prompt Give an incentive for action.
*She **prompted** me to call my relatives.*

remind Cause (someone) to fulfil an obligation or to take note of something.
*The barman **reminded** them that singing was not permitted.*

betoken	Indicate by signs. <i>The falling comet betokened the true end of Merlin s powers.</i>
clue	A fact or idea that serves to reveal something or solve a problem. <i>Police officers are still searching for clues.</i>
deduce	Conclude by reasoning; in logic. <i>He cannot deduce his descent wholly by heirs male.</i>
elude	(of an achievement or something desired) fail to be attained by (someone). <i>We need to ensure that bad cases do not elude tough penalties.</i>
evoke	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>This remark evoked sadness.</i>
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>The Minister hinted at a possible change of heart.</i>
implication	A relation implicated by virtue of involvement or close connection (especially an incriminating involvement). <i>He was suspected of implication in several robberies.</i>
imply	Suggest as a logically necessary consequence; in logic. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i>
indicant	A number or ratio (a value on a scale of measurement) derived from a series of observed facts; can reveal relative changes as a function of time. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Dotted lines indicate the text s margins.</i>
indication	A reading given by a gauge or meter. <i>An indication of foul play.</i>
lead	Lead as in the performance of a composition. <i>They are waiting for an expansion of world trade to lead a recovery.</i>
light	The amount or quality of light in a place. <i>As long as the lighting was good.</i>
lighthouse	A tower with a light that gives warning of shoals to passing ships.
manifestation	An event, action, or object that clearly shows or embodies something abstract or theoretical. <i>A manifestation of disease.</i>
marker	A person who assesses the standard of a test or examination. <i>We ll give you a marker you give us the car.</i>
portend	Indicate, as with a sign or an omen. <i>The eclipses portend some major events.</i>

presage	An omen or portent. <i>Lands he could measure terms and tides presage.</i>
pyrotechnics	A firework display. <i>He thrilled his audience with vocal pyrotechnics.</i>
remind	Put in the mind of someone. <i>He would have forgotten my birthday if you hadn't reminded him.</i>
sign	Communicate in sign language. <i>Clinical signs of liver disease.</i>
signal	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The diner signaled the waiters to bring the menu.</i>
suggest	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The seduction scenes suggest his guilt and her loneliness.</i>
suggestion	An idea or belief accepted by a person as a result of suggestion. <i>The power of suggestion.</i>
symptom	A physical or mental feature which is regarded as indicating a condition of disease, particularly such a feature that is apparent to the patient. <i>The government was plagued by leaks a symptom of divisions and poor morale.</i>
tip	Give a tip or gratuity to in return for a service beyond the compensation agreed on. <i>They clambered to the tip of Monadnock.</i>
