According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "cult" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- An interest followed with exaggerated zeal.
- Followers of an unorthodox, extremist, or false religion or sect who often live outside of conventional society under the direction of a charismatic leader.
- A system of religious veneration and devotion directed towards a particular figure or object.
- A religion or sect that is generally considered to be unorthodox, extremist, or false.
- Followers of an exclusive system of religious beliefs and practices.
- A person or thing that is popular or fashionable among a particular group or section of society.
- Followers of an exclusive system of beliefs and practices.
- A system of religious beliefs and rituals.
- A misplaced or excessive admiration for a particular thing.
- A relatively small group of people having religious beliefs or practices regarded by others as strange or as imposing excessive control over members.
