<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>leader</b>	The person who leads or commands a group, organization, or country. <i>The <b>leader</b> of a protest group.</i>
<b>lord</b>	Used in compound titles of other people of authority. <i>Our <b>lord</b> the king.</i>
<b>monarch</b>	Large migratory American butterfly having deep orange wings with black and white markings; the larvae feed on milkweed. <i>The reigning <b>monarch</b>.</i>
<b>overlord</b>	A person who has general authority over others. <i>The undisputed <b>overlord</b> of the crime family.</i>
<b>pate</b>	The top of the head. <i>He scratched his balding <b>pate</b>.</i>
<b>peak</b>	The point of highest activity, quality, or achievement. <i>Package holiday sales hit a <b>peak</b> of around 12 million.</i>
<b>pennant</b>	A tapering flag on a ship, especially one flown at the masthead of a vessel in commission. <i>The Dodgers won six <b>pennants</b> during his career.</i>
