrowd	Crowd together too much. <i>Employees were assigned to make sure people didn't overcrowd the escalators.</i>
packed	Pressed together or compressed. <i>A packed theater.</i>
pressed	(of juice or oil) extracted by crushing or squeezing fruit, vegetables, etc. <i>Freshly pressed orange juice.</i>
teeming	Abundantly filled with especially living things. <i>She walked through the teeming streets.</i>
thick	With a thick consistency. <i>Thick mud.</i>

- thickly** In a way that covers or fills something with a deep layer.
*The paint has been applied **thickly**.*
- throng** Flock or be present in great numbers.
*A **throng** of birds.*
- tightly** In a tight or constricted manner.
*The government **tightly** controlled the movement of money.*
- traffic** Buying and selling; especially illicit trade.
*A stream of heavy **traffic**.*
- underbrush** Shrubs and small trees forming the undergrowth in a forest.
