- *Belonging to an early stage of technical development; characterized by simplicity and (often) crudeness.*
- *Conspicuously and tastelessly indecent.*
- *In a natural or raw state; not yet processed or refined.*
- *Not refined or processed.*

- *(of an estimate or guess) likely to be only approximately accurate.*
- *Not processed or subjected to analysis.*
- *Constructed in a rudimentary or makeshift way.*
- *Offensively coarse or rude, especially in relation to sexual matters.*

<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>He submitted a faulty report.</i>
<u>filthy</u>	Contemptible (used for emphasis). <i>Filthy language.</i>
<u>general</u>	Prevailing among and common to the general public. <i>In general terms.</i>

gross	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>A projected gross take off weight of 500 000 pounds.</i>
<u>hazy</u>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>The picture we have of him is extremely hazy.</i>
homespun	(of cloth or yarn) made or spun at home. <i>Homespun philosophy.</i>
<u>imperfect</u>	(of a cadence) ending on the dominant chord. <i>Drainage here is imperfect.</i>
imprecise	Not precise. <i>Imprecise astronomical observations.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>An improvised short speech.</i>
indecent	Offensive to good taste especially in sexual matters. <i>They leaped on the suggestion with indecent haste.</i>
indelicate	Having or showing a lack of sensitive understanding or tact. <i>An earthy often indelicate sense of humour.</i>
<u>inferior</u>	Of low or inferior quality. <i>Inferior goods.</i>
lewd	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a lewd song.</i>
<u>licentious</u>	Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained. <i>Coarse and licentious men.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
mediocre	Of only average quality; not very good. <i>He is an enthusiastic if mediocre painter.</i>
not accurate	Characterized by perfect conformity to fact or truth ; strictly correct.
not exact	Marked by strict and particular and complete accordance with fact.
obscene	Suggestive of or tending to moral looseness. <i>The dance often becomes flagrantly obscene.</i>
off colour	Not in operation or operational.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive operations against the insurgents.</i>
pornographic	Designed to arouse lust. <i>Pornographic films and magazines.</i>

primitive	Very basic or unsophisticated in terms of comfort, convenience, or efficiency. <i>Primitive societies.</i>
rabelaisian	Of or relating to or characteristic of Francois Rabelais or his works.
raw	From a traditional tribal or rural culture. <i>Oversewing is used to neaten raw edges.</i>
ribald	Humorously vulgar. <i>Ribald language.</i>
risqué	Suggestive of sexual impropriety.
rough	Of the margin of a leaf shape; having the edge cut or fringed or scalloped. <i>A few rough sketches.</i>
rough and ready	Unkind or cruel or uncivil.
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>He is a rude and arrogant bully.</i>

rugged

Very difficult; severely testing stamina or resolution.

*A week of **rugged** demanding adventure at an outdoor training centre.*

stony

Hard as granite.

*The government maintained a **stony** silence about the affair.*

tactless

Having or showing a lack of skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues.

*In the circumstances it was **tactless** to ask her age.*

uncultivated

(of land or fields) not prepared for raising crops.

***Uncultivated** land.*

unfinished

Not brought to an end or conclusion.

*The building is still **unfinished**.*

unrefined

(used of persons and their behavior) not refined; uncouth.

***Unrefined** ore.*

unsophisticated

Not complicated or highly developed; basic.

*An **unsophisticated** machine.*
